1. It is recommended that the Board take action on the following case:

NAME: HENRY, Walter G. Sgt 34 230 967

ORGANIZATION: Btry "C" 440th Armd F.A. Bn.

DATE OF DEATH: 23 December 1944

PLACE OF DEATH: Vic-of-Salm Chateau, Belgium

SYNOPSIS: The above mentioned subject casualty was the crew chief of a tank M-7 which was hit by enemy mortar fire, and burned in the vicinity of Salm Chateau, Belgium on 23 December 1944. Information contained in the Review and Determination of Status Report indicated that subject casualty was killed when his tank was hit by a mortar shell, caught fire and burned. Statement of eyewitness stated that Sgt. Henry evacuated the burning tank, but was not seen after the ensuing action. It was impossible to reach the burning tank as the intense enemy machine gun and mortar fire covering the entire area, as well as the additional fire from the exploding ammunition which the M-7 carried. It was impossible to return to the area. No attempts were made to evacuate casualties due to the tactical position of the enemy. A Field Investigation was conducted in the appropriate area on 20 August 1947 with negative results. All unknown American deceased recovered from this area relevant to this case have been checked with negative results. It is logical to conclude that Sgt Walter G. Henry was killed by enemy action when he evacuated

his burning tank in the vicinity of Salm Chateau, Belgium on 23 December 1944. That his remains were disposed of by the enemy in a manner and unknown location that precludes recovery. The fact that the Field Investigation was negative. Also the fact that all attempts to associate the remains of unknown American deceased recovered from the area meet with negative results would tend to substantiate this conclusion. It is, therefore recommended that this case be deemed Non-Recoverable.

- 2. All attached supporting documents are copied from records on file at the Hq, American Graves Registration Detachment.
- 3. Every effort has been made to correlate this case with records in this Hq pertaining to Unknown deceased interred in US Military Cemeteries and reported isolated burials. The results are negative.
- 4. It is recommended that the remains, based upon the above information and research, be declared non-recoverable.

NARRATTI VE

A very extensive and intensive investigation was conducted in the Vielsalm - Salmchateau area in order to locate remains of Sgt. Walter G. Henry. The following persons were contacted:

Mr. Albert Jeunejean, Communal Secretary at Vielsalm-Salmchateau, who declared that there are no Americans buried in the territory

of the community of Vielsalm-Salmchateau.

Sgt. Andree Ambroise, at Rencheux, Chief of the demining service in Vielsalm-Salmchateau and the territory surrounding these two towns, declared that all the corpses his service has found, had been reported to the American Graves Service which had taken away the reported bodies. For about one year now the Demining Service has not found any more bodies during its investigations in the

Vielsalm-Salmchateau area.

Fernand Desire Kesch, sergeant at the Gendarmerie Nationale at Vielsalm-Salmchateau, declared that he had assisted the American Graves Service in the search of the American deceased, that since the Americans left Vielsälm-Salmchateau, he had often searched for and asked information about American deceased, but had never found or ever heard rumors of any American Remains on the territory of Vielsalm-Salmchateau, Arbre-Fontaine, Petit Thier and

Grand-Halleux.

Sgt Fernand Kesch and this investigator interrogated all the forest-guards living in and around Vielsalm-Salmchateau, viz. H. Jacquet, Albert Rondeux, C. Gerardy, Joseph Filot, Al Bomboir. All these forest-guards state that very positively there are no more American (surface) burials on the territory they are responsible for.

MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD:

SUBJECT: Review of Circumstances Surrounding the Disappearance of Sgt Walter G. Henry.

- 1. ETO Casualty Shipment No. 005 reported that Sgt Walter G. Henry, 34230967, FA, Battery C, 440th Armored Field Artillery Battalion, was missing in action in Belgium on 23 December 1944. Under the provisions of Section 5, Missing Persons Act, a Finding of Death was issued for Sergeant Henry, setting the presumed date of his death as 24 December 1945 (SR&D No. 4973).
- 2. Missing Report, dated 27 December 1944, submitted for Sergeant Henry, states that he was with his battery in position near Salmchateau, Belgium (50°16'N 5°54'E) when they were forced to withdraw. During the withdrawal the M7 tank in which he was riding received a direct hit and went up in smoke and flames. It is stated that search was not conducted as the battery was unable to get back into the area.
- 3. On 21 March 1945 an inquiry was sent to the Commanding General, USFETO, requesting information regarding the crew of the tank (See AG 201 Guadagno, Joseph). The following statements were supplied by the 15th indorsement to this correspondence:

Statement by 1st Lt John C. Hipson, 01173644, dated 10 April 1945:

"I am Executive Officer of Battery 'C', 440th Armored F.A. Battalion and on the 23 December 1944 I was in a concealed position a few yards from the M-7 in which Pvt. Guadagno. 32696139 was riding when the vehicle was caught by mortar and small arms fire from German troops on a nearby ridge. The M-7 was hit directly by a large mortar. At the time of the shelling Pvt. Guadagno and another member of the crew. Pvt. Amrhine: were crouched below the armor to avoid the small arms fire directed at them. Sgt. Henry, the crew chief, was in the turret and is believed to have escaped serious injury from the mortar fragments. Whether or not he was able to evade capture during the melee is doubtful. Pvt. Still and Pvt. Favello were outside the vehicle attempting to release the brake on the trailer and both were along side of the M-7 using it for protection from machine gun fire when the mortar struck. Pvt Still was snaking up over the side of the M-7 when the mortar hit and is believed to have been killed instantaneously when the side of the M-7 was hit as the round landed almost in the exact spot where he was attempting to enter the vehicle.

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Tdentification moons

Pvt. Favello escaped to a nearby ditch. Pvt. Osborne who has been LWA and evacuated recently stated that he saw Sgt. Henry on the ground apparently unhurt after the hit. At present Pvt. Osborne's location is unknown as he was evacuated.

"Pvt. Diconcilio, another member of the tank is hospitalized as indicated in paragraph 1, 4th indorsement. Tec 5 Dispenziere, the M-7 driver is believed to be somewhere in the United States.

*** It is known that Tec 5 Dispenziere has information regarding this case that would prove valuable, as he has indicated such in letters to his friends in the battery. He remarked in one of these letters that he would explain it all when he got to the United States and was able to send a letter that would pass the censorship regulations. Such letter has not been received to date. Tec 5 Dispenziere was the last man to leave the vehicle after it was hit."

Statement by 1st Lt. John C. Hipson, dated 14 April 1945:

"I further state that on the 23 December 1944 when the M-7 of Battery C, 440th Armored Field Artillery was hit by an enemy mortar shell, it was impossible to reach the vehicle and check on the damage. There was intense enemy machine gun and mortar fire covering our entire area as well as the additional fire from the exploding ammunition which the M-7 carried. The battery had been given march order and most of the vehicles had left the position. This particular M-7 was one of the last vehicles in the order of march. To have stopped another vehicle to aid the M-7 which had been knocked out would probably have resulted in the loss of another vehicle and crew. At the time the entire battalion was in danger of complete encirclement so it was imperative that the battery move out rapidly.

"When the tank was hit by the mortar shell it caught fire instantaneously and within five minutes its load of ammunition was exploding. When I left the area the chasis, and engine were burning fiercely. It was impossible to return to the area to investigate the damages incurred as the position was overrun and held by the enemy. When it was possible to return to the area, Capt. Lee J. Farrell the battery commander, made an investigation but could not ascertain the extent of damages due to the fact that the ground was covered by three feet of snow."

Statement by M Sgt Walter Rader, 36313558, dated 10 April 1945:

"On the 23 of December 1944 I was in my tank recovery vehicle approximately fifty yards from the M-7 of which Pvt Joseph Guadagno, 32 696 139, Battery C, 440th Armored FA Battalion, was a crew member. Enemy small arms and mortar fire was falling in our immediate vicinity. Due to increasing pressure by the enemy 'C' battery displaced and as Pvt Guadagno's tank moved out it was hit by what appeared to me to be a mortar shell. The shell fell directly into the tank. As the shell hit I saw one of the crew members jump from the tank while one of the two who were at the rear of the trailer made off later to be picked up by a passing vehicle. When I left the area flames were shooting from the vehicle."

Statement by Pvt Louis Favelo, 39842361, dated 10 April 1945:

"On the 23 December 1944 I was in the same gun section with Pvt. Joseph Guadagno, 32696139. We had just gotten march order and some of the M-7's were pulling out of the area, when we were fired upon by German troops from a nearby ridge. All members of the crew were within the tank except Pvt. Still and myself. We were attempting to release the brake on our trailer when we came under heavy small arms fire. Pvt. Still and I ran along side the tank for cover and a large mortar shell hit the tank just as Pvt. Still was about to crawl into the tank. I ran to a nearby ditch for protection and afterwards made my way to the battalion CP where I was picked up by a staff member who took me to my battery's new area.

"To the best of my knowledge all members of the crew except Pvt. Still and myself were in the tank when the shell hit."

4. In response to an inquiry dated 9 August 1945, Tec 5 Benjamin C. Dispenziere, 32235041, furnished the following information concerning the loss of his tank and crew (See AG 201 Henry):

"On 23 December 1944 our tank was with 5 other tanks engaged in combat with the enemy. We received word that the Germans had broken through and were coming up on our right flank. We were ordered to pull out to get in better position. I was the last tank to start pulling out. There was snow on the ground which kept us from turning around quickly. Just as I was about half turned around, we were fired on with small arms. There were

so many bullets flying that I couldn't shut the front shutter. We decided to try to escape with the tank but just then I saw a long barrel poked over the hill. It looked like an '88'. Just as we were picking up speed, we were hit in the side by this gun.

"The tank immediately stopped moving and I was knocked out for a few seconds. The tank was on fire and I turned around to see my buddies. The flames were so thick that I couldn't make any of them out. I heard Joe Guadagno yelling for me and I tried to get him out. I crawled over to the .50 cal. machine gun and sprayed the enemy foot troops who were coming up. Just then, another large shell hit the tank. I decided to abandon it and crawled out starting for the woods. I kept crawling until I was picked up by the Medics.

"I did not see any of the crew after we were hit except Pfc. Nicholas DiConcilio. He was running for the woods and got hit and fell. I did not see anyone else get out of the tank. As soon as I was out of the tank, I crawled away as fast as I could. I think that Sgt. Henry, Pvt. Amrhine, and Pvt. Guadagno must have been burned in the tank. Pvt. Guadagno was dead right after the first hit when I tried to get him out."

- 5. a. Burial Report for Private Floyd Amrhine, 35564416, shows that his remains were recovered from the tank with the remains of one other person. The place of death is shown as Provedroux, Belgium. (50°15'N-5°54'E). The cause of death is given as a direct hit by a high explosive shell and burns.
- b. Burial Report for Private James W. Still, 34706786, shows that he died at Bovigny, Belgium. (50°13'N 5°55'N) Cause of death is shown as shrapnel wounds of the head. The remains were identified by an identification tag. Date of death was estimated as 1 January 1945.
- 6. The information furnished by the preceding statements gives no definite proof of the death of Sergeant Henry, and he is reported to have been seen alive and apparently unburt on the ground after the tank was hit

and disabled. As the area was almost immediately taken over by the enemy, search was not possible until several days later when three feet of snow prevented a thorough search. The possibility is presented, therefore, that Sergeant Henry was captured and died later of unknown circumstances. A report of death under the provisions of Section 9 of the Missing Persons Act cannot be justified, then, until further information has been received.

SUBJECT: Review and Determination of Status Under the Missing Persons Act

I. - FACTS

1. The following named persons have been carried on War Department records as missing in action, not in flying pay status, in the European Area, since 23 December 1944, as reported by ETO Shipment Number as indicated:

3. In the Casualty File of Sergeant Henry is a "MISSING REPORT" dated 25 December 1944, signed by Captain Lee J. Farrell, which is quoted in pertinent part as follows:

"ORG Btry "C" 440th (A) FA Bn

"MISSION Supporting withdrawal

"LOCALITY LAST SEEN Salmchateau, Belgium

APR 19 1950 Bran "DETAILED RESUME OF CIRCUMSTANCES SURROUNDING DISAPPEARANCE: Field Artillery Battery in position. When moving out of position we were attacked with sniper pistols and mortars. One got a direct hit in an M7 and it went up in smoke and flames. Later it was still burning when flown over by a Liaison plane. He was riding in the M7.

"REMARKS: Unable to get back to that area".

The following statements concerning Sergeant Henry are quoted in pertinent part:

MOSIAL MODA(1) Statement of First Lieutement John C. Hipson, dated 10 April 1945.

120181 991 "I am Executive Officer of Battery "C", 440th Armored F. A. Battalion and on the 23 December 1944 I was in a concealed position a few yards from the M-7 in which * * * was riding when the vehicle was caught by mortar and small arms fire from German troops on a nearby ridge. The M-? was directly by a large martar. * * * Sgt Henry, the crew chief, was in the turret and is believed to have escaped serious injury from the mortar fragments. Whether or not he was able to evade capture during the melee is doubtful.

S. R. & D. No. 4973

- * * *Pvt. Osborne who has been LWA and evacuated recently stated that he saw Sgt Henry on the ground apparently unhart after the hit."
- (2) Statement of First Lieutenant John C. Hipson, dated 14 April 1945.

"I further state that on the 23 December 1944 when the M-7 of Battery C, 440th Armored Field Artillery Battalion was hit by an enemy mortar shell it was impossible to reach the vehicle and check on the damage. There was intense enemy machine gun and mortar fire covering our entire area as well as the additional fire from the exploding ammunition which the M-7 carried.* *

"When the tank was hit by the mortar shell it caught
fire instantaneously and within five minutes its load of
ammunition was exploding. When I Feft the area the chasis,
and engine were burning fiercely. * * * when it was possible
to return to the area, Capt Lee J. Farrell the battery commander,
made an investigation but could not ascertain the extent of
damages due to the fact that the ground was covered by three feet
of snow".

(3) Statement of Private James H. Osborne, dated 1 May 1945.

"As I came out of the tank I saw Sgt Henry jump off the tank in front and I did not see him after that but I am sure that he did jump off the tank."

II. - CONCLUSIONS

- 2. Sergeant Henry became missing in action 23 December 1944, when the tank, of which he was the crew chief, was hit by mortar and small arms fire From German troops during a combat mitssion in the vicinity of SALMCHATEAU, Belgium. The tank caught fire instantaneously and within five minutes its ammunition was exploding. Sergeant Henry was seen to leave the tank but was not seen following the ensuing action.
- 24. In view of the foregoing facts and circumstances, together with the fact that no report has been received in the War Department during the twelve months which have clapsed since the inception of the subject persons' missing in action status indicating that they are alive, it is concluded that they may not "reasonably be presumed to be living" within the meaning of Section 5 of the Missing Person Act.

AFTER ACTION REPORT

440TH ARMORED F. A. BN

On the 22nd of December 44, to better secure our positions we withdrew by infiltration to Salmchateau. As always one battery registered and continued firing while the other two displaced. We fired 41 missions expending 1054 rounds in support of TF Jones. The Boche weather continues and observation is poor. At 0400 hours on the morning of 23 December 44 the CP guards and outpost #1 reported that enemy paratroops were landing near our positions. All men were immediately alerted but it was not possible to determine whether paratroops had landed or supplies were being dumped to the enemy. Chutes were definitely seen, however, We fired 487 rounds this date. Observation continues to be poor. This date the 7th Armored Division began a withdrawal, as our flanks had given away and we were almost completely encircled with only one road remaining open. The 440th was used as covering protection. By 1400 the division had cleared and we began to withdraw to Goronno. The firing batteriews were sent ahead singly, Jerry had the escape route zeroed in and fired interdicting fire continuously. A direct hit was scored on a C Btry M-7 destroying it and causing 6 casualties, four missing in action and two evacuated. We began firing immediately after getting into position at Goronno. We learned soon after that our forward observers together with Task Force Jones needed help desperately. Although Lt. Schwartz's transmitter was out he managed to conduct fire by a series of taps and clicks for range and deflection changes.






