



A graduate of Aurora College in Illinois, Chaplain Mills served during World War II and was wounded in the Palau Island invasion. It was there that he received his first Silver Star and Purple Heart.

He returned to civilian ilfe in April, 1946, and for two years was Orange County Veteran's Service Counselor in Santa Ana, California. Returning to the Army in September, 1949, he was sent to Fort Bliss where he remained until December, 1949. when he went to Japan.

In July, 1950, Captain Mills sailed for Korea where he was twice wounded while ministering on the battlefront. The next months were spent in hospitals both in Japan and at Mare

Chaplain Mills is a minister of the Advent Christian Church.



Since this new program is one that will be utilized as of March 31, 1951, it is important that supervisors and employees begin discussing Performance Requirements as soon as possible. OTHER WORDS, study each duty -look at it not as to "what" it is, but in the light of "quantity",

When the supervisor sets the Performance Requirements, they should be discussed with the employee. IN OTHER WORDS, though the supervisor knows what is expected of an employee on a specified job, the employee is still the one person who is most intimately concerned in the requirements of a job, and necessarily can be of great help in setting Performance Requirements for each duty. Let us use a Clerk-Typist's job

as an example in explaining the requirements listed above. The quantity" requirement is one that should be studied carefully pefore applying it to a duty. IN OTHER WORDS, it is desirable that the "accuracy" and "quality" requirements be included, or an employee might sacrifice quality to gain the quantity specified. The Need To Know

By EUGENE SMITH, Chief Civilian Personnel Did you ever try to get a group of neighborhood boys together for a game of baseball? If so you will recall that there is considerable confusion until "Sides are chosen." The next thing you discover is that everyone wants to be the pitcher. It becomes necessary for someone to be appointed captain on each team. Then the captain must designate what position will be played by each member of his team. This pro-game activity is known as "getting organized."

Every supervisor has to get his activity organized. The management principles applied in "getting organized" are the same regardless of the size or mission of the activity, whether it's baseball, or football, or war. Te eliminate confusion the government has established a recruitment and assignment procedure which determines when we come on the job just what "team we are on". After that, if we are supervisors we have to "organize" to get the mission accomplished which is assigned to us. There are definite steps that have to be taken.

1. Determine (and list) the functions which must be performed if your mission is to be completed.

"accuracy", "effect desired", "method of doing", "knowledge applicable", and in some coses "care and maintenance of equipment."

4. After separating the groups of related functions review them to see that each group is what one man can reasonably be expected to do—not too much to overload him, not so little that he will be idle. Make necessary adjustments to equalize workload, still following the principle of homogeneous assignment.

5. Draw an organization chart showing the functional groupings. Be sure to follow the UNITY OF COMMAND principle. Have each function accounted for on the organization chart. Have each function definitely assigned to one person. Be certain that each individual has only one supervisor. Place functions of equal responsibility on the same level. Show command relationship with a solid line

and staff relationship with a dotted line.

6. Determine the kind of persons (qualifications) required to perform each group of funtions. Determine also if the individual should be military or civilian. Obtain this personnel throught the appropriate recruitment source.

7. Allocate the human resources to the functions as shown on the chart.

8. DELEGATE AUTHORITY and responsibility necessary to assure that the individual can go ahead and perform his assigned functions.

9. Go over the organization chart with all personnel to assure that each one knows who is responsible for each function and what the channels of command are.

10. Review the organization periodically after operations are underway to assure that the organization is sound

Withholding Statements Gorm W-2) furnished to all military personnel receiving pay from the Finance Officer, Camp Roberts, as of the close of business 31 December 1950, included ONLY wages earned and Federal Tax withheld for periods of active Federal service during the calendar year 1950.

It is important that all concerned are careful to retain these forms for use in preparing individual Income Tax returns. Loss of these forms or failure to render a proper return to the Bureau of Internal Revenue on or before 15 March 1951, will only result in expense and inconvenience to the individuals.

There are many inquiries as to dependents' benefits offered to enlisted personnel of the Army. The Dependents Assistance Act of 1950 provides some financial support for dependents of enlisted personnel. Under the new allowance program, recruits, privates, and privates first class will contribute \$40.00 per month and the Government will contribute an additional \$45.00 for one dependent, \$67.50 for two dependents and \$85.00 for three or more. Corporals and sergeants contribute \$60.00 and the Government's share is \$67.50 for three or more. 


