Identification photos are taken, of all military as well as civilian employes. Shot on 35 millimeter film, they are sometimes enlarged slightly before being fastened to ID cards. Identification photography is an important function of the lab.

Also important is the taking and processing of pictures for release to newspapers. Through the Public Information Office, Signal Corps photos reach newspapers in all parts of the United States. showing readers what life is like at Camp Roberts. Most of the photographs in this newspaper are the work of Signal Corps photographers working in the photo lab. Photographs of this nature keep the lab busy, since great speed is needed to meet publication deadlines.

A little more relaxing is the work done by the lab for the District Engineers, showing progress of construction work being done at Camp Roberts. This is an example of the army's use of photographs as a means of keeping infallible records. By glancing at a Signal Corps photo, highbrass can see what has been done at the "sweat-and-toil" level of

The credit for the work being done here goes to a well-integrated team supervised by Lt. O. A. Rice, and a well-equipped laboratory.

While Lt. Rice is the officer in charge, a great deal of the direct supervision is handled by Sfe Willie Welch, the Sergeant Major. Sixteen people work under him in the various departments.

Nine photographers stand ready each morning at 0730 with their shutters cocked for action, waiting for assignments. Others work in the darkroom, developing film, Dear Sam: making and enlarging prints; and and caption the finished products The staff includes two Wac laboratory girls and one civilian
