

## Critique Summary

By MAJOR GENERAL WILLIAM B. KEAN III Corps Commander

Gentlemen:

As you probably know, I have spent the last three days observing as much of your training as time would permit. It has been almost three months since I have last had this opportunity. For me to say that I have noted an improvement, is an understatement, for the change has been most noteworthy, and I am extremely well satisfied with the great majority of the training I have observed.

The faculty is performing in a superb manner, and I commend them. While I have a few changes to offer to improve the Korean and Attack Problems, I say without hesitation that they both are not only superior, but the most outstanding I have seen outside of service schools,

and on a par with many of those. Your Assault Bayonet Course is another example of initiative, sound planning, and hard work which appears to be uniform throughout the Division, and extends into your I & E Program, Weapons Pool, and many other of your activities including the Leaders' School. I mention the Leadership School last, actually, for emphasis, because to my mind, the selection, the forming of character, and the training of potential non-commissioned officers is one of our major problems with which we are confronted today in our expansion program.

In my inspection I am placed in a dual role, because, as you know, I am directly responsible for the state of your training, and, secondly, I am required to inspect and report the status of this training. For this reason I must be

mely factual, and not allow myself to be influenced by loyalty and enthusiasm. Aside from the fact that we must all strive for perfection, I have purposely set the standards for my inspections at an exceptionally high level in order to help the organizations for which I am respon-Korea has indicated must be attained. 







# **Res. Commissions**

Concurrent and reserve corps commissions are now being offerd warrant officers and first hree graders serving in the Army of the United States.

This means that a warrant of licer or first three grader can apply for a direct commission as 2nd lieutenant in armor, infantry or artillery for the current call to duty and the organized reserve

The following requirements are

Maximum age 30 years. All former discharges honor-

aptitude 1 Army General Classification Test (Aget.) or General Classification Test (Gct.) or successfully graduated from college or university with a minimum 120 emester hours. Warrant officers are excempted from the provis-

ions of the above paragraph. It is also mandatory that apolicants have practical experience and training in the arm for which the application is made.

Applications should be forwarded through military channels to Headquarters, 7th Armored Division, attention AG officers branch. A detailed chronological resume of all military experience is required on application from DA Congress. AGO 170.

Two new types of low-cost Government life insurance are

five-year level premium term; policy that may be renewed every five years at the premium rate for the then-attained age.

To qualify for the five year level premium term policy (under Section 621 of the NSLI Act), veterans must have been ordered to active duty for 31 days or more: they must have served since June 27, 1950, and they must have been Attained 110 or nigher on the released from active service.

> These veterans are eligible, without physical examination, for a five-year level premium, term policy in amounts ranging from \$1,000 to \$10,000, less any other Government life insurance in force at the time of application.

They must apply in writing to Veterans Administration, Washington 25, D. C., within 120 days after their release or separation from active service, and pay the requested first premium.

ages under this policy are the lowest of any Government life insurance yet authorized by the

While this policy may be re newed every five years at the preequirements will be ordered to mium rate for the then attained appear before the examining age, it is not convertible to any other plan of Government life insurance, nor will it earn dividends.

> Because it is a term policy running for only five years, it does not have any loan value, cash surrender value, or extended insurance value. It merely provides life insurance coverage while premium are being paid for the five-year period.

Death payments made to the beneficiary or beneficiaries are exempt from taxation, but the exemption does not extend to any property bought with this money. 


