



LAUDS TRAINING PROGRAM



Following is the text of a graduation talk by Pvt. Carl E. Williams, Company D, 17th Medium Tank Battalion, delivered at the Graduation Review of 17th Medium Tank Battalion and 38th Armored Infantry Battalion Training Companies Recently:

To the permanent personnel of Camp Roberts-today marks the end of this battalion's basic training; but, to those of us graduating, it is merely the beginning of our service as soldiers. To some this is the beginning of a planned career, but to most of us basic training has been the initial phase of a necessary job which we

When we entered the Army, our attitudes were many and varied. Some were bewildered because it was their first time away from home. Others were sullen, or cynical. However, with time has come a better understanding of military customs and army life.

One of the most beneficial parts of our training has been our physical conditioning. Although we have cursed and complained about the long marches and the hours of vigorous exercising, we cannot deny the improved physical fitness of our bodies. Undoubtedly, this general strengthening has resulted in a higher morale. Some of the more important days and nights of our training were spent in learning military tactics upon which every movement of the army is based.

We have received extensive training with the M-1 rifle, in fact we have practically lived with it through our basic training. Perhaps this is why the American Infantrymen have been so sucessful with the use of this weapon. We have also received adequate basic knowledge of the supporting weapons used within the infantry such as-automatic weapons, mortars, anti-tank weapons

Another important factor in our training was Troop Information a subject relatively new in Basic Training. In this subject we discussed world problems and gave our personal opinions on current events. To Division Faculty we extend our gratitude for their George A. Stormo patience and many hours of instruction. We owe our thanks to the men who have just returned from Korea, and who are now instructors here at Camp Roberts for the training we have received in night warfare and close combat-subjects that can be taught only by men of experience.

Considering that this camp has only been reopened for a short time, the facilities are unusually adequate, we received capable medical attention, recreation, good housing and excellent sanitary conditions. The army has taught us neatness and cleanliness . . not only in our barracks but in our clothing and person. This has been accomplished through rigid inspections, much as we disliked them, we must admit they produced the desired effect.

Due to the excellent leadership we have had, we feel confident and are now ready to tackle any assignment the Army may give us, whether it be schooling or combat. We feel we can do the job and do it well.


