These men are learning to scream. and slash and slit and fear. But they are also learning to live. For in bayonet fighting there is no running away, no retreat, no mercy. Kill or be killed is law.

The following article was written by Wayne C. Williams, Colorado historian, and introduced in the House of Representatives by the Hon. Wayne N. Aspinwall, of Colorado. President Truman, after reading the article, sent a letter of congratulations to Mr. Williams. It was incorporated in the Congressional Record, Friday, August

"What is the cause for which our soldiers are fighting in Korea?

"The answer is historically clear and admits of no doubt. "Let us use the logic of Lincoln and borrow some of his immortal phrases to describe it for this present generation.

"Out of the travail, suffering and death of two world wars the free nations of the world which had overthrown the aggressors, Hitler, Mussolini, and Tojo, assembled at San Francisco, under the flag of America, framed a charter and brought forth a new international organization called the United Nations, and dedicated to the proposition that all nations are free and equal and are entitled to live in peace and freedom from aggression.

We are now in throes of a mighty conflict between the aggressors who have defied the United Nations by invading one of its members, to determine whether this international union or whether any international organization, so conceived and so dedicated, can long endure.

"The brave men struggling in Korea against Russian and Chinese communism are fighting in this noblest of causes and have hallowed that sacred ground far above our power to add or detract.

"It is for us the living to sustain the forces of freedom in the United Nations in their struggle to free the world believed that U. S. aid can rearms" in aid of the French Expeditionary Corps during the campaigns of Italy and France in free nations.




