





Practice Democracy In 1952 Your Vote Is Freedom's Key

This voting information applies to Armed Forces personnel, dependents residing with Armed Forces personnel and U. S. citizens attached to and serving with the U.S. Armed Forces beyond the continental limits of the U.S., unless otherwise specified. These persons include civilians employed by the Department of the Army. Navy, and Air Force, the Marine Corps and the Coast Guard; and personnel of the American Red Cross and USO.

MINNESOTA
(The Gopher State)
Qualifications for Voting

1. Must be at least 21 years of age on the day following election.
2. Must be a U. S. citizen having resided in the State of Minnesota for a period of six months and in the election districts for 30 days.
3. Must be a registered voter, if residence is in city or willage having a population of 10,000 or more.

Registration

Registration

1. Registration is permanent unless a person has failed to vote at least once during two consecutive years in which elections were held.


2. Any qualified person may register by absentee process by requesting a Registration Application Form from the city clerk or the commissioner of registration, county of Minnesota residence, at least 50 days in advance of election. Form must be returned to election. Form must be returned to election.

Obtaining Ballots and Voting

Obtaining Ballots and Voting

1. Members of the Armed Forces and "certain Merchant Marine personnel" may make application for absentee ballots for use in any election by mailing Federal Post Card Application (Standard Form 76) to county auditor, county of Minnessota residence, as early as 30 days in advance of election. Marked ballots must be reveived by election judges not later than day of election.

2. Any other qualified person may also vote by absentee ballot, provided he is within the continental limits of the U. S. Such a voter should have a member of his immediate family make application for ballot at county of residence. Application will be accepted as early as 30 days before election and marked ballot must be received by proper official not later than election day.

SOUTH DAKOTA

(The Coyote State)
Qualifications for Voting

1. Must be at least 21 years of age on day of election.

2. Must be a U. S. citizen having resided in the U. S. for five years, in the State of South Dakota for one year, in a county of South Datoka for 90 days, and in the election precinct for 30 days.

3. Must be a registered voter.

Registration

1. Registration is permanent unless a person has changed his place of residence from one voting precinct to another or has changed his political affiliation.

2. All persons may accomplish initial registration or reregistration by absentee process. Letter of application should be addressed to the county auditor, county of residence, with a request for "Registration"

age on date of election.

2. Must be a U. S. citizen having resided in the State of North Dakota for a period of one year, in the county of residence for 90 days and in the voting precinct for 30 days.

Registration

1. No registration is required for federal of state elections. However, certain municipalities may require registration for local elections only, and if this is the case, the county auditor will notify affected persons after receipt of ballot application.

Obtaining Ballots and Voting

1. Members of the Armed Forces, "certain Merchant Marine personnel, certain civilians" may requiest absentee ballot.

2. Members of the Armed Forces, "certain Merchant Marine personnel, certain civilians" and eligible dependents of these personnel are eligible to vote by absentee ballot in any election.

2. Application for absentee ballot may be made at any time by mailing executed Federal Post Card Application (Standard Form 76) to county auditor, county of South Dakota residence as early as 76 days before any election.




