
- 1. Information in file of Unknown X-48 US Bilitary Cemetery, Cambridge shows that this casualty was associated with the SS Dan Beard, a liberty ship destroyed off Vales, 12 October 1944.
- 2. The best clue to this casualty's identity is the finger ring found on the third finger, left hand, described as a gold and silver colored signet ring. The letter M appeared on the top over which was an Alladin lamp. On one side of the ring is 19, on the other side 39, suggesting a school or class ring, 1939. The manufacturer's name is Jestenick.
- 3. Copies of correspondence indicate that the parents of James H. FEURTADO, one of the seamen missing from the SS Dan Beard, definitely identified the ring as the property of their son. The address of the next of kin, is liami, Florida, which suggests that the M on the ring represents Miami. According to the date of birth of Boatswain FEURTADO, as shown on the 371 Form, his age in 1939 would have been 13.
- 4. It is requested that the possible association between Unknown X-48, Cambridge and Boatswain FEURTADO be checked by contact with the next of kin or the Hiami school authorities, and this office inctified of the results.



STATEMENT made to W.G. Victor Jones, Inspector at Goodwick Police Station, at 2145 hrs., Tuesday, 16 January 1945 by Surgeon Lt. Charles Frederick Colvill PARKINSON, RNVR attached Royal Marines, Trecwn.

"About 2130 hrs., 16 Jan 1945, I inspected the remains of the body of a man at Goodwick Mortuary. His height was approximately 5'8". He is in an advanced state of decomposition, portions of his face, both legs below knee and right arm were missing. Small portion of clothing around waist fastened by belt and buckle. Body erouded by shingle penetrating through muscles of the buttock down to the pelvic bones.

Fatty waxy degeneration had begun in the remaining flesh at the back of the head and neck.

Body of Unknown Seaman recovered from the sea at Cwm-yr-Eglwys

I beg to report that in consequence of information received from Pc 49 Richards, Dinas, on 16 Jan 1945, that a body was floating in the sea near Cwm-yr-Eglwys, with Pc 37 Thomas I went to Cwm-yr-Eglwys, there I met Pc 49 Richards.

Mr. Evans, the Pont, Cwm-yr-Eglwys, loaned us his rowing boat and in this with Pc 37 Thomas I went in search of the body. We found it floating in the water about half a mile nearer Newport from Cwm-yr-Eglwys Bay. I attached a rope to a belt that was around the waist of the body and towed it to Cwm-yr-Eglwys Bay, from where we removed it to the Mortuary, Goodwick.

It was the body of a male, the face, right arm and both legs below the knee were missing. A small portion of U/pants and a portion of blue dungaree overall were still around the waist being held there by a blue web belt 1" wide, fastened with a metal buckle. The U/pants was of U.S. pattern, the material being of mercerised cotton.

On the third finger of the left hand was a metal signet ring the metal was silver and gold color, on the signet was the letter "M" above this letter was an Alladin lamp. Inscribed on the shank of the ring was the date 1939. 19 being on one side of the letter "M" and 39 on the other side. A maker's name inside the ring is "JESTENICK".

I notified the Naval authorities who endevoured to establish identity through the U.S. War Shipping and U.S. Navy at Cardiff. This without success. It is though that the body is one of those missing from the U.S. Liberty Ship "Danbeard".

The body was examined at Goodwick Mortuary at 2145 hrs, Tuesday, 16 Jan 1945 by Surgeon Lt. Charles Frederick Colville Parkinson, RNVR attached to Royal Marines. Trecvm (Statement attached)

The Clerk to Local Authority was notified.

On Saturday 20th inst at 1430 hrs, the body of the Unidentified seamen was buried at LLanwnda Cemetery in plot 610.

"Were identification discs found on the remains, were any personal effects found in the pockets of the deceased's dungarees, was it possible to obtain a dental chart and was one made, was it possible to obtain fingerprints and were prints made, did the dungarees or underclothes have any identifying laundry marks, were there any particularly significant personal characteristics, such as birth marks tattoos, etc, location where remains were found, condition of remains when found and estimated date of death".

2. It is requested please that if any of the required information is in your possession, this may be forwarded to me as soon as possible.

With reference to the attached letter dated 25th instant respecting the above mentioned matter.

Coords read North & East should read 465628 I have to report that with Pc 37 Thomas on the 16th January 1945, I recivered from the sea at Cwm-yr-Eglwys, Pembrokeshire. Map.Ref. Sheet 88/628465, the body of a male, the face, right arm and both legs and mercerised cotton underpants were still around the waist, held there by a webbing belt about 1 inch wide, fastened with a metal buckle. There were no marks of any description on the pieces of clothing, nor did they contain any personnel property.

The body was in a bad state of decomposition, the flesh was leaving the bones on the left hand and arm and it was impossible to take fingerprints. The face and jaw bones were missing.

The only personal property on the body was a ring on the third finger of the left hand. This I cut off the finger and it is forwarded herewith. It is a metal signet ring, silver and gold in color. On the ring is the letter "M", above this letter is an alladin lamp. Inscribed on the shank is the date 1939, 19 being on one side and of the letter "M" and 39 on the other side. The maker's mark inside the ring is "JESTENICK".

The body was examined at Goodwick Mortuary at 2130 hrs, Tues, 16 Jan 1945 by Surgeon Lt. Charles Frederick Colville Parkinson, RNVR attached to Royal Marines, Trecwn, and he made to me the following statement.

"About 2130 hrs, 16.1.45, I inspected the remains of the body of a man at Goodwick Mortuary. High height was approximately 5' 8". Reference is made to our memorandum to you of February 18, relating to correspondence from Mr. Hughes of the Recruitment and Manning Organization in London, in connection with the findings of a body which was presumed to be that of a member of the crew of the "Dan Beard". Reference is also made to Mr. Owen's letter to you dated March 23, 1946, which you referred to this office.

In order that Mr. Owen may be in a position to pursue the matter further, we are attaching copy of Mrs. Hughe's letter to Mr. Stone, dated October 15, 1945, with the attachment referred to by Mr. Hughes, including letter addressed to the Superintendent of the Police Station at Goodwick by the Chief Constable, dated July 29, 1945, which relates to a ring which was on a finger of the body which was found.

As indicated in our memorandum to you of February 18, the parents of James H. Feurtado, one of the seamen missing from the ss "Dan Beard", definitely identified the ring as the property of their son, and requested that if at all possible it be delivered to them.

Your representative in London may be able to contact the Surgeon Lt. Charles F.C. Parkinson, RNVR, or the police authorities in an effort to ascertan the present whereabouts of the ring and the probability of its being delivered to the parents of the deceased seaman.
