



This voting information applies to Armed Forces personnel, dependents residing with Armed Forces personnel and U. S. citizens attached to and serving with the U. S. Armed Forces beyond the continental limits of the U.S., unless otherwise specified. These persons include civilians employed by the Department of the Army, Navy, and Air Force, the Marine Corps and the Coast Guard; and awarded the American Spirit Mepersonnel of the American Red Cross and USO.

Qualifications for Voting

1. Must be at least 21 years of age on date of election.
2. Must be at U. S. citizen having resided in the State of New Mexico for a period of one year, 90 days in the county, and 30 days in the precinct.
3. Must be a registered voter.
4. Registration

1. Registration is permanent unless a voter has changed his New Mexico residence since he became registered or has failed to vote at the two last previous elections.
2. Any absentee person may make application for residence of election.


