a supervisory (commanding) position over others. The question arises "Now that I'm in charge, how do I go about commanding?"

We have already discussed "How to Organize" and "How

to Plan." Having set forth your organizational breakdown on a chart and established a plan of operation, commanding is simply the act of setting the works into motion,

according to the chart and the plan, and keeping it going.
The Plan is the foundation of the Command. Naturally, commanding can be more effective and complete when

1. Assign men to their initial tasks or major duties as

2. Follow-up and contral assignments to assure that workers are familiar with the organization, their asso-

ciates, and your policies. They should understand the pur-

3. Give current orders as required to keep the organiza-tion functioning according to the plan and moving toward

4. Review the operation in motion to see if changes in

the organization, plan, or personnel are in order. Take action within your jurisdiction to change the organization,

or the plan, or to develop the personnel. Then go through the four steps again. Recommend action not within your

When giving orders, keep verbal commands to a min-

There are just three important things to remember

2. Don't antagonize the person to whom you are giving

The Aspostle Paul described the conflict: "For I do not the good which I will, but the evil which I hate that I do." (Romans 7:15).

Without religion you will never solve your fundamental conflicts. 
