Coming home fondest memory for veteran

"Welcome home, boys! Welcome home." Those words, spelled out in huge white rocks off the coast of Coney Island, N.Y., were a most memorable sight on Oct. 8, 1945, for Jerald of Mineral City.

was returning home from overseas, after serving his country at war for a year and a half, "I knew how Columbus must have felt when he discovered America. He got off his ship,

knelt down and kissed the swimming pool, but there wasn't buildings. "The Germans had all ground. That's exactly what I felt like doing," Haney said. Drafted on April 28, 1942, Ha-

ney first went to Fort Hayes in Columbus. After he scored high on a test for mechanics, he was sent to Aberdeen, Md., for training as an auto-wheel mechanic. From Maryland, Hancy went to Fort Knox, Ky. for more mechanical training on heavy equipment. On June 6, 1944, Hancy left New York for Glasgow, Scotland. "We went over in luxury on the Queen Mary. I had to sleep in the any water in it," he said with a grin. "There were so many men on board that cots were placed in the swimming pool for us to sleep on. It took us six days to get to Scotland.

On a map that all soldiers in his division received after the war, Haney traced the journey of his outfit, the 7th Armored Division. After landing in Scotland, the troops moved on to England. "When we got to England, everything was completely black. Windows were darkened so that no light could shine through. The Germans would fly over and anywhere they saw light, they would drop a bomb," rop a bomb," Haney said. From England, the 7th Ar-

mored Division boarded Landing Ship-Tank boats and sailed to France. The LST boats were designed so that the front part of the boat dropped down. The boat could then be maneuvered close to the shoreline, making it possible for the troops to unload quickly, explained.

France was in shambles when the 7th Armored Division arrived. Photographs that had taken showed crumbled

the technology. They were dropping bombs on people who were trying to fight them with pitchforks and clubs. In France, you would see artillery being moved by cow and wagon," cy said.

One of the worst things that recalls was crossing the Baltic Sea. "The Baltic Sea was frozen solid. We rode a train across the ice. You talk about somebody who was scared to death!

was wounded during the war, but did not want to go into detail about it. While recovering at the hospital, it was deemed that either he or his friend could go home. Ha knowing that his friend had a wife and children waiting for him, volunteered to stay. He was sent to the front lines.

"You know, after seeing all those guys wounded and dying at the hospital, I decided to really dig in my heels. I wasn't only fighting for my country anymore. I was fighting for those guys,

Finally, Haney's duty was done. It was his time to come home. "It took us six days to get

over there and 18 days to come home. I went overseas in luxury and came back on a cattle boat. he said. "I was sick all the way back. But then I saw those words, 'Welcome home, boys' ... you couldn't imagine what that felt like. When we were getting off the boat, the confetti was so thick, you'd have thought it was a blizzard."

For his service to his country, received a Purple Heart, Good Conduct and European African Middle Eastern Service medals and four Bronze Service


Waiting for him at home was his sweetheart, Helen, the same sweetheart that he has now been married to for 49 years. Among the cards and letters that Helen received during the war was a "ration card." "You know during the war everything was rationed - eggs, butter, milk, gas. You received a card and you could exchange that card for whatever it said, like a dozen eggs or a pound of butter. Well, this is the ration sent me," Helen card that said, giggling. On the outside of the card was a 'Betty Boop'looking character. On the inside were the words, 'This ration card

entitles you to four hugs and kisses."

cy continues to serve his country and his community through various activities as a member of the American Legion Carr Bailey Post of Mineral City. ancy had been a member for 47 years and served as the post's commander for three consecutive years. Hancy also served as a member of the village council for six years. Helen and five children, Martha Beatty, Jerald Jr., and Kenneth of Mineral City, Helen Marie Libbey of Texas and Marla Kay Taylor of North Carolina. The Haneys also have nine grandchildren and one great-granddaughter.

At Thanksgiving, Pfc. Jonathan will be coming home to visit with his grandparents. Jonathan is stationed at Fort Carson, Colo. Like his grandfather, Jonathan is a soldier in the United States Army. "He calls every Wednesday and Sunday," his proud grandfather exclaimed. "Helen and I are really looking forward to seeing him at Thanksgiving.




