

by Mrs. Frank H. Partridge with the able assistance of Colonel Paul G. Hollister, Chief of Staff, before an assemblage which included the assistant chiefs of staff and other friends and associates of the general.

Lieutenant Frost Awarded Commendation

Recognition of the outstanding quality of the performance of his duties in conducting the Attack Course phase of training at Camp Roberts came to Lieutenant Jack T. Frost this week when he was awarded a commendation ribbon with medal pendant accompanied by a commendatory message from Mr. Frank Pace, Jr., Secretary of the Army, and Lieutenant General Joseph M. Swing, Commanding General, Sixth Army.

Lieutenant Frost, who will soon leave Camp Roberts for duty in Alaska, received his award Monday morning prior to the ceremonies signalizing the promotion of General Frank H. Partridge to the rank of Major General.

The departing lieutenant planned the Attack Course demonstrations of attack by infantry-artillery-tank teams which have been presented before thousands of trainees. Lieutenant Frost's citation follows:

"First Lieutenant Jack T. Frost, Infantry, United States Army, is awarded the commendation ribbon with medal pendant for meritorious achievement during the period 1 December 1951 to 30 June 1952 in the direction and supervision of the Attack Course phase of the battle indoctrination series at Camp Roberts for more than 12,000 infantry

"During this period, Lieutenant Frost performed an outstanding service in the demonstration and narration of firing of each of the infantry weapons, of tank capabilities, and of artillery firing over the heads of troops preceding and during an attack by infantrymen on a defended hill.

"The lesson plans, narration of the exercise, and training of the personnel charged with the conduct of the demonstration were prepared under the supervision of Lieutenant Frost with outstanding efficiency and dispatch.

"This assignment would normally be given only to an officer of more senior rank and experience. Despite this, he presented this program with such superior effectiveness that it has been established as a model for other instructors to follow. to follow.

"Lieutenant Frost's extreme devotion to duty and outstanding instructional methods are worthy of emulation by all persons engaged in similar duties. The accomplishment of Lieutenant Frost in this instance reflects great credit upon himself and the military service."

Summarizing Lieutenant Frost's accomplishments at Camp Roberts, Lieutenant Colonel Jack L. Weigand, Assistant Chief of Staff, G-3, stated:

"In our great team of instructors, we're not only loone of our first string men, but a man who is definited all-America caliber when Lieutenant Frost goes."

Two Stars Presented To General Partridge Following Senate Confirmation Of New Rank

Major General Frank H. Partridge, Commanding General of Camp Roberts, received the two stars symbolizing his new rank at a brief but impressive ceremony Monday morning.

ment General Staff. There followed in rapid succession promotion to colonel and appointment as Chief, Administrative Branch, Military Personnel Division, Headquarters, Services of Supply, Washington, D. C.

General Partridge, whose promotion from brigadier general to major general had earlier been recommended by President Harry S. Truman, was notified by wire Saturday that the Senate had confirmed the promotion.

Presentation of the two-star insignia was made by Mrs. Frank H. Partridge and Colonel Paul G. Hollister, Chief of Staff, before an assemblage which included the assistant chiefs of staff and other friends and associates of

With characteristic modesty, General Partridge devoted the first part of the gathering to the presentation of a commendation ribbon with medal pendant to Lt. Jack Frost (see story on this page) for meritorious achievement in conducting the Attack Course demonstrations.

Colonel Hollister then stepped to the front of the gathering and announced the receipt of the telegram from Washington confirming General Partridge's new rank.

In the hush which followed, Mrs. Partridge and the Chief

of Staff turned to the General and affixed the stars symbol-

izing his new rank to his collar.

A two star flag was then presented to General Partridge while in the wall behind him a panel was opened

to reveal another two star flag.

General Partridge assumed command of the 7th Armored Division at Camp Roberts in November of 1950,

ored Division at Camp Roberts in November of 1950, shortly after the huge training center was re-activated.

Considered one of the Army's outstanding training centers, the camp has been inspected recently by General J. Lawton Collins, Chief of Staff; General Mark Clark, Supreme Allied Commander in the Far East; and Mr. Fred Korth, Assistant Secretary of the Army.

Most recent distinguished visitors at Camp Roberts were Mr. Ramon Magsaysay, Secretary of National Defense of the Republic of the Philippines, and Lieutenant General Joseph M. Swing, Commanding General, Sixth Army.

A native of Scranton, and a student of the University of Pennsylvania, Frank H. Partridge was appointed a second lieutenant of Infantry in the Regular Army on 15 August 1917. He has been on active duty since that date.

After serving as Commanding Officer, 355th Infantry Regiment, and Assistant Division Commander, 97th In-fantry Division, General Partridge was promoted to the rank of Brigadier General, temporary. He moved with his division from Texas to Missouri and Louisiana and thence to Camp San Luis Obispo and Camp Cooke, California.

General Partridge and the 97th Division left for Europe

in the early part of 1945 and, as part of the Third Army, participated in the final overthrow of Nazi military power.

After the war in Europe ended, the 97th went to Japan as part of the occupation force. General Partridge re-

mained with the division until he was designated Military Government Officer of the First Corps in Japan in March

General Partridge returned to the U.S. in July, 1947, reverted to the rank of colonel, and was assigned as Chief, Planning Office, Personnel and Administrative Division,

Department of the Army.

Called west three years later, General Partridge came to the Presidio of San Francisco as Assistant Chief of Staff, G-1. In October of 1950, he was again made brigadier general, and, in the following month, came to Camp Roberts to take over command.


