

X-6192 was recovered from an ammunition dump explosion at Ludres, (Meurthe & Moselle) near . Nancy, France on 2 January 1945. These cases were submitted as the only recoverable remains of three casualties from this explesion. This identification has been rejected by OQMG. However as this unknown is definitely from this explesion and no ether association is possible; and there is evidently no complete list of the casualties; this case is hereby submitted as: UNIDENTIFIABLE.

The above named enlisted men were all members of the 570th ordnance Ammunition Company. They were all killed in the explosion of Army Ammunition Depot No 31 at Ludres near Nancy, Meurthe and Moselle, France on 2 January 1945. This explosion was due to enemy action.

Nine white personnel as well as the above named negro soldiers died in the explosion. Pfc Andrew M. MACK, 35868755 also a member of the same company was found intact and was interred at USMC, Hamm, Luxemburg.

All the above named except Sgt HINES, and Pfcs KELSO and PITTS have been identified. This case was investigated at the time of the accident and re-investigated by AGRC. No other remains have been recovered that can be associated with the three casualties. Inhabitants of the area who were the first on the scene of the accident stated that only one Negro soldier remained intact after the explosion and that the pthers were blown to bits by the terrific impact.

Estimated place and date of death of X-6192 is in agreement with the KIA casualty listing for the above individuals. Therefore X-6192 is the only recoverable remains of the last three casualties of this explosion to be identified.

When found, the body was half covered with ground, so he couldnot say whether the body was intact or not; he didnot find any papers or identification tags on him.

- 1. Refer letter this unit, subj: Disposition of Remains, dated 18 May 1945, andressed to your headquarters regarding graves location of Sgt James L. Hines, 36566053, Pfc Neal Kelso, 34528653, and Pfc Emanuel Pitts, 36389883, all 570th Ordnance Ammunition Company, all killed as a result of enemy action on 2 January 1945 at Army Ammunition Depot #31.
- 2. As stated in letter mentioned above, a request for information on graves location of the above 3 EM was made to the 609th QM Graves Registration Company, a copy of their reply is herein inclosed.
- 3.' The undersigned is in disagreement with par. 5 of inclosure. He examined before the bodies were removed the scene of the explosion where death occurred and saw small bits of bone and flesh; some of which could be lidentified as portions of colored personnel and others as white personnel. There too were portions of bodies so badly charred and mutilated and small that race or color of the individual could not be determined.
- 4. Verbal information was received indirectly from the Graves Registration Co. that the one body found and identified (Pfc Andrew M. Mack 35868755) and also the portions of other bodies found would be buried in Luxembourg.
- 5. It may be possible that the small remaining portions of the bodies of the 3 EM in question were buried along with those of the approximate 9 enlisted white personnel also killed by the explosion at Army Ammunition Depot #31.

STATELENT

29 May 1945.

On or about 5 January 1945, I was detailed to drive S/Sgt Essmann and Sgt. Stevens to the site of an explosion in an ammunition dump near Ludres, France. While there, I helped them in a search of the area. Troops already there knew the location of the few large portions of bodies and pointed them out. We then thoroughly searched the area of the explosion as far all around as there was any debris from the explosion, such as wood, metal, and dirt. There was a light covering of snow on the ground, about two inches thick and hard crusted as I remember.

The largest piece of flesh found at any distance was about 150 yards distant from the craters caused by the explosion. Beyond that distance only a few small pieces of flesh were found.

We picked up all pieces of flesh found and brought them back to the cemetery at Hamm, Luxembourg for further identification.

The body of one colored soldier was found near a 6x6 on the road near the explosion. All other portions of bodies which I noted seemed to be of white soldiers.

STATEMENT

29 May 1945.

On or about 4 January 1945, along with S/Sgt Robert A. Essmann and Sgt. Harry G. Ethell of this organization, I was detailed to go to the site of an explosion in an ammunition dump near Ludres, France and make a search of the area for bodies or parts of bodies of personnel killed in the explosion.

Each man in the detail searched the whole area within a radius of at least 300 yards of the explosion. One body, identified by dog tags as MACK, Andrew M., 35868755, was found covered with blankets near the truck. We found several other parts of bodies around the area, but all were of white personnel, all having some pieces of white skin remaining. All portions found showed powder burns where they had been torn from the body. The lower part of one white body was found in one of the craters caused by the explosion. Both the wreckage of the 6x6 truck and jeep in the middle of the explosion were worked thoroughly in an effort to locate any bodies or parts of bodies. Nothing of that nature was found in either. The body of MACK was found behind the truck setting beside the road about 100 yards from the site of the explosion. He had apparently been killed by fragments from the explosion having multiple wounds including a long gash extending from the left shoulder into the left chest.

The body of MACK was later disinterred to determine whether any portions of loose flesh were buried with the body. I opened the mattress cover and checked the remains. Captain Passman also checked. There were no separated or loose portions of bodies buried with that of MACK.

STATEMENT

29 May 1945.

With Sergeants Harry Ethell and Albert Stevens of this company, I was detailed on or about 4 January 1945 to go to the scene of an explosion in an ammunition dump near Ludres, France and make a thorough search of the area of and surrounding the explosion.

When we arrived we found the intact body of Mack partly under a 6x6 on the road about 50 feet from where the frames of a jeep and 6x6 lay, the jeep covered by mud from the explosion.

About ten feet from the jeep we uncovered a body of a white soldier. East of the wreckage was found the leg up to the hip of one body and the upper torso without head of another body, covered with powder burns so as to appear colored, but when turned over the skin proved to be white.

We searched all shell craters and found a lower torso in about the third one searched. We then searched the area for a radius of about 300 to 400 yards from the scene of the explosion. Found was a foot, a larger piece of unidentifiable flesh and several small pieces of flesh, all of which had portions of white skin.

- 4. Investigation by the Inspector Generals Office as reported to Commanding General, Third United States Army, 15 January 1945 states in paragraph 11 "Actual identification of the bodies was almost impossible because the blast had decapitated some of the victims and other bodies disappeared."
- 5. This organization sent a special detail to the scene of the explosion where they made a complete search of the area, finding in addition to the intact body of Mack, bodies or portions of bodies of white personnel only.

- 1. In reply to two separate letters, file AG 293.9-GNMCQ-2, your headquarters, subj. same as above, dated 15 May 1945, one requesting information on burial of James L. Hines, Sgt. 36566053, and one on Neal Kelso, 34586553, and one letter your headquarters dated 16 May 1945 regarding burial of Emenuel Pitts, 36389883, all of the 570th Ord. Am. Co., the following is herein submitted:
- 2. Per verbal information originating with 609th QM Graves Registration Co., APO 403, US Army, the mutilated remains of the 3 above EM were properly buried in a common grave at the US Military Cemetery in Hamm, Luxembourg, on 5 January 1945. The grave number, row number, and plot number are unknown. Written request for the above was made by this unit to the 609th QM Gr. Reg. Co., on 11 Jan. 1945, to which no reply has been received. A tracer to the request has since been forwarded.
- 3. Burial was performed 5 January 1945 and report was to have been submitted by the indicated graves registration company. Letter forcequest of copy of report was submitted 11 January 1945 by this unit.
- 4. Death occurred on 2 January 1945 near Ludres, France, within Army Ammunition Depot #31. In addition to the casualty of the 3 indicated EM Sgt James L. Hines, Pfc Neal Kelso, and Pfc Emanuel Pitts, on 2 January 1945 at AAD#31, Pfc Andrew W. Mack, 35868755, 570th Ord. Am. Co. was also killed. Pfc Mack's body, though badly mutilated, was the only one which could be identified. He was buried 5 January 1945, at US Military Cemetery in Hamm, Luxembourg. His grave number is 124, row no. 5, plot no. T. This information on Pfc Mack is per the only Report of Burial by the 609th Gr. Reg. Co.
- 5. The cause of the death was an explosion, of ammunition (Engineer Demolition Material) due to enemy action as determined by Report of Investigation by the Inspector General's Department, your headquarters, 22 January 1945. An inspection of the area or scene of the explosion by the undersigned immediately after the mishap revealed that all bodies but that of Pfc Mack were blown to bits. There remained only small segments of skin and/or bone scattered over a wide area. It was impossible to determine which segment was the remains of any individual due to their smallness in size and number all as a result of the terrible force of the explosion.

As soon as this organization receives reply to its tracer letter to the 609th Gr. Reg. Co., regarding graves of Sgt Hines, Pfc Kelso, and Pfc Pitts, it will forward the same to your headquarters.

- 1. A detail from this organization consisting of S/Sgt Robert A. Essmann and Sgt. Albert Stevens, Medical Personnel, and Sgt. Harry G. Ethell were sent to search the area of the explosion near Ludres, France and to recover all remains that could be found in the vicinity. Statements of these men are attached.
- 2. All the remains which were found were brought to the cemetery at Hamm, Luxembourg and a careful examination was made to discover any remaining portions of colored soldiers other than the body of MACK, since it was known by this organization that three other colored personnel, HIMES, KELSO, and PITTS were reported killed in the explosion. No other colored remains were found. Later the body of MACK was disinterred and again no loose portions of colored remains were discovered.
- 3. It is believed the bodies of HINES, KELSO, and PITTS were highly disintegrated, that a thorough search was made for their remains but that small fragments of their bodies may have been scattered and likely covered by debris or otherwise removed from sight or detection at the time the area was searched.

STATEMENT

I undersigned, CHONE Charles, living at Ludres, M-et-M, France, certify that I found the body of an American soldier on Jan. 2nd, 1945, this soldier having been killed by an Ammunition Explosion the same day at the place called Blasserue, in the community of Ludres.

Thile loading ammunition, a jeep hit a can of Explosive, and about 12 American soldiers were torn up by the explosion; all I could find on investigating the place of the accident was a partially torn up body of an American soldier, who seemed to be a negro. I could not identify him, as I didnot find any personal papers or identification tags, which may still be on the body.

With the help of Mr.LEDUC and my father, Mr.Francois CHONE we buried the body, who was already half-covered with ground, on Jan. 10, 1945.

I, the undersigned, CHONE Henri, deputy mayor of LUDRET declare that some days after the explosion of the American explosives depot on 2 January 1945, we found several rests of human bodies of a soldier which had been left behind and which we had covered with earth. This soldier was removed in 1946 together with the other scattered remains to the American cemetery of Epinal (*)

It is not possible that at the present time there are still bodies left in the territory where the explosion took place because the field has been turned over and leveled.

To my knowledge there are no mines or American explosives left in the territory of the commune of Ludres nor any remains of soldiers.
