### Gift Regulations Restated In 6th Army's Memo

donation and acceptance of gifts for all military and civilian personnel were reproduced in a staff memorandum issued this week by Headquarters Sixth Army.

These regulations provide that no officer, clerk or employee in the United States Government employ shall at any time solicit contributions from another for a gift to-those in a superior official position. They are also prohibited from making any donation as a present to any official superior.

Officials or clerical superiors may not receive any gifts presented to them as a contribution from persons in Government employ receiving a less salary than them-

The regulation provides that all violators shall be summarily discharged from the Government

Also prohibited is the acceptance by officers, or with the approval of the officer by members of their immediate families, of contributions, gifts or substantial loans from persons not in the Army establishment or the employ of the Government in recognition of services rendered, or from firms with whom the officers have negotiated as agents of the Govern-


