



13 New Armories Slated For Army Reserve Corps

Washington-Plans for construction of Army Organized Reserve Corps armories in thirteen cities, part of a long-range program designed to establish facilities for Reserve units, have been announced by the Department of

Design and construction of the thirteen armories will cost approximately \$4,000,000. This construction is part of the facilities expansion program of the Organized Reserve Corps. An earlier armory program of 44 armories, on which construction was started last year, has been completed.

This construction will be under jurisdiction of the Army Corps of Engineers. Army Organized Reserve Corps units are currently using inadequate or unsuitable space in the cities where construction is planned.

Train's Sgt. Wins America's Second Highest Award

America's second highest military honor was awarded to Sgt. Gerald L. Dilley last week during a review by the troops of Division Trains, 7th Armored Division.

Sgt. Dilley, who describes his extraordinary heroism as "just an attack," was presented with the Distinguished Service Cross by Brig. Gen Frank

H. Partridge, commanding general of the 7th Armored Division. The citation read at the cerenonies elaborated on the "attack". On January 30, 1951 in Korea, Sgt. Dilley, then a Corporal, a member of Co. B, 19th Infantry Regiment, 24th Division, was attacking a firmly entrenched enemy position. His squad leader was wounded and evacuated. Cpl. Dil-

ley, painfully wounded himself, took charge of the squad, and continued the attack. A grenade explosion knocked him down a hundred foot hill. Bruised and battered, Sgt. Dilley climbed back and continued to lead his squad. Working his way forward to two remaining machine gun positions, he was wounder again by machine gun fire. Sgt. Dilley continued forward, moved

Scientists Check Weapon Uses In

The technicians - design and production engineers and physicists-made the trip to inspect the operation of the weapons used by today's infantryman, particularly rocket-type equipment.

The 7th Armored Division's Chief of Faculty, Lieutenant Colonel Jack L. Weigand, heading up a staff of enlisted and officer experts in all types of infantry weapons, put on a field demonstration of ten types of combat arms

Live-fire displays were made on the 57 and 75 millimeter recoilless rifles, the 2.36 and 3.5 rockets, the portable flame thrower, hand and rifle grenades, 60 and 81 millimeter mortar, and the 4.2 inch chemical mortar.

The scientists, who are among America's top experts on rocket weapons, wanted to see how the front-line soldier makes use of the arms placed at his disposal. Col. Neigard's staff, which includes a good percentage of combat veterans, is responsible for the in-struction of all the trainees who pass through this installation's


