Buckshot Ammo **Scatters Pellets** At Close Range

(AFPS)-It'll be back to buckshot for the soldiers and marines fighting in Korea.

A recently developed cannister ammunition for 90-mm guns is, according to Army Ordnance, a lot like good old-fashioned buck-

One shot from a 90-mm gun using the new ammunition can throw more than 1,000 deadly pellets at ranges too short for con-ventional high-explosive ammunition. No other type of ammunition can do the job.

Since the Civil War, various types of cannister ammunition have been used. In the early days they used nuts, bolts and metal scraps piled in front of the powder charge to spray onrushing enemy troops.

Cannister ammunition has gone under many names. Some call it "shrapnel," others "grape shot." But with the advent of high explosive shells, cannister types ere forgotten until jungle war-re in WWII. With the danger hitting our own troops with long-range high explosives, the need for cannister ammunition

The cannister projectile is a can containing many small steel pellets. When fired, the pellets scatter in a cone-shaped fashion. Effective at close range, this type of projectile can prevent successful mass enemy rushes at a small







That's the title of the TIC for 5-10 January, "You Go To Desert Rock." Camp Desert Rock is in the midst of a desolate stretch of the Nevada Desert, 65 miles from Las Vegas. The surrounding countryside has been described as "a good place to throw used razor blades." Due to this wasteland character of the locality, it was picked by the Armed Forces as an ideal spot for a series of atomic bomb tests.

These tests were not made just for kicks. A great deal was learned about the effects of atomic blast and radiation on military equipment and structures. Studies were made on what tactics to employ in atomic battle. Many of the lessons learned are of benefit to you. This TIC is designed to tell you what they are and how you can take advantage of them even though you were not actually there. A good motto to remember -

BIG ARMY TURNOVER

750,000 Men Due For Release Ten Million More On Way

Washington (AFPS)—Approximately 750,000 soldiers or about one-half of the Army built up since the coutbreak of Korean hostilities, will be separated from active duty this fiscal year.

2nd Specialized Signal Support Unit Organized

Camp Gordon, Ga.-The second signal support unit in the Army's history was activated here recently.

The 379th Signal Support Battalion has the task of main'a 1ing and operating part of the communication system in an Army area. It differs from other signal battalions in that its three companies have all the men and equipment necessary to run every type of communication the Army uses-including a twoplane air force.

During the Pacific campaign in WWII, when the Army hopped from island to island, it became increasingly difficult to leave signal units behind to maintain communications. Signalmen had to be rushed to the islands from the States.

The Army decided to develop a signal support battalion. Then, as it advanced from one island to another, it could drop off a signal support company on each island. The 39th Signal Support Battalion was the first of these units.

Each company in the battalion is capable of operating message centers, telephone, telegraph, teletype, radio, radio relay, and carriers (machines allowing many messages to be sent over one wire).—(AFPS).

In an address before the mobilization conference of the Jewish Welfare Board recently, Secretary of the Army Frank Pace, Jr., also said some 10,000,000 youths may experience military duty in the foreseeable future.

"Considering their influence in their immediate families and friends," Secretary Pace said, "probably upwards of 30,000,000 Americans will be affected directly or indirectly by their military

"New replacements must be trained to go immediately into battle, if need be, and this is no simple process. It imposes terrific burdens on our training system, complicates the other difficult jobs the Army is doing, and is very costly in time and money.

"The record of our troops in Korea and elsewhere attests to the soundness of our training There is a two-fold reason for giving our soldiers this tough, realistic training: first, to help them do a tough job in combat and second, to increase their chances of staying alive."

Secretary Pace said the American soldier is better cared for, in or out of battle, than any other fighting man in the world. In wounded soldiers are about onehalf of the rate of WWII. About Korea, he said, fatalities among 98 of every 100 wounded men survive and 85 of them are restored to duty.

Besides improved medical facilities. Mr. Pace stated body armor has further reduced the number of men who die of wounds. Experiments in Korea indicate the vest is more than worth the eight extra pounds of weight a soldier must carry. As one infantryman put it, "I'd rather wipe sweat than

Mr. Pace spoke of the programs in the Army to help a soldier's general well-being. He mentioned the Army's extensive education program in which 180,000 men and women enroll in courses from grade school through college; the information program to provide soldiers with facts necessary to an understanding of their responsibilities, and the vast religious program which is a vital factor! in building morale.

Vitamin Eaters Sought By Army Washington (AFPS) - The

Army needs men-to eat vitamins in cold weather.

An unusual nutrition test will put 120 physically qualified en-listed men to work in the cold climate of Francis E. Warren AFB, near Cheyenne, Wyo. The men, organized into four platoons, will consume specially prepared rations spiked with Vitamins C and B Complex while they per-form normal military training

Purpose of the test is to deter-mine how ration supplements can be used to enable men to endure stress and carry on a high level of activity in Cold climates. Vol-

In "This Is War!" David Douglas Duncan has done for Korea what none of the hundreds of men with cameras achieved in World War II. He has caught war's essence as well as most of its facets: the anxiety, the loneliness, the comradeship, the humor, the terror, the heroism, the futility, the chance, the boredom and the wonder of war are here as nowhere else outside the battlefield itself.

Duncan's story is divided into three parts: Part I, The Hill; Part II, The City; Part III, Retreat, Hell! Each block of captionless photographs is preceded by a textbook which makes it possible for the reader to understand the circumstances and setting of each picture. There is no necessity for captions. Each photograph can be read for itself and the reader's perception becomes close to life-like.

The photographer-author and ex-Marine was so much a member of each group shown that the fighting men were completely unaware that they were being photographed. It was a near miracle that Duncan escaped with his own life, since he took pictures of charging men from in front of them, of men being killed beside him.

The faces of David Duncan's Marines, broken in despair at a friend's death, stoically unresponding to their own physical pain, bored, weary, hungry, hot, cold, all defy words, anyone's words. And his figures are not the isolated phantoms we saw so much of during World War II. They are wonderfully related to the endless hills, long valleys and montonous fields of Korea. The book is a tribute not only to the photographer's skill, but also to Life's darkroom which processed the films.
