A board of officers will convene at the Pentagon Nov. 3 to select fully qualified warrant officers. Promotions will be announced in special orders sometime in December. It is anticipated that all promotions will be effected before the end of this year.

Make Titanium B-36 Frames Now

Washington (AFPS)—Titanium, a new metal, will be used in certain aircraft parts of B-36 aircraft in place of sheet steel, the Air Force has announced.

This is the first use of titanium in aircraft production. Titanium offers substantial improvements over metals now used in aircraft because of its high strength-to-weight ratio and its heat and corrosion resistant qualities. In non-structural uses, where it replaces steel on a pound-for-pound basis, approximately 40 percent savings in weight result.

Fund Campaign Started By USO

The United Service Organization Defense Fund has begun a nationwide campaign to collect \$18,680,000 for clubs, camp shows, and recreation centers for Armed Forces personnel stationed throughout the world.

More than \$740,000 has been received in advance gifts from corporations and foundations. Similar institutions are being asked to donate 30 per cent of their 1945 contributions to the USO. At that time, the size of the Armed Forces was approximately three times larger.

Since the start of the Korean conflict the USO figures its activities attracted more than 4,000,000 men and women in uniform at the rate of 50,000,000 visits a year.

USO overseas programs include clubs in Alaska, Italy, Germany, the Canal Zone, and Turkey. New centers are being established in London, Paris, Naples, and Casablanca. Camp shows are sent to all parts of the world.(AFPS).

OFF-POST HOUSING

New Project Assured To Provide More Homes

Another housing project to ease the shortage of living quarters for married Camp Roberts personnel has been assured by the announcement that 140 homes will be built in this area by the Public Housing Administration.

Funds for this project will be provided by the Federal Housing and Home Finance Agency. The exact location of the project will be determined by a project planner who will visit Camp Roberts next week.

The homes will be mostly of the three-bedroom type. Stanley Foster, deputy director of the PHA in San Francisco, commented, "The homes are of what is termed 'temporary' construction but are really good small homes which are very comfortable although the floor space is limited."

Col. Robert Stack, Deputy Post Commander, says it has not yet been determined whether the homes will be for officers or enlisted men, but adds, "General Partridge has a fixed policy that enlisted men must be provided for first."

Concerning the Almond Acres housing site is nearby San Miguel, Major James P. Westerfield, Post Housing Director, announced that 250 additional one and two bedroom homes are expected to arrive here soon.

The one bedroom homes rent for \$51 per month, while the two bedroom homes rent for \$56. This includes water, electricity, and garbage pickup.

Priority is based on date of arrival at Camp Roberts. Applications on file in the Housing office, Bldg. 3031, will be used. However, new applications will continue to be accepted.

In Atascadero there is an FHA building project underway calling for 21 duplexes of two bedroom units. Assignment will be made regardless of rank, and priority will be based upon date of arrival for duty at Camp Roberts.

These units are unurnished and one year lease will be required. A monthly rental of \$85 has been set subject to approval by the Rent Control Board. The present terms of the lease provide for payment of the first and last months' rent in advance. There will be a \$10 deposit to cover cost of cleaning, if required, and also a \$2 key deposit.

New Truck Units In East Garrison

Two new truck companies were activated Saturday in East Garrison and attached to Headquarters and Headquarters Company, 26th Transportation Truck Battalion.

The new units are the 38th and 53rd Transportation Heavy Truck Companies. Already a part of the 26th Transportation Truck Battalion are the 23rd and 31st Transportation Truck Companies.

Last Days For Re-Registration

Today and tomorrow are the final days for military and civilian personnel to re-register their vehicles at the Motor Vehicle Building, near the Main Gate.

After 1 November, the metal tags previously used become obsolete. Metal tags are being replaced by stickers for front and back windows. Blue remains the color for officers' vehicles and red for enlisted personnel, while green signifies a civilian's automobile.

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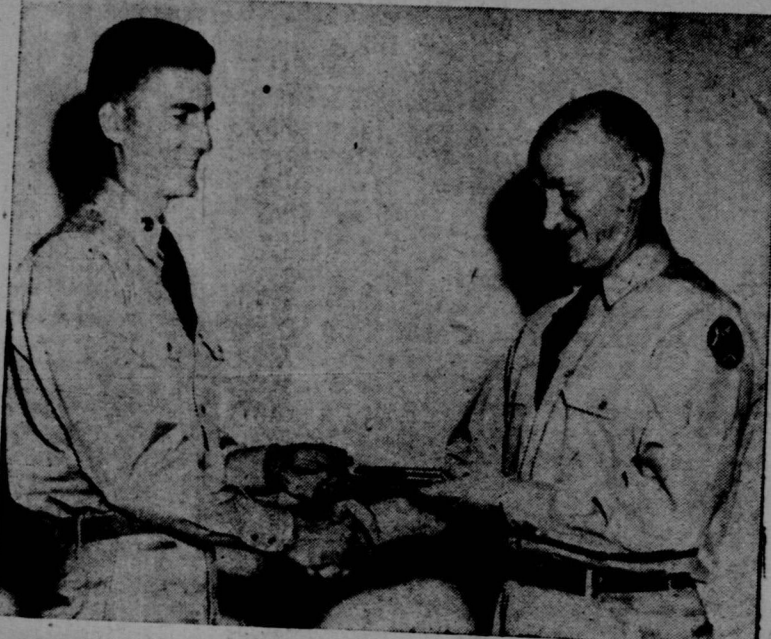

"Dead Or Alive"

"What do you want to be when you finish your tour of army duty?" I asked a trainee. The man replied, "I want to be alive." Is that not the desire of everyone? We want to be alive to the physical, thought, and spiritual world. Our nation is showing its interest in preserving these aspects of life. Cadreman Course Graduates Class Of 14 Students

Coincidental with its number, Class 14 of the Cadre Refresher Course graduated 14 enlisted men Friday, with SFC Lawrence L. Williams chosen as honor graduate for finishing top in academic work and displaying qualities necessary for best military leadership.

So rigorous is the school, conducted by Leaders' Course, that only about 35 per cent of students enrolled usually graduate, and the course is the same for enlisted men as that given to officers.

Purpose of the class is to refresh cadre's memory of instruction techniques learned in the past which may have been forgotten, as well as to teach other methods and procedures that have begun since the student's last tour of duty. Lt. Milton Hill, class officer of the four-week course, stated that in order to train the best leaders, "The men are constantly being evaluated, determining those who are competent of graduating."

For the first two and a half weeks with the Tactical Department, the students, most of whom are first three graders and Korean returnees, learn correct procedures for conducting bayonet drill, physical training, and dismounted drill.

Under the guidance of the Academic Department, they learn theories and principles governing command and military leadership, decision, how to prepare a class, three primary methods of presenting instruction, map reading, public speaking, and unit supply.

During the last week and a half, the future cadre receive thorough refresher training with the M-1 rifle. The first three days are spent on the Preliminary Rifle Instruction Circle, and during the last week, Division Faculty conducts range firing, record firing, and Firing Tables VI, VII, and VIII.

In line with the high standards of the school, the student is expected to keep himself and all his equipment in a superior condition, while his housekeeping should be exemplary. Through the entire cycle, the student is under the constant supervision of the Tactical Department of Leaders' Course.

Roberts Soldier Runs For Office On State Ballot

"Exercise your right to vote" is a slogan Pvt. Pat Nicholson takes to heart. So much, in fact, that he's trying to win votes in his home county.

Nicholson, of Company C, 37th Recon. Bn., is running for representative in the state legislature of Montana, even though he only recently completed basic training and is now working in the G-2 section.

A Democrat from Bozeman, Nicholson is competing with three Republicans and another Democrat who seek the three legislative seats from Gallatin County. He won on the primary ballot in July to make him eligible for the November 4 general ticket.

If elected, the candidate will be granted a leave of absence from the Army to attend the 60-day session in February and March.

"But I hope to be out of uniform by the time the next legislature convenes," he explains, "as it meets only once every two years."

Nicholson plans to become a lawyer when he leaves the service and hopes for a career in government. Although this is his first attempt at public office, he engaged actively in college politics at the University of Washington, where he helped manage several campaigns, including that of the student body president in 1949.

Receiving his B. A. degree in radio broadcasting and journalism in 1951, Nicholson worked full-time as sports director and announcer in a radio station at Bozeman while taking post-graduate studies at Montana State College.

Previously at the university, he worked in the school's radio station and on the daily campus newspaper, for which he wrote sports three years. Nicholson also was associated for a year with Leo Lassen, well-known baseball announcer in Seattle, and in connection with his university job he interviewed several notables, including Jack Dempsey and Harry Matthews, "Ring" magazine's fighter of the year for 1951.

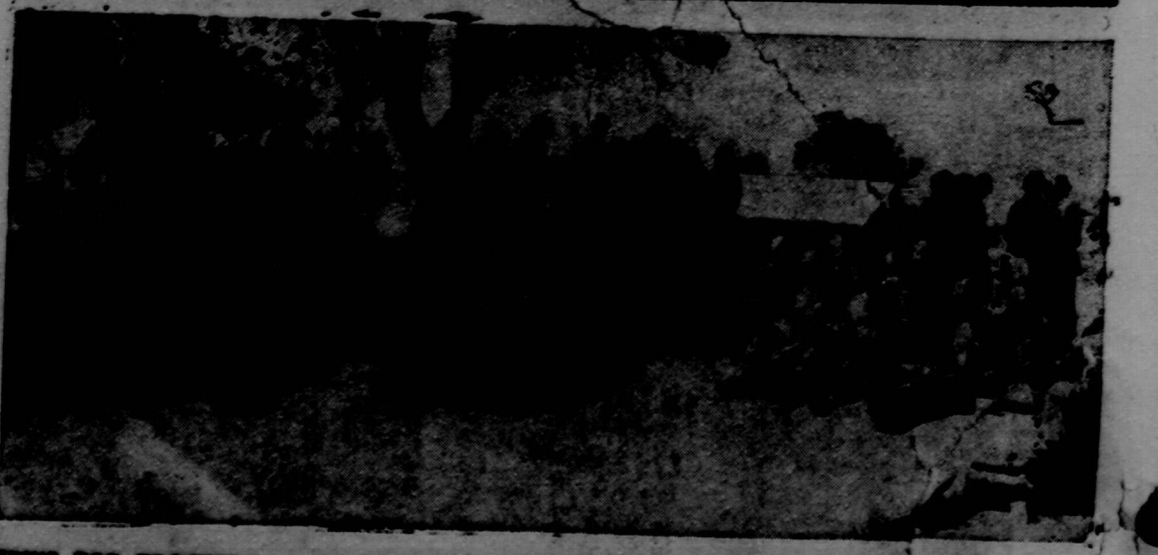

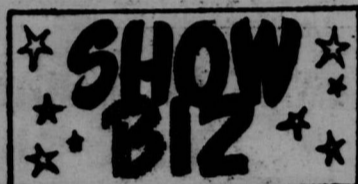

Flagstone covering on the outside front of the club, besides lawns and a shaded marquee leading to the street will make the exterior of the club the most beautiful of any building on the Post.

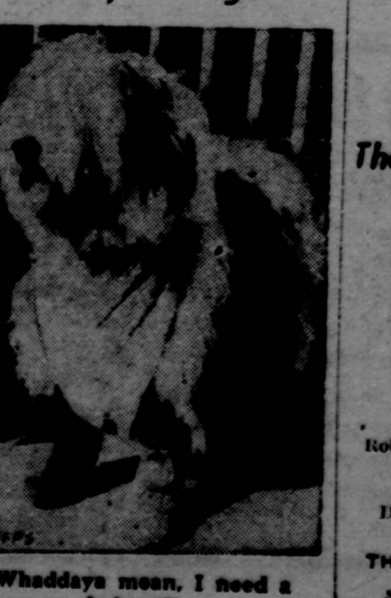
Also included in the club's facilities will be a soundproof lounge and reading room with special lighting, and a large powder room for ladies.
