

past week. The threat of influenza still exists in various parts of the United States. We feel, however, that if we will maintain the preventive measures that have been previously discussed, we can avoid any sudden impact from the influenza virus, even though troops are continually arriving from scattered points throughout the country.

Of course our personnel are in contact with the surrounding community and whatever respiratory infections exist there will sooner or later exist in Camp. And prevention of respiratory disease from this source depends on following the basic steps in personal hygiene that we have already listed in this column.

Although it is repetitious, our eagerness to keep down our illness and loss of manpower from respiratory infections prompts us to list these steps again. Let us think carefully on whether or not we as individuals are living up to these fundamental safeguards:

(1) Cover the mouth and nose at times of coughing and sneezing and avoid breathing directly into the faces of others.

(2) Dress appropriately for the activity engaged in, and insofar as possible, avoid becoming overheated or chilled.

(3) Observe personal cleanliness in bathing and care of cloth-(4) Avoid unnecessary fatigue:

get your rest and eat regularly.

(5) All of these precautions are most important when you feel you are in the early stages of a cold, because your cold is most contagious at that time.

These things apply equally well to our dependents. By seeing that our children practice the steps outlined above, we can do much to keep them well. It is especially important to see that they get plenty of rest, eat well-balanced diets, and are not unnecessarily exposed to others in large gatherings. If the child shows signs of an early cold, see that he gets more rest than usual, is not permitted to become chilled or overheated, and does not expose others unnecessarily.




