

These persons include civilians employed by the Department of the Army, Navy, and Air Force, the Marine Corps and the Coast Guard; and personnel of the American Red Cross and USO.

Washington - Approximately 7.000 officers and men will parlicipate in an atomic explosion layer is punctured or torn. test late this month, the Department of Defense has announced.

The exercise is designated to provide units and individuals with indoctrination training in operations featuring employment of atomic weapons, training in essential physical protective measures and indoctrination training in the effects on equipment of atomic explosions.

Army troops participating will nclude two battalion combat teams and supporting service troops from the 82nd Airborne, First Armored, 31st Infantry and 47th Infantry Divisions.

The Marine Corps' will furnish about 2.000 men from Camp Pendelton, Calif., and Camp Lejeune, N. C. Two flight units totaling about 500 men from Kirkland AFB, Albuquerque, N. M., will represent the Air Force. The Navy will have individual observers at the test.
