REAR ECHELON MEN SLATED FOR COMBAT DUTY


Washington-Plans to cut the Army's division strength so that some men 1.0w on rear-service duty can be turned into fighting men, have been announced.





Unsafe acts of persons have caused the death of twenty-nine Camp Roberts Military Personnel, and the majority of these accidents occurred while on leave, pass or furlough. . . . These soldiers died unnecessarily. . . . All of these accidents could have been prevented. We do not want this to happen to you.

First on our accident cause list is "Operating your vehicle at an unsafe speed." . . . Speed should always be adjusted to suit the existing conditions; such things as weather, pedestrians, heavy traffic, etc., must be taken into consideration, and our speed adjusted ac-

Another accident cause responsible for numerous fatalities is leeping at the wheel. . . . It doesn't pay to drive if you are sleepy. If you do get to nodding or dozing at the wheel, stop your vehicle immediately; get out for some fresh air; walk around; smoke a sigarette. But whatever you do, DON'T OPERATE YOUR VEHICLE AGAIN UNLESS YOU ARE FULLY AWAKE.

If you are a passenger in a vehicle whose operator is apparently sleepy, talk to him, try to get him to comply with the before mentioned suggestions. . . . If necessary, get out and get another ride. That's better than being involved in an accident.

Comply with highway signs. . . . Traffic signs are not posted to hinder us . . . but to help us. They are signs of life if we will force after the 120-day post-ser-

However it remained for one of the visitors Bob Liebe to grab top scoring honors. The ex-San Francisco State center hit from all angles for 22 points.





ARMY TO CALL MORE RESERVE OFFICERS IN '52

Washington - The Army may have to call up some additional Reserve company grade officers to meet its requirements for 1952. An estimated 8,000 to 10,000 Reserve officers will complete their minimum tours in 1952. The Army would like to fill this gap from ROTC and OCS sources, but graduates will not yet be coming out in sufficient numbers.

With the Army expanding to 21 divisions, ROTC goals have! been set at 23,000 officers annually. The nine OCS's can turn out a capacity of 16,000 officers "I'm gonna join the Army when I grow up . . . got any pointers?" annually.

The Army does not expect however, to call up additio Reserve field grade officers as it hopes to fill this gap by the promotion system and voluntary recalls.


