

Army Orders Dual Purpose Busses For Passenger and Ambulance Use

Washington-A new dual-purpose, 37-passenger bus, which can be converted quickly into an efficient ambulance for use in any emergency, has been designed by the Army Ordnance Corps and 1509 of them ordered, the Department of the Army

They will be manufactured by the Twin Coach Company of Kent. Ohio, and are to be allocated to Army installations throughout the country. Total cost of the contract is \$19,-617,000.

The Army-designed bus can be made ready to transport a total of 14 litters in less than 30 minutes. Seats can be removed in 45 minutes or less to accommodate 21 litters. The cost of special equipment necessary to convert a bus for ambulance service is approximately four per cent of the vehicle's
