

MORE MONEY COMING

House, Senate Approve Measure To Increase Pay

Washington (AFPS)—Congress has passed the long-waited Armed Forces pay bill and only the signature of President Truman is necessary before it becomes a law.

The pay increase will be retroactive to May 1. Both the House and Senate approved the bill unanimously.

Bill Signed

The military pay bill, as pass-ed by the Senate and the House, has become law. It was signed by President Truman shortly after its adoption by Congress.



Qualifications for Voting
1. Must be as least 21 years of age on date of election.
2. Must be a U. S. citizen having resided in the State of Mississippi for a period of two years and in the election district for one year.
3. Must be able to read or understand state constitution.
4. Must be a registered voter, except members of the Armed Forces and "certain Merchant Marine personnel."

1. Registration is permanent, unless reregistered is ordered by county board of supervisors.

2. Unregistered members of the Armed Forces, "certain Merchant Marine personnel," and persons emplayed by the American Red Cross will be sent a Registration Application with the first ballot without making a separate application for registration. The complete Registration Application must be returned to appropriate officials.

3. All persons must register in person at office of city or county registrar.

Application for registration may be made at any time, but voters' hames must be entered at least four months before a general election.

1. Must be at least 21 years of age on date of election.

3. Must be a U. S. citizen having resided in the State of ouisiana for two years, in the parish for one year, and in the precinct for three months. (Municipal elections require a four-month municipal residence period.)
4. Must be a registered voter.

Obtaining Ballots and Voting

1. Members of the Armed Forces may apply for absentee ballots by mailing a complete Federal Post Card Application (Standard Form 15) to clerk of the court of parish where registered at any time prior to election. Ballots will be mailed by state not earlier than 30 days before any election. Servicemen must mark ballot and return in time to reach proper officials on election day.

2. All other persons are permitted to vote by absentee ballots provided size of Louisiana.

Forces and those persons who become 21 years of age after April 10th of any year.

Registration

1. There is no registration law in the State of Arkansas.

Obtaining Ballots and Voting

1. Any qualified voter who will be absent from his voting precinct on election day may vote by absentee ballot.

2. Application for absentee ballot may be made in any one of the following three ways: (a) by appearing in person at the office of the county clerk, county of Arkansas residence of the voter; (b) by writing for an Arkansas "Application for Ballot Farm" to the county clerk, county of Arkansas residence (should be requested at least 0 days in advance of election); or (c) by delivery of the completed "Application for Ballot Form" to the office of the county clerk by applicant himself or hy member of his immediate family.

2. County Clerk will mail ballots to voters upon receipt of application. Marked ballots must be received not later than election day.

4. Members of the Armed Forces may also vote by writing a letter to the county clerk indicating various election preferences. This ballot-letter must be attested to by a commissioned officer of the Armed Forces. Such letter must be received not later than election day.

Atom Artillery Support Called New, Devastating

A "new and devastating" atomic artillery weapon has been described by Secretary of the Army Frank Pace, Jr.

The atomic gun, said Secretary Pace, "can hit its target under any weather conditions and give ground troops the kind of devastating close support never be fore available in warfare.

"It is essentially an artillery piece-but with immeasurably greater power than any artillery hitherto known.


