General Guthrie has been the assistant division commander of the 7th Armored Division since January 1952. Previously the chief of staff of X Corps in Korea, General Guthrie emphasized the fact that the "quality of Camp Roberts replacements in Korea is rated very, very high." The General commanded the 7th Infantry Regiment, 3rd Division through the North Korea Campaign, including the Chinese intervention and the evacuation of Hungnam.

Commissioned in 1930 from

West Point, he served as Operations Officer of the 7th Army in Europe from Spring of 1944 until the end of World War II.
After serving with the 1st Division on occupation duty in Germany, General Guthrie returned to the United States and assumed command of the 7th Regiment in Sept., 1949. Previously he had served a tour with the Department of the Army General Staff Operations Division. In September of 1950, the regiment moved to Japan for combat training, and in January 1951, he went to X Corps as Chief of Staff.

The General and his family are looking forward to the new assignment although they regret leaving friends and acquaintances ey have made while here.

House Expected To Vote Soon On K-Vet Bill

Washington-The K-Vet Bill is finally ready for approval by the House-Veterans Committee.

Congressional observers feel confident that the bill will reach the House floor for a vote before the end of May.

The bill will carry free school benefits similar in many ways to those granted WWII veterans. It is expected to cost approximately \$13 billion. The program has, however, been tightened up to prevent abuses.

The bill may also contain benefits to include loan guarantees for homes, farms and businesses, social security and possible to employment insurance coverage It is not known, however, whether these benefits will actually be a part of the schooling bill or be contained in later legislation.

Practice Democracy In 1952 Your Vote Is Freedom's Key

This voting information applies to Armed Forces personnel, dependents residing with Armed Forces personnel and U. S. citizens attached to and serving with the U.S. Armed Forces beyond the continental limits of the U.S., unless otherwise specified. These persons include civilians employed by the Department of the Army, Navy, and Air Force, the Marine Corps and the Coast Guard; and personnel of the American Red Cross and USO.

WISCONSIN
(The Badger State)
Qualifications for Voting

1. Must be at least 21 years of age on date of election.

2. Must be a U. S. citizen having resided in the State of Wisconsin for a period of one year and in the election preciact for 10 days.

3. Must be a registered voter, except members of the Armed Forces and "certain Merchant Marine personnel and certain civilians."

Registration

1. Although members of the Armed Forces, "certain Merchant Marine personnel and certain civilians? are exempted from all registration requirements, they register it they so desire: WISCONSIN

2. Any person who is unable to register in person may request in writing an Affidavit of Registration Form, from the town, village, or city cferk at place of Wisconsin residence, Requests fr application should be made at least 20 days prior to any election.

Obtaining Ballots and Voting

1. Members of the Armed Forces, "certain Merchant Marine personnel and certain civilians," may make application for absentee ballots in two ways: either by (a) submitting a letter, card, or complete Federal Post Card Application (Standard Form 76) or, (b) by other persons (spouse, parents, relatives, or friends) applying in person on behalf of absent voter. By either method, application will be accepted at place of Wisconsin, residence as early as 60 days before any election.

2. Ballots will be mailed to all voters about 21 days before any election. Marked ballots must be received by election officials at proper yoting precinct before closing of the polls on election day.

1. Must be as least 21 years of age on day of election.


