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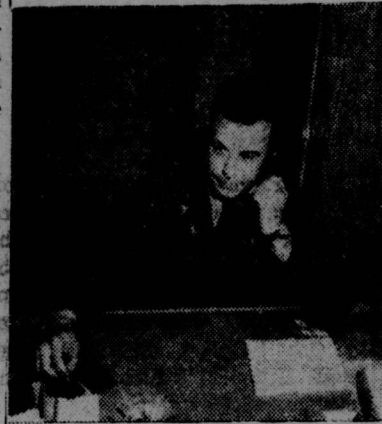

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The Need To Know

How To Command

One bright morning in the year 20,000 B. C. a shaggy brute strolled into a tribal camp, clapped a few skulls together and said, in effect—"I can lick anybody here so I'm taking over this outfit."

Today we do things a little different. When an officer comes into a post and outranks all others present, he issues an order saying—"I hereby assume command."

After assuming command, the next step is to "exercise" command. The same problem confronts anyone who is in a supervisory (commanding) position over others.

We have already discussed "How to Organize" and "How to Plan." Having set forth your organizational breakdown on a chart and established a plan of operation, commanding is simply the act of setting the works into motion, according to the chart and the plan, and keeping it going.

There are four main activities involved in the directing (or commanding) function of management:

- 1. Assign men to their initial tasks or major duties as agreed in the plan. 2. Follow-up and contral assignments to assure that workers are familiar with the organization, their associates, and your policies.

When giving orders, keep verbal commands to a minimum. They are used for minor details, or to give directions and assistance, or to clarify a written order.

There are just three important things to remember when giving an order:

- 1. Be sure it is in accordance with the plan and is possible of execution. 2. Don't antagonize the person to whom you are giving the order, by your manner of giving it. 3. Be certain that the order is understood.
