

HEALTH NOTES

No Influenza Epidemic Here

For several weeks we have been discussing the respiratory disease, problem at Camp Roberts in this column. We are hoping to soon get on to some other topics of general information concerning our health. But, with the emphasis that has been placed here in addition to radio and news reports that have mentioned our Post, it is only natural that we would wonder just what the situation actually is in regards to the respiratory infections. So, let's look at the recore and get the facts.

In the past few weeks during .MR. JAMES SEAY the time that we have had an increased influx of trainees, there has been a rather high admission rate to the hospital for cases of sore throat, common cold, bronchitis, and pneumonia.

The Army is vitally concerned over whether there has been cases of influenza among these individuals. Special laboratory tests are required to make at. accurate diagnosis of influenza. And we have been conducting the necessary tests here to uncover cases of influenza if there are any present.. The results are not yet known. It is very possible that there have been a few isolated cases of "flu" among the many individuals ill with colds and related respiratory infections. But, of this we are certain.

We do not have an epidemic of influenza at Camp Roberts at

Our outbreak of respiratory di seases has shown signs of letting up this past week. And, if everyone will put into practice the practical steps we have previously mentioned in regards to personal hygiene and avoidance of unnecessary exposure, we can do much to further reduce the numoer sick from these infections.


