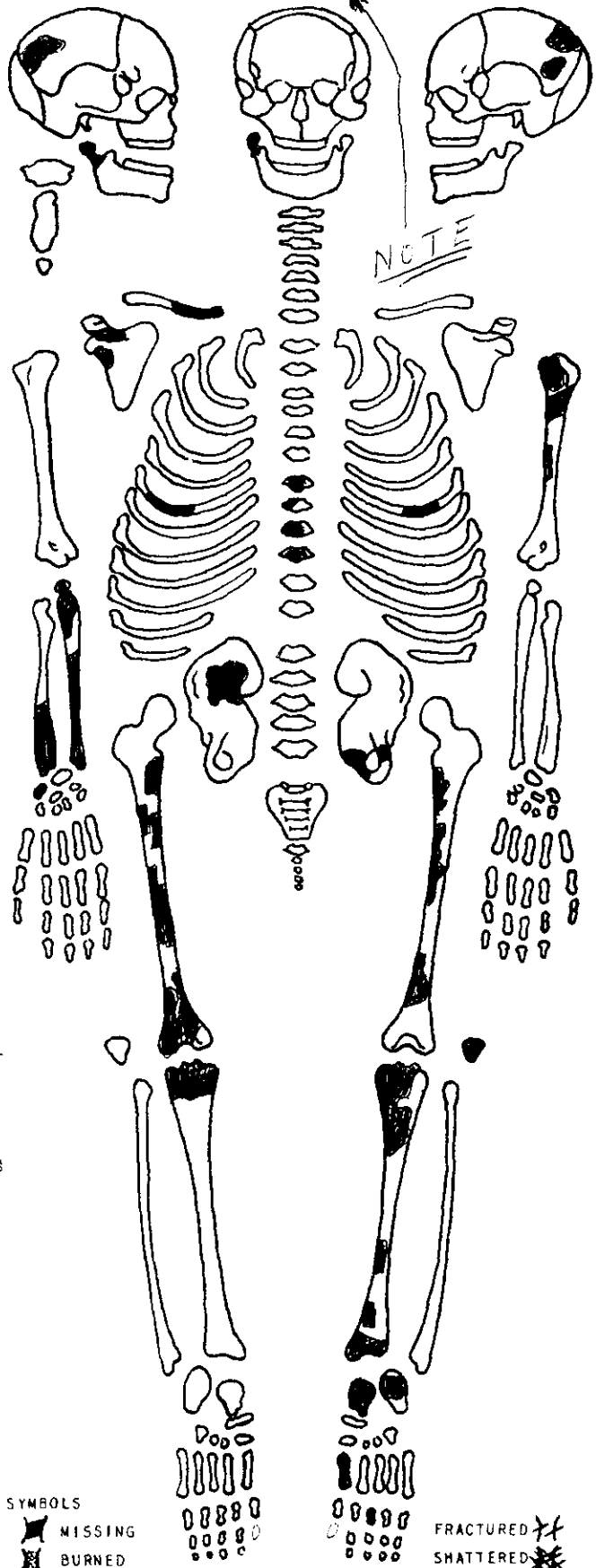

A Board of Officers appointed by paragraph 1, Division Order No. 4, dated 17 February 1959 (Tab A), convened at 1000 hours 14 MAY 1959, and after consideration of the following factors, approved the designation of SR #5034, Unknown X-70106 Frankfurt (MEDZ) Mausoleum, as CIL remains.

Remains designated SR #5034, Unknown X-70106, were discovered deep in a thick growth of grass and roots covering a ditch 200 meters from a road crossing of the railway line ROME-VELLETRI, approximately 6 kilometers W-SW of Lanuvio, Italy, 30 kilometers south of Rome. Recovery of the Unknown remains was reported by the Imperial War Graves Commission in England in December 1958, when two (2) Identification Tags inscribed "MOGUS, NICHOLAS V. 33699076" were forwarded to US Army QM Mortuary System, Europe. The ID tags showed evidence of being scorched.

In February 1959 a QM Mortuary official accepted custody of the remains being held at the civil cemetery of Lanuvio. Examination at Lanuvio revealed the presence of an American steel helmet, a bottle of Halazone water purification tablets, the front half of a left US service shoe, some non-issue mess utensils and a small quantity of charred human remains. An extensive search of the recovery area failed to uncover additional remains.

Processing at the Mortuary Identification Laboratory in Frankfurt (Ger.) disclosed only limited and inconclusive evidence concerning the physical characteristics. The charred and shattered condition of the remains indicated that the casualty probably died in a vehicle which exploded and burned. (Tab B)

Official records pertaining to Pfc Nicholas V. Mogus, Co C, 179th Infantry Regiment, 45th Division, reveal that he was held in a MIA status from 3 June 1944 until such absence was terminated 10 Oct 1944 when evidence considered sufficient to establish the fact of death was received from the North African Area.

Mrs. Nicholas M. Mogus, Mother of the EM wrote to Congressman Weiss on 10 June 1945 regarding her son's status. A portion of her letter is quoted below:

"...We received a letter from one of the boys in his outfit. In this letter the boy stated that he found my Son on the battlefield in a delirious condition. During the course of the battle the boys had to advance, so they took my Son and put him near a grape arbor, so that he would be safe until the medics came. Later the same evening the boys came back to the spot, and found that Nick had gone. They thought that

Nick had gotten up and wandered off, and might have been picked up by someone...I have reason to think that the boy is alive, and that he might have been shell shocked and wandered off without his identification tags..." (Tab C)

Although it would be difficult to prove or disprove the authenticity of this report, it is nevertheless in conflict with Statement of Circumstances surrounding the EM's disappearance which reveals that his organization was launching an attack on the town of Corioli, Italy at 1535 hours 3 June 1944. Eyewitnesses state "Our tanks were firing short rounds, one of which exploded near Pvt Mogus." The eyewitnesses believe that Pvt Mogus was killed in action. (Tab D)

Extensive searches were made by GRS personnel in the vicinity where Pfc Mogus was reported missing (or killed), but his identifiable remains were never recovered. A final search of the Lanuvio area was conducted in December 1947 with negative results (Tab E). As a result of the unsuccessful search, Findings of Nonrecoverability were approved by this Office 29 July 1949, and the NOK were advised 11 July 1949 that their son's remains were nonrecoverable.

On 19 October 1951 Mrs. Mogus wrote this Office saying, "...I will be most grateful to you if you will check your files to determine if his grave was ever found...From the information I have at the present time, I cannot feel you have definite proof of Nicholas' death..." She did not mention receipt of letter from this Office advising that his remains were nonrecoverable. (Tab F). This Office again communicated this information to Mrs. Mogus 9 November 1951, and in reference to this letter Mr. Mogus wired this Office 13 November 1951 stating that Mrs. Mogus was in a very critical mental and physical condition, and that he had all proof of it. (Tab G). There has been no additional correspondence with this Office since November 1951.


The Anthropological Findings pertaining to Unknown X-70106 reveal a similarity to physical data recorded for Pfc Mogus; however, the absence of evidence of a more conclusive nature precludes an irrefutable association. (Tab H).


Reference records maintained in this Office indicate that many unknown remains recovered from the Lanuvio area have been approved UNIDENTIFIABLE for lack of sufficient identifying data; therefore, the possibility that Pfc Mogus' remains, or portions of his remains, may have been previously recovered and buried as UNKNOWN cannot be discounted.


Inasmuch as the small quantity of remains designated Unknown X-70106 precludes association beyond a reasonable doubt, and in view of the lapse of time, it is believed that the anxiety of the next of kin would not be alleviated by the knowledge that Identification Tags of their son had been recovered with charred fragments of remains which afford little basis for physical comparison. It is therefore considered that the well-being of the next of kin would best be served by the determination that the status of Pfc Nicholas V. Mogus should remain NONRECOVERABLE.

Based on the foregoing, it is recommended that SR #5034, Unknown X-70106 Frankfurt (MEDZ) Mausoleum be approved as CIL remains, and that disposition be made in accordance with established policy.



SUBJECT: Memorial Division Board of Review

1. Establishment. Under provisions of AR 15-6, dated 25 July 1955, there is hereby established the Memorial Division Board of Review (hereinafter referred to as the Board) to assist the Chief, Memorial Division, in the resolution of special cases which involve the identifiability, nonidentifiability, or nonrecoverability of the remains of deceased persons.

2. Membership. The Board will consist of not less than 3 officers. The senior member present will serve as President of the Board. One member, as designated by the president, will act as recorder for the Board and will be responsible for the documentation of the findings of the Board. A majority of the members of the Board will constitute a quorum.

3. Authority. In the resolution of all cases referred to in paragraph 1 above, the Board will serve as the reviewing channel between the operating Branch and the Division Chief. The Board is authorized to review all such cases as are referred through it to the Division Chief. After documentation of its findings, the Board will recommend the approval of the Division Chief or his designated representative or return the case to the operating branch for reconsideration of its determinations.

4. Duties. The Board is charged with the following duties and responsibilities:

a. Establish a set of standards and procedures to determine the adequacy, authenticity, and completeness of records which serve as an operating basis for the Board.

b. Review case history reports concerning the identifiability of recovered remains as submitted by the operating branch.

c. Review case history reports concerning the nonidentifiability of individual recovered remains and the nonidentifiability of individual remains from group recoveries.

d. Review case history reports concerning the nonrecoverability of remains of persons in the following categories:

(1) Persons for whom The Adjutant General has issued presumptive findings of death.

(2) Persons known to be in a KIA status, whose remains, because of the circumstances of death, are determined to be nonrecoverable.

(3) Persons whose remains are officially reported lost at sea.

e. Based upon its findings, either recommend the approval of the Division Chief, or return the case to the operating branch for further reconsideration of the case.

5. Convening of the Board. The Board will convene at the time and place designated by the president and will adjourn at his direction.

6. Rescission. Memorial Division Order No. 29, dated 19 September 1957, Subject: Memorial Division Board of Review, is rescinded.





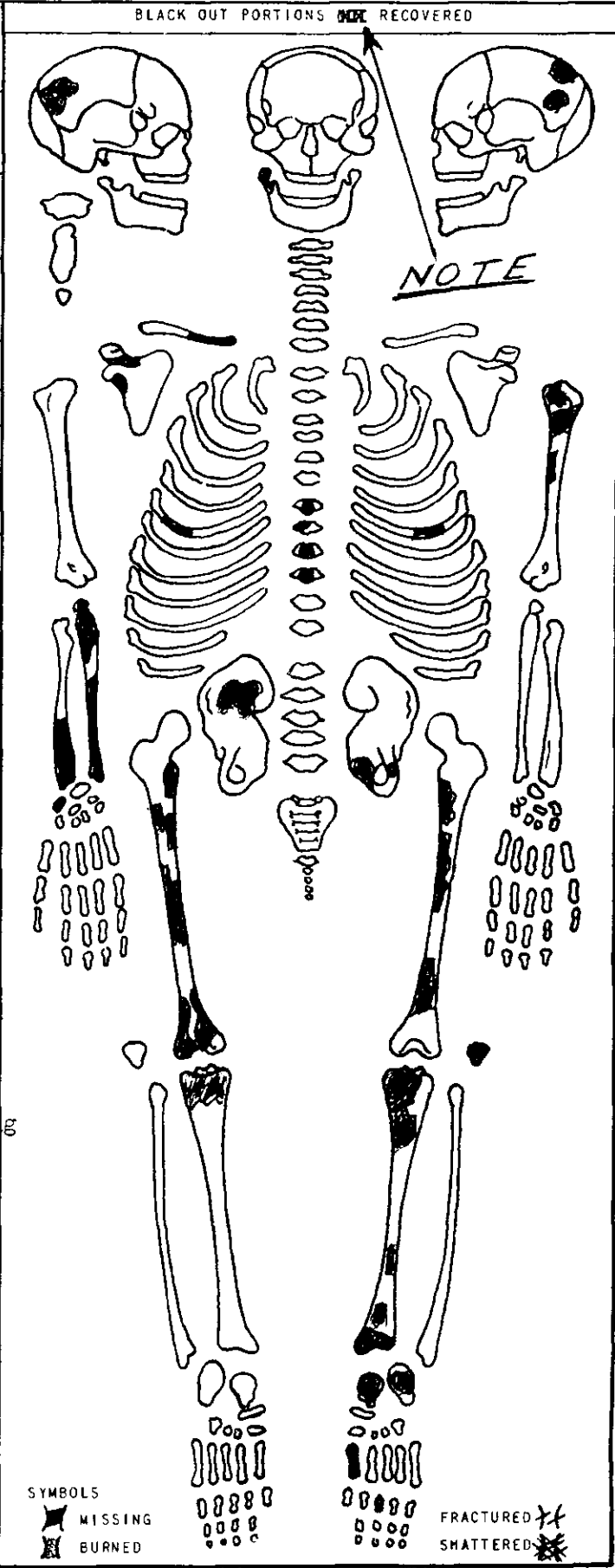

REPORT OF RECOVERY AND LABORATORY EXAMINATION OF  
WORLD WAR II REMAINS

CASE: Recovery of WWII Remains near Lanuvio, Italy

1. Correspondence received from the Imperial War Graves Commission in England indicated that the Italian authorities had recovered a remains from an isolated burial 200 meters from a road crossing of the railway line ROME-VELLETRI, approximately 30 kilometers south of Rome. It was reported that a steel helmet had been found with the remains and two (2) identity disks were forwarded which were also found with the remains. The identification tags bear the inscription: "MOGUS, NICHOLAS V. 33699076 T-43 - A - C". Information received from OQMG indicates the remains of Nicholas V. Mogus 33699076 were declared nonrecoverable. It was noted that the identification tags showed evidence of being scorched.

2. The undersigned proceeded to the civil cemetery of Velletri as directed in the correspondence but some uncertainty was found there as to which remains were involved. After examining two remains left at the cemetery by the German War Graves Commission it was determined that one had been buried much longer than a WW II casualty and the other had dental characteristics which were negative for an American military casualty. When it was learned that the German Team had removed a third remains it was believed that possibly an error had been made by the Germans. On contacting the local Carabinieri it was determined that the U.S. recovery was actually being held at the civil cemetery of Lanuvio (sheet 150/91-41).

3. Examination of the remains at Lanuvio revealed the presence of an American steel helmet, a bottle of Halazone water purification tablets, the front half of a left US service shoe, some rusted non-issue mess utensils and a small quantity of charred human remains. The local policeman who had witnessed the actual recovery was questioned concerning the possibility of finding additional remains at the site of recovery. He indicated that a determined search had been made over the surrounding area but no additional portions could be found. A visit was then made to the recovery site where a heavy and thick growth of grass and old roots covered a ditch and bank separating a path from a large cultivated field. It was indicated that the remains had been found deep in the grass covering the bank. Probing of the area showed no signs of recent digging and extensive searching of the grassy slope failed to uncover additional portions. A sketch was made of the area and is attached to this report as exhibit A.

CASE: Recovery of WWII Remains near Lanuvio, Italy

4. The remains were designated SR #5034 and removed to the Mortuary Identification Lab in Frankfurt/Main, Germany. A tentative unknown number has been assigned this case as follows:


Subject remains are skeletal, shattered and severely charred. The portions recovered offer only limited and inconclusive evidence concerning the age and height. Observations concerning these two characteristics were made as follows:

- a. All long bone epiphyses are completely joined this indicating a minimum age of 20 years. A trace of the epiphysial line is noted at the distal tip of the right radius which would normally indicate a maximum age of 22 years.
- b. The charred sternal tip of the clavicle appears as though the epiphysis had never become united. This generally indicates a maximum age of 22 years.
- c. The fragment of parietal bone with a one-inch section of open sagittal suture is another indication of an age in the early twenties but is not conclusive in itself due to the many inconsistencies in the rates of skull suture closure.
- d. The estimated height is derived from the minimum possible measurement of a nearly complete right ulna and gives a minimum height of 68 1/8". It is believed that the actual height would be greater than this and is more likely 69" or 70".



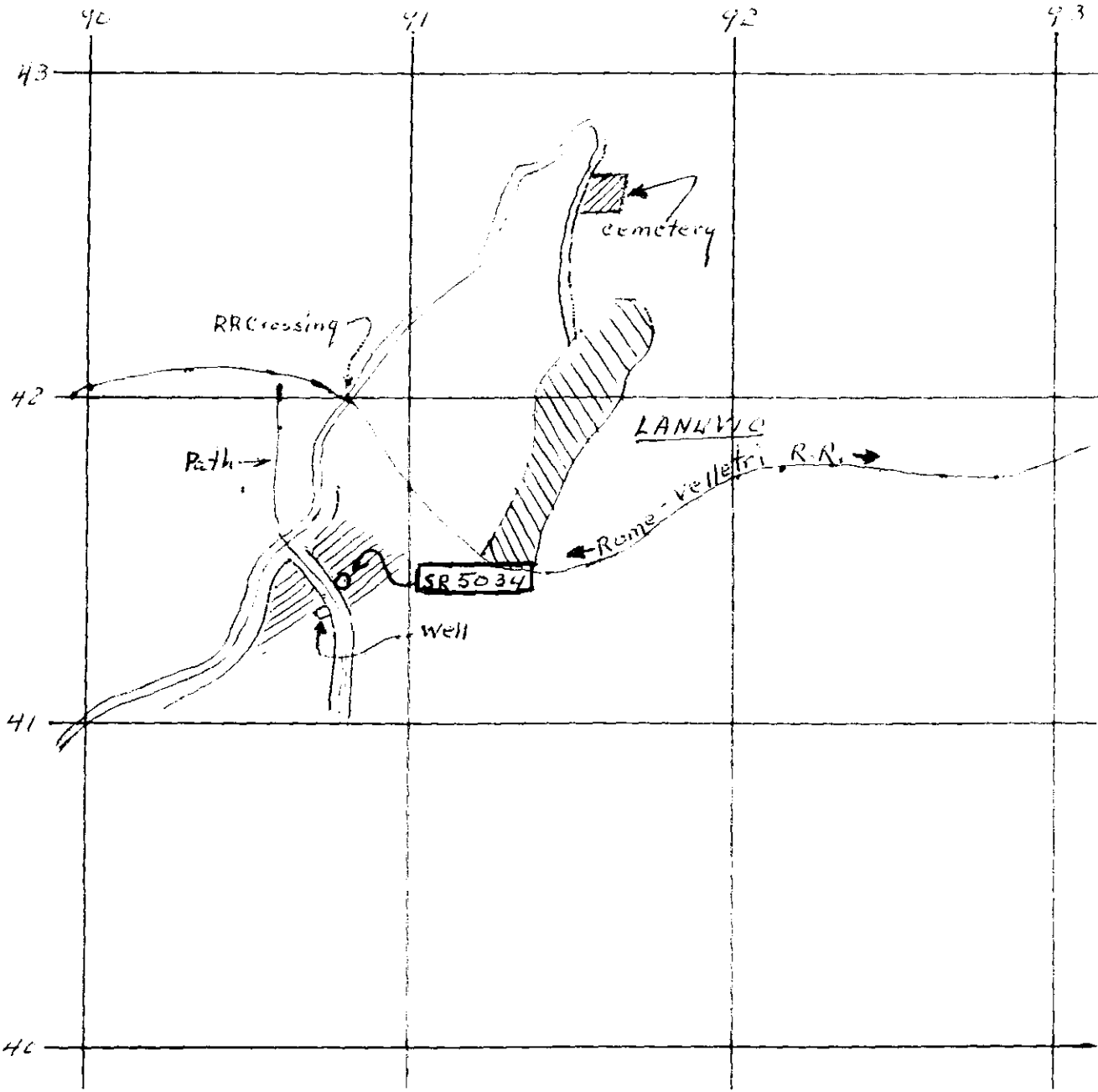

ANZIO - Story of the 45th Infantry Division

...Elements of the 45th landed at Anzio January 22. Nine days later, the entire division was committed. Anzio was flat. It was open to complete daytime observation because the German perimeter defense was built along the hills surroundin the beachhead. Nazis perched on these hills, spitting shells from semi-circular vantage points. THUNDERBIRD men dived for foxholes, stayed there...

By the first week in February, beachhead forces had pushed their lines as far out as their small numbers would permit. Hastily-summoned German reserves forged a steel ring around the beachhead. This was to be the scene of four months of stubborn warfare. Then, the Nazi worm turned.

Attempting to hurl Allied beachhead forces into the sea, the enemy unleashed three major counter-attacks. From Feb 16 to 19, the 45th Div. sector was subjected to wave after wave of Germany infantry and tanks that poured down the Albano-Anzio road like steam through a whistle. Elements identified as six different divisions were thrown into the battle.

Much of this fighting was in the "Factory" (Carroceto) area. Casualties were heavy. Thunderbird artillery, armor and tankdestroyer units accomplished magnificent results in helping stave off the threat to the beachhead. Infantrymen clung tenaciously to each dip in the ground, each furrow, each rock.

...German field orders, it was discovered later, had called for complete annihilation of the division by Feb 18. Although the 45th did suffer heavy losses, the enemy was forced to halt his attacks. Lines became stabilized again...

On May 23, after artillery and the Air Corps had combined to saturate the area, the division jumped off--destination: Rome. ...For the next 12 days, Thunderbird pressure on the retreating Germans never lagged. The breakthrough became a rout. Three days later, when beachhead troops contacted doughs from the Cassino front, Nazis were falling back in slap-happy disorganization....

The 45th had been in Anzio foxholes for a long, frustrated period. Here, at last, was the chance to move. Infantrymen sighed relief at being able to stand up again during daylight hours. Artillery displaced time and again as it leap-frogged in supprot of attacking refflemen. Corioli, Campoleone fell before the advance; Hill K-9 was captured....

For the 45th Div., the push on Rome climaxed the long Italian siege that began back in Sicily. On June 6, after reaching the historic hills on the far side, the division was placed in reserve and, a few days later, sent to Battipaglia for a well-deserved rest...

(Extract)

American Forces in Action - ANZIO BEACHHEAD - The Breakthrough

23 May - 4 June 1944: - On 26 May General Clark issued new orders to VI Corps which reshaped the nature and direction of its attack...Now, the weight of the VI Corps drive was to be shifted to the west of Colli Laziali, to seize a line from the Factory through Campoleone to LANUVIO. The 34th Division would advance northwest from Velletri (which was stubbornly defended by the enemy) toward LANUVIO, while the 45th Division attacked toward Campoleone Station. Initially, the 1st Armored Division was allotted the task of attacking Velletri; subsequently (28th May) it was shifted to the left flank to strengthen the attack of the 45th Division...On 30 May the Fifth Army drive appeared to have been stalled. On the left flank west of Colli Laziali, the 1st Armored Division and the 45th had fought bitterly but unsuccessfully along the Albano road above Campoleone all day; and the attack of the 34th Division before Lanuvia had been stopped on 29 May...On the night of 2-3 June the main enemy forces hurriedly withdrew northward, leaving only scattered rear guards to impede the Fifth Army's advance into Rome. On 3 June all units of the Fifth Army hastened after the retreating enemy, and at 0800 on the morning of 4 June the first American troops reached the outskirts of Rome...



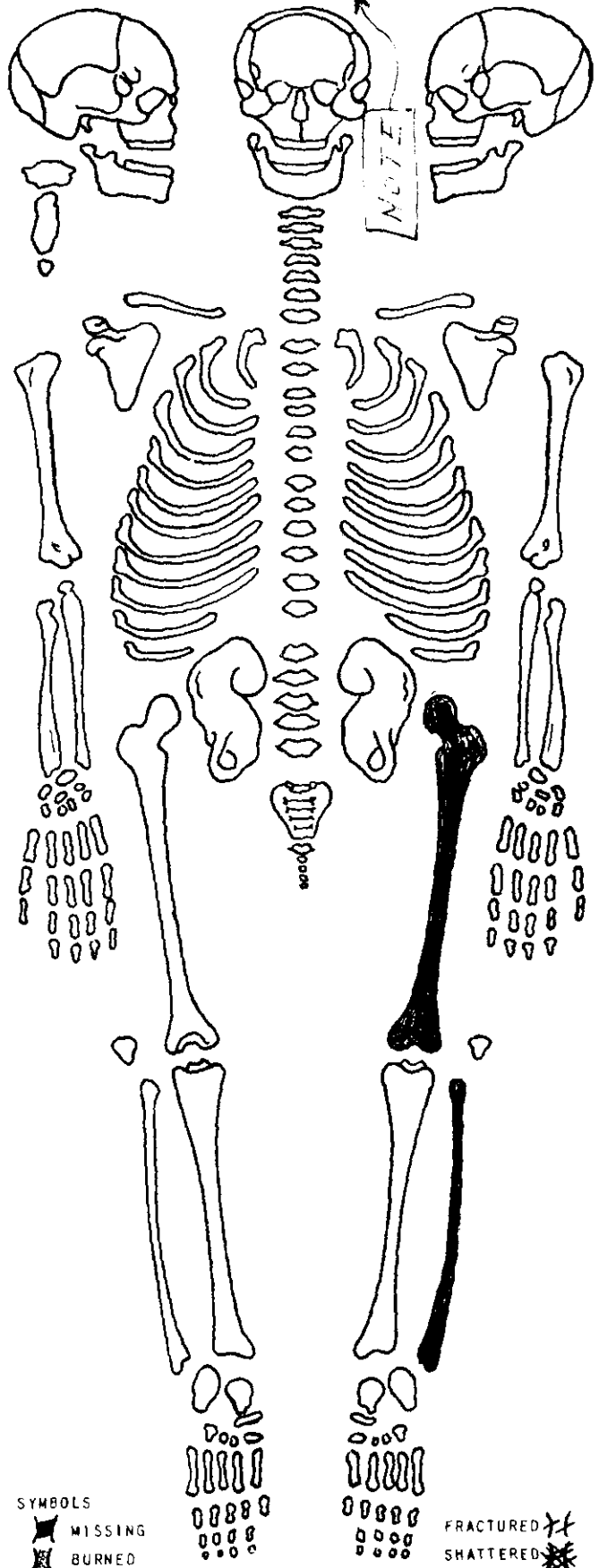



A Board of Officers appointed by paragraph 1, Division Order No. 13, dated 24 October 1953, (Tab A), convened at 1300 hours 30 March 1959, and after consideration of the following factors, approved the designation of SR #1053, Unknown K-9307 Frankfurt Mausoleum as OIL remains.

Remains designated SR #1053, Unknown K-9307 Frankfurt Mausoleum, were recovered from the Baltic Sea in the vicinity of Fehmarn Island (N-55/33; Germany) 4 March 1953. Report of Investigation (Tab F) indicates that according to Peter Police Of Heiligenhafen, Germany, the remains were discovered by a fisherman when he lowered his trawls east of Fehmarn Island (Fehmarn Island approximately 54°30' - 11°10'E). When the nets were brought to the surface the partial remains were discovered, together with an open parachute and an American type electrically heated flying suit.

The remains were taken into custody by a representative of Mortuary System, Europe, 23 April 1953. Laboratory processing revealed that the recovered remains consisted of one left femur and one left fibula. There were no teeth or vital portions of remains recovered. No identifying markings were found on the clothing and equipment received. (Tab C)

Investigation of air Corps casualties sustained in the vicinity of Fehmarn Island disclosed that remains identified as Walter L. Peterson, 14076636, a crewmember of A/C B-17 #42-29701 which crashed over Kiel Bay 19 May 1943 were recovered from a civilian cemetery at Heiligenhafen, Germany. Six other American accidents removed from Heiligenhafen cemetery have been identified. They were not members of Peterson's crew. Six crewmembers of A/C #42-29701 have been declared Nonrecoverable. Three crewmembers who parachuted from the damaged plane were captured by the enemy and subsequently repatriated.

The area from which Unknown K-9307 was recovered suggests that the incomplete remains may possibly be those of one of the missing crewmembers of A/C #42-29701; however, there is no identifying media present whereby an association can be made. (Tab C)

In view of the above, it is recommended that Unknown K-9307 Frankfurt Mausoleum be declared OIL remains, and that disposition be made in accordance with OIG policy.

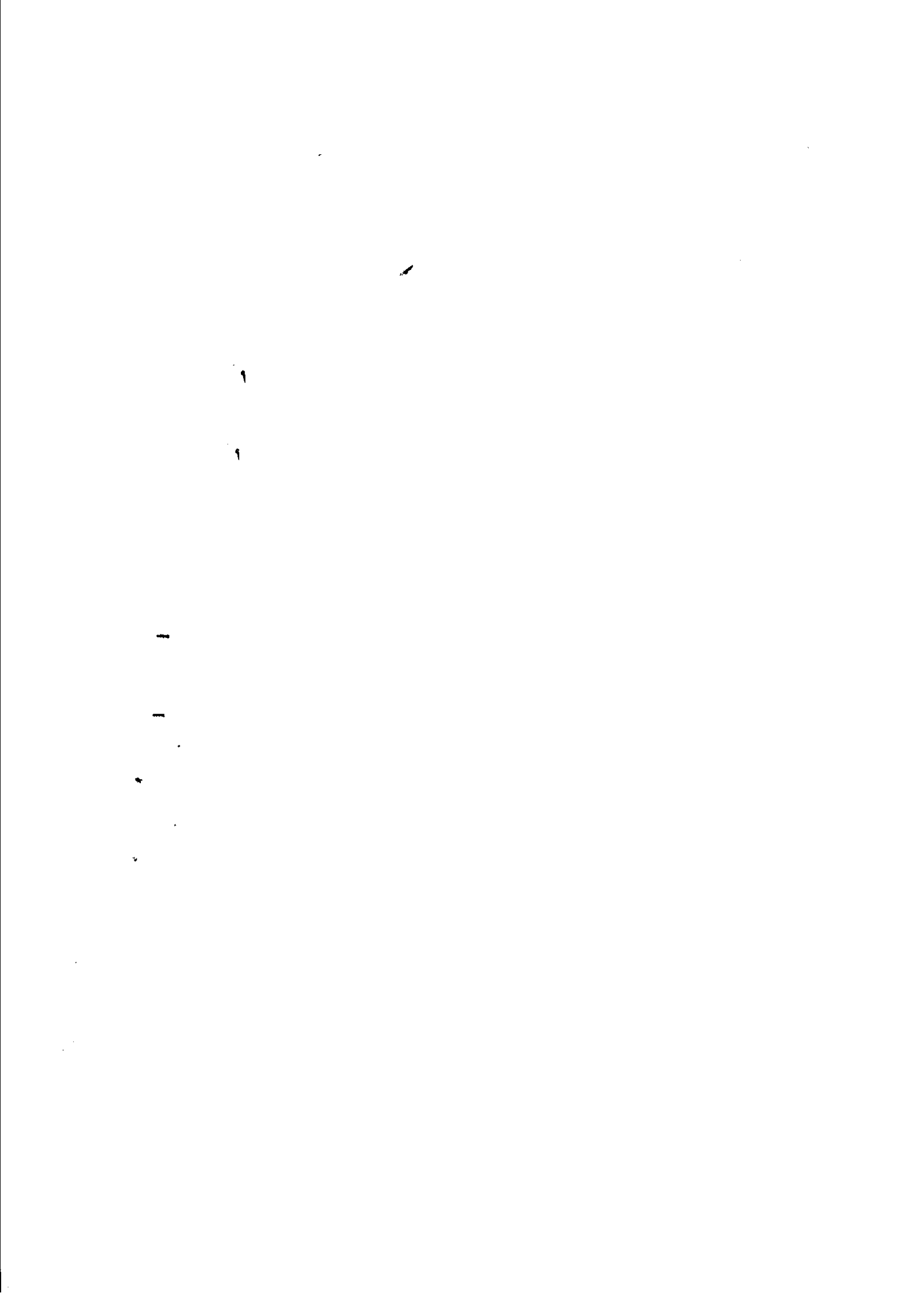

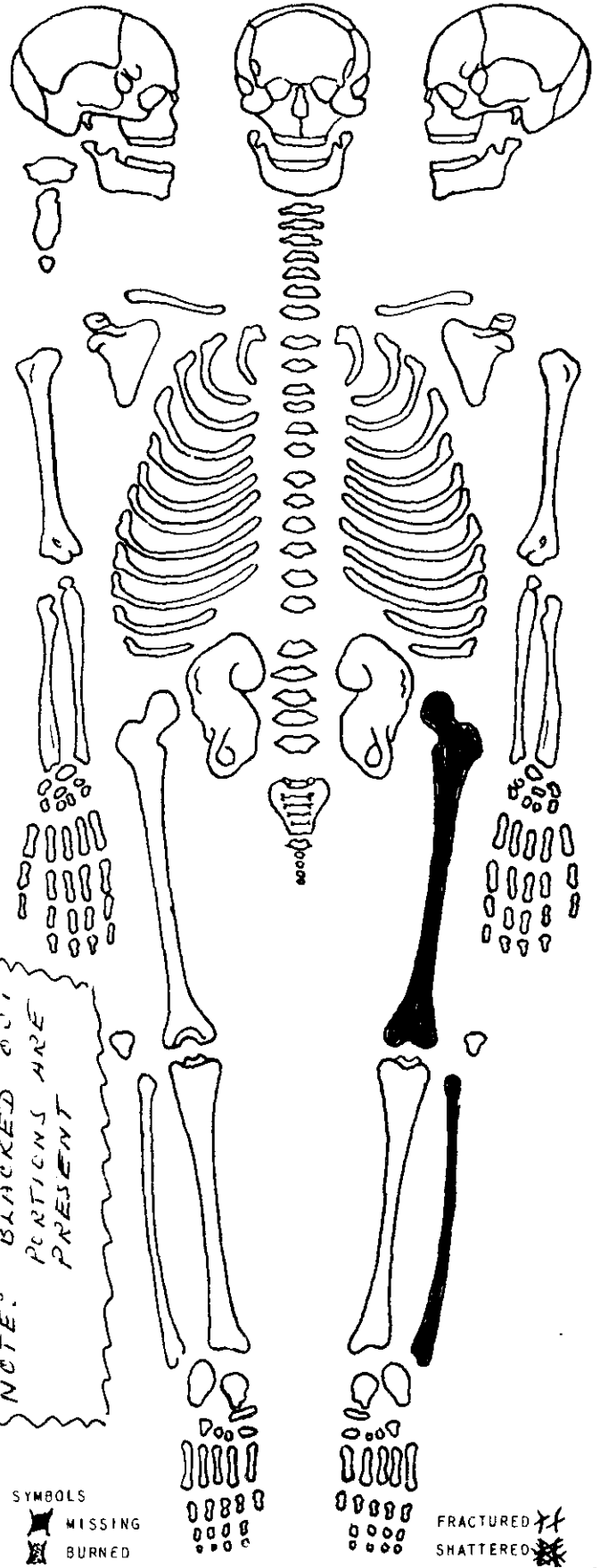

REPORT OF INVESTIGATION

Information was received from the Police Headquarters of Oldenburg/Holstein that remains believed to be those of an American deceased who had been recovered by a Herr Zickermann, owner of a fishing vessel.

According to the Water Police of Heiligenhafen (M55/D13) Germany, the remains were received from the fishing cutter "Bux 3". Herr Zickermann stated that on 4 March 1958 he lowered the dragnets in the vicinity of Buoy 6-A, located East of Fehmarn Island (M55/D34) and proceeded along fishing lane # 1 in a Southeast course and returning over fishing lane #13 to Buoy 6A. When the nets were brought to the surface the partial remains were discovered, a complete parachute (open) and remnants of an American type electrically heated flying suit were also recovered.

Remains were taken into custody on 28 April 1958 and assigned Search and Recovery # 1053.
