UNIT HISTORI

The 48th Armored Infantry Battalion began the year 1945 in a rest area north of Manhay, Belgium. The battalion CP was located in the small town of Terrieres. The unit had just pulled back from its epic stand at St. Vith and its heart-breaking Christmas Eve engagement at Manhay and the subsequent recapture of that important road center.

From 1 thru 11 January, the battalion remained in the vicinity of Rouge Meniere, Belgium, recuperating and recovering from the strenuous action of the last weeks of 1944. Intense training was undertaken in anti-tank measures and the gamin grenade was first experimented with.

Battalion Surgeon

On 12 January we moved to Marteau, a suburb of Spa, some 15 miles away. Spa had been the site of 1st Army Headquarters until the time of the breakthrough when the Army had fled. However, it still kept most of the town with its empty, luxurious kotels "Off Limits" and consequently the fighting soldiers of the 48th were forced to billet in barns and stables -- when they were able to get inside at all.

From 13 thru 19 January, training was carried on and continual reconnaissance was in progress in the area around Waimes, north of St. Vith, the objective of the next operation.

The battalion moved out at 2100 for Waimes. The entire trip was made during darkness, intense cold and a blinding snowstorm. The last three miles was so difficult because of the drifting snow that the reconnaissance officer had to lead the column on foot. "A" Company remained in TFA under LT. COL. CHAPPUIS, "B" CANCELLE OF the 509 Parachute Infantry Battalion, and "C" Company went with TrC Commanded by LT. COL. ERLENBUSCH of the 31st Tank Battalion. in at 0300 and LT. COL. CHAPPUIS reported to CC "B" at /8907 DSOAUTHORRY OF THE ADJUGATER GENERAL any time after 0800. At 0830 the

TFA and TFB made preparations to attack E. against Born. The E-W railroad running into Born was the left boundary of TFA which was on the left of TFB. The two forces reached a general N-S line approximately 1100 yards west of Born when they were stopped. At 1730 one company of TFB actually entered the town but was driven out with the loss of three tanks. Major STEVENSON went to the assaulting elements of both task forces and arranged for a coordinated attack following a 10 minute artillery preparation at 2130. The attack was delayed by a heavy snow squall which limited visibility to 50 yards but recommenced at 2345. Heavy nebelwerfer fire began falling around the battalion CP at 2300 with the resultant loss of 1 man killed, 13 wounded and on half-track destroyed.

By 0200 on the 21st of January, "B" Company had occupied its sector of Born. No contact could be established with TFC which had been attacking due south against Born. In consequence A/48 was sent forward to pass thru B/48 and secure that portion of the town east of the railroad. This was successfully accomplished against intense small arms, sniper and automatic weapons fire and the mission completed at 1500. "B" Company and TFB succeeded in securing the western part of the town by 1600. A/38 and A/31 were sent into town at 1730, A/38 to bolster B/48 and A/31 to support both A and B/48.

B/48 was alerted at 0230, 22 January, prepared to move at 0900. This company was attached to the 31st Tank Battalion with the mission of attacking Hunningen. C/48 relieved B/48 in the latters defensive position. The remainder of the command spent the morning improving the defenses of the town. Born, during this period, was subject to considerable harassing fire which knocked out two supply trucks, and a third ran over a mine. Casualties for the period were: 1 officer and 7 EM killed, 1 officer and 34 EM wounded and 10 men missing in action.

At 0400 on 23 January the 48th was attached to CC"R". The CO, S-3 and Limison Officer reported to CC"R" headquarters for instructions. Plans for the actual assault on St. Vith were completed at 0730 and the company commanders and S-3 made a reconnaissance forward to the LD which was the E-W road through Hunningen. CC mission was to take St. Vith and the high ground to the East. 48th A.I. B. (less "B" Co.) plus B/40 had St. Vith itself as the objective. At 1030 CC"R" was relieved of its attack and the 48th was re-attached to CC"B". Plan of attack was changed as follows: using the same LD But with three task forces abreast, TF Rhae on the east would take St. Vith, TF Beatty in the center would sweep down the main road from Hunningen into St. Vith and TF Chappuis on the right would envelop the town from the west. B/40 in TF Chappuis was replaced by A/31. Attack was scheduled for 1300 but was postponed until 1415.

At 1415, TF Chappuis crossed the LD in a column of companies: "C" followed by "A" plus the MG platoon, 1st platoon of A/31 accompanied C/48. AG and 81mm mortar platoons were in position near LD to fire on targets of opportunity. The remainder of A/31 remained in Hunningen until the road to St. Vith could be cleared of mines. Enemy ground opposition was light but his artillery was heavy, particularly in the Hunningen area. The objective was taken at 1745. Companies were disposed as follows: C/48, south edge of city, A/48, S-W and W of Town. As of 2100, C.O. 48th was placed in command of defenses of St. Vith, by C.G., CC"B". At the same time C/48 encountered 2 assault gums and 40 infantry. One AG was knocked out and 8 prisoners were taken. Some artillery and nebelwerfer continued to fall in the town throughout the night.

With St. Vith and its network of roads secured, the general direction of attack swung eastward. On the 24th, C.O./48 was ordered by C.G./60"B" to schedule an

assualt on the high ground east of the city for the following day. Remainder of the 24th was spent consolidating positions. Tanks and TD's were brought up but, because of bomb damage to St. Vith, they could not get close to the infantry. For the attack of the 25th, TF Chappuis was made up of the 48th, plus A/31, plus B/87, C/17, D/87 and the AG and 81mm mortar platoons of the 31st. Enemy continued to harass St. Vith with nebelwerfer fire and one round landed by the C/48 CP killing 4 men and wounding 9 others.

At 0600, 25 January 1945, companies "A" and "B" crossed the LD just E of St. Vith as scheduled. By 0900, "A" Company which had been attacking southeasterly, had secured its objective and dug in. "B" Company, which had been attacking due ease, encountered intense resistance about 600 yards on one side of its objective. Due to road blocks, mines and deep snow, "B" Company's supporting tanks were valueless. The engineers managed, by 1400, to get the road open so the tanks could procede up to the infantry positions. In the meantime, "B" Company had been taking heavy casualties and was forced to dig in short of its goal. Plans were formulated at 1800 to have C/48 pass through "B" at 260700 January and seize the objective.

Everything went as planned on the morning of the 26th and "C" Company secured its objective at 0810. "B" Company reverted to Bn Reserve and was directed to establish road blocks to the East, South and West of St. Vith.

At 1930, on the night of 26 January, TF Chappuis was ordered to continue the attack to the east and seize the high ground at 895-877. This wholly fantastic and utterly useless maneuver had been conceived by 18th Corps (Airborne) and had come down through channels. The battalion had been sustaining consistently heavy casualties and the men had had no rest and little sleep in six days of battle thru heavy snow and intense cold. Each day we were promised that this attack would be the last and that then there would be relief. Yet every day another objective was named and the men driven on to it. The repeated broken promises, even without the factors of cold, hunger and wet, had reduced morale to its lowest ebb.

This latest attack was to be made by C/48, A/33, 1/A/31 and TF Thomasik(the 509 Parachute Infantry Battalion which by now had been reduced in strength to 4 officer and 60 enlisted men). C/48 was down to 5 officers and 96 effectives, and A/33 to 5 officers and 128 men.

The attack jumped off as scheduled at 1000, 27 January 1945. By 1130, the companies were pinned down by intense small arms, mortar and machine gun fire plus assault gun, artillery and nebelwerfer. At 1600, C/48 received permission to dig in for the night. The flanking units, A/33 on the right, and TF Thomasik on the left, had also been unable to advance and they too dug in. C.G./CG"B" reported that Division had ordered the 38th A.I. Bn. to attack on the night of 27 January thru the line held by the 48th.

At 0100, "A" and C/38 attacked as scheduled and seized the objective at 0300. At 0700, B/38 attempted to go thru C/48's lines, it was pinned down by fire from the woods thru which "A" and C/38 had passed in the middle of the night. At 1400 tanks were brought up and delivered large amounts of machine gun fire into the enemy pocket. At 1730, B/38 was successful in reaching the other two companies. At 1800, C.O. 2nd Bn., 345th Inf. Regt.,87th Inf. Div. met with the C.O.'s of the 38th and 48th Armored Infantry Bns. to coordinate plans for relief. Relief began at 2100 and was completed at 0130, 29 January 1945.

At 0300 on 29 January, following the relief by the 87th Inf. Div., the company commanders assembled at the Battalion CP to receive orders for the march to Welkenraedt, Belgium, just north of Eupen and 15 miles east of Verviers. The march began at 1110 and the battalion was closed in at 1545.

The month of rest and recuperation at Welkenraedt officially began on 30 January. All the men were in billets and most of the men had beds. On the 30th a training program was instituted and on the 31st all men were given an opportunity for hot showers and an exchange of clothing. On 1 February, there still remained almost 100 men who were receiving treatment for sore feet induced by their arduous experiences at St. Vitk. New reinforcements were received, processed and trained. Beginning on the 6th, assault teams were organized in each company.

On 12th February work was begun on a program of highway rehabilitation under Army supervision. The purpose of this work was to get the supply lines in sufficiently good condition to sustain an offensive to the Rhine. This work continued until 27 February at which time the battalion was alerted for movement on 1 March.

The battalion moved beginning at 0900, 1 March, to Steckenborn overlooking the Roer River Dams. This town was completely destroyed by repeated shellings and bombings, not one house remained intact. However, many of the men had to move into cellars or shovel quantities of debris from rooms, the entire battalion managed to get under cover.

With its arrival in Steckenborn, the 48th was detached from CC"B" and attached to CC"R".

On 2 March, CC"R" was split into task forces. TF Chappuis was composed of the 48th, less company "A", "A" company of the 40th Tank Bn, 1 platoon of C/33 Engineers, 1 platoon of B/814 and one platoon of D/40.

The scheduled attack never materialized because other units captured the assigned objectives and on 5 March the 48th reverted to GC"B". Training was carried on during the waiting period.

On the 7th, the battalion was alerted for movement east toward the Rhine and at 0815 began the movement. In the meantime we had again returned to GC"R" control.

At 0815 on 8 March the battalion moved through Schmidt, Hasenfield, Heinback, and Vlatten to Brubkeu, Tussuich, Vettweiss, Disternick, Derbaum and Ollheim to Volmershausen. The battalion closed in at 2030. The entire trip had been, to all intents and purposes, a road march though as we approached Boun, we did encounter some lon-range artillery.

A battalion of the 60th Regtl. Combat Team had been having a hard fight on the high ridge overlooking the city of Boun. B and C/48 moved out a 0330 and passed through the 2nd Battalion, 60th Infantry. Artillery support was furnished by the 9th Infantry Division. The attack met little opposition though 110 PWs were taken and the companies advanced rapidly thru Ippendorf, Dottendorf and Friesdorf to the Rhine. Battalion CP moved from Volmershausen to Ippendorf.

Dispositions on the 10th and 11th remained the same: B and C Companies on the Rhine, A Company in reserve in Ippendorf and Headquarters' Company's heavy weapons generally in the Ippendorf area.

On 12 March the troops in Ippendorf moved to Kessernick, a suburb of Boun, and "A" Company outposted the town.

From 13 through 23 March the battalion remained static along the west bank of the Rhine while the units on the east bank expanded the Remagen Bridgehead up across our front. Since we were the northernmost unit in the Division, our front was the last to be masked.

On 23 March the Bn. CO reported to CC"B" headquarters for instructions regarding movement across the Rhine. All vehicle markings were obliterated and patches were covered.

The following evening at 1800 the battalion began the move from Kessernich and crossed the Rhine at Remagen at 2220 and was closed in at Chlenburg at 0100. Task Force Chappuis consisted of the 48th Armored Infantry Battalion, less "A" and "B" Companies, B/31st Tank Battalion, 1/A/33 Armored Engineer Battalion and 1/C/814 Tank Destroyer Battalion.

Movement orders were received and issued at 2330 on 25 March and at 0600 on 26th, the 48th crossed the I Pat Krethaus as part of CC"B", the Division reserve. A halthwas made mear Bonefield at 0845. Later, without encountering opposition, the Task Force moved on to Krummel and closed in there at 1915.

At 0445 on the 26th the command moved out from Krummel and reached Oberhausen at 1300, a distance of $33\frac{1}{2}$ miles. There was no action worth recording. The enemy was fleeing in disorder and the roads were littered with supplies and equipment which had been abandonned. Even tanks which had run out of gas were left by the roadside.

The Tactical Air Force had done a superb job on the 24th and 25th and literally hundreds of dead horses were strewn in the fields and along the highways, many of them were still in the traces, attached to wrecked wagons.

At westerburg the population was just recovering from a terrific aerial bombardment which was aimed at a major German CP located there. The town was an utter shambles. Bomb craters 30 feet in diameter and up to 10-15 feet deep were no uncommon. The populace still appeared dazed and in a state of shock.

The battalion cleared Oberhausen at 0600 on the 28th and moved north and then east to Lollar where it freed Oflag 12B, the German PW camp for British field officers and generals. Among the 300 officers were 13 brigadiers. Battalion bivouaced at Rutterhausen at 1930. There was some action during the day but it was of a minor nature and only the forward elements were committed. Prisoners were now surrendering in hordes and it was common to see a column of Germans two and three abreast coming marching down the road as our vehicles moved forward. Later in the evening three of our supply trucks were ambushed by 88 fire and 3500 gallons of gasoline, plus water and rations for 1,000 men were destroyed. Fortunately none of the truck crews were injured.

Movement on the 29th began at 0700 and at 1030, as the Reconnaissance Platoon entered Deckenback it found a whole German supply unit resting and eating. A cordon of troops was quickly thrown around the town and over 500 prisoners were taken from it. The prisoner-haul was so great that the Corps PW cage was moved up to our position instead of, as usual, our sending men back to the cage.

In addition, on the 29th, another enemy column was trapped and destroyed and an ammunition dump was blown up.

Another combat command was having difficulties with some troops recently arrived from Denmark whose defense of Kerchain was fanatical. Task Force Chappuis was ordered to aid the assault on the town and moved around it, arriving at Stausebach at 2030. By morning, however, the situation had quieted and the 48th, was not needed.

The attack was resumed at 0600 on the 30th with the objective, the seizure of the Eder Stau Sea and its huge dams, the largest in Europe. At Meklen, just below the dams, the Task Force deployed across a ridge parallel to the Eder River overlooking the three bridges at Affoldern, Mehlen and Beigheim. The German 20mm ACK-ACK outfit occupying the corresponding ridge across the river began covering our hillside and the bridge approaches with automatic fire. Our 57's, using HE, quickly brought heavy fire on the German positions. Meantime three infantry spearheads thrust out, one toward each bridge. As the three platoons neared the bridges, the spans to the north and south were blown and only the one at Mehlen remained. Sensing that it too, might go up at any time, a reconnaissance sergeant, S/Sgt. James A. Malley, raced his quarter-ton truck across the structure. Just as he reached the east bank, and began to search underneath to destroy any demolitions which might be present on the supports, he was struck by a fragment of a 20mm shell and was seriously wounded. Because of Malley's quick thinking and courage the bridge was saved intact. With this bridge as a means of access to the east bank, the Task Force quickly overran the enemy positions, killing some 20 Germans, capturing 14 20mm anti-aircraft guns and capturing about 100 prisoners. Within two hours of the time the 48th captured the bridge, elements of the 2d Infantry and 9th Armored Divisions passed thru us to continue the attack towards Kassel.

The time from 31 March through 2 April was spent in thoroughly combing the surrounding area and in resting and rehabilitating the command.

This phase, the capture of the Eder Dams, culminated what Major General Van Fleet, Commanding III Corps characterized as "a classic example of the correct use of armor."

On 3 April, the Task Force made a brief administrative march to Alberthausen. After we had been in the new CP several hours, two battle-clad German soldiers walked down from the attic and started out the front door.

The following morning at 0900, TF Chappuis moved out in the order: Ren/48, Hq/48, Hq Go/48, Med/48, G/48, A/48, B/48, 1/A/33 and 1/G/814 and traveled 54 miles westward toward the "Ruhr Pocket" whose destruction was our next mission. The battalion closed into Tangewiese at 2030.

Conditions in the Pokket were slightly confused and there was much talk of such and such a division spearheading up to cover our flanks. Units seem to approach close, then veer away like will'o whisps. Elements of the 9th Infantry were, however in Oberskirchen and there CC"B" was to pass through them.

At 0700 on the 5th, C/48 followed by "B" and A/48 began a dismounted attack from Oberskirchen toward Almert. The route was up a drau toward the saddle in which Almert was located. The town was captured despite severe casualties and intense enemy fire from self-propelled guns occupying the high ground which commanded the town. In addition the enemy was able to place quantities of mortar and automatic weapons fire all along the saddle. When "C" had secured the town, "B" swung wide in an effort to secure the high wooded ridge to the north which commanded the area. Despite the large amount of fire it received, and the loss of its commander, the company did succeed in securing its objective. Almost immediately it was blanketed by terrific mortar concentrations which were closely followed by a heavy counterattack. "B" attempted to hold on two successive defensive positions but each time the now badly-deceivated company was flanked and pushed back still farther. A third position, about 1000 yards east of the objective was finally taken up and held.

During the night of the 5th, "A" Company, which had thus far been in battalion reserve, made a wide flanking movement thru the woods south of the axis of advance. The Almert-Schmallenberg road, and took up a position from which it could launch a dawn attack against Grafschaft.

Due to delays regarding the coordination of artillery and orders from higher headquarters, the scheduled dawn attack did not begin until 1100. Corps Artillery which had been pounding the town for two days, let loose a terrific barrage and as it ended "A" Company closed in and caught the Germans, who had not even dreamed of attack from the south, wholly by surprise. The town was quickly seized and outposted. "B" Company, meantime, was puching toward its objective of the 5th. "C" Company remained posted in Almert and cleared the road from Almert to Grafschaft.

During the night of 6-7 April, "C" Company made a wide envelopment of Schnallenberg to the south, "A" Company meantime moved up thru the woods "B" Company had cleared and took up a position to attack Schmallenberg from the east simultaneously with "C"s assault from the south. Throughout the night, corps artillery continued to deliver fire on Schmallenberg and at 1110, 7 April behind a barrage laid by Corps Artillery and two armored battalions, "A" and "C" launched their attacks. Several P-47s did excellent close-support strafing of the town.

The town of Schmallenberg was cleared at 1600 after a stiff engagement. One tank, supporting C/48 was knocked out. "B" Company moved into the town, as task force recerve, close on the heels of the absault companies. The forward CP moved into Schmallenberg at 1500 and the rear CP consolidated with the forward at 1700.

The late afternoon and early evening were spent organizing the defense of the town and clearing the woods surrounding it.

On the morning of 8 April, "B" Company attacked and captured the town of Obinghausen, whose defenders had been stunned by an intense barrage, without any casual ties.

Earling on the 9th, other elements of the Division passed through Schmallenberg and consequently our defenses were reduced merely to outposts. It was anticipated that we would spend the second night there. Shortly before dark, however, orders were received to make an administrative march to Kohbenrode. Movement began at 1900. A/48 was attached to TF Beatty, B/48 went to TF Erlenbusch. Just north of Arpe, the lead vehicles of the battalion became mixed and permission was granted to halth for the night along the road and to continue the march at

At 0430 on the 10th, one platoon of C/48 and an engineer platoon began filling in the swamping stretch of road and by 0600 the task force was able to pass on through the bog to Kohbenrode. Here, C/31, 1/C/814 and 1/A/33 joined TO Chappuis. The attack began at 1100 and had hardly passed the outskirts of the town when it encountered a road block defended by a Mark IV tank and a number of light machine guns. Before the block could be reduced, the tank was destroyed and 10 MG 42s captured. White phosporous did excellent work in burning the woods in which the machine guns were located.

Because of the steep, broken terrain and the dense woods, progress was slow and difficult. One C/31 tank sustained from direct hits. In one tiny hamlet which commanded a vital raod junction, the Germans had placed three Mark IV tanks and, fatther back, a towed 88mm AT gun. The 88 was destroyed by fire from our TDs and the tanks were destroyed when the 48th's assault gun platoon burned the town with white phosporous and drove them into the open where the TD's could knock them out. Infantry immediately mounted on tanks and pushed on to Kuckelheim which was taken with little opposition. Approximately 300 prisoners were taken out of the two towns. Though Kuckelheim fell at 2130, sporadic sniping from the surrounding woods continued until 2300.

On the morning of the 11th, the attack was resumed at 0800 and progressed rapidly to Nieder Salway against which C/48 made a successful dismounted attack. TF Beatty passed through TF Chappuis and went out to attack Ober Salway. A bomb dropped by air support working with TF Beatty slightly damaged one of TFC's tanks and another was destroyed by enemy fire. The towns of Neider and Ober Salway were strongly outposted and the huge hill commanding the town was combed

Movement on the 12th began at 1430 when CC"B" moved east past the big ridge line, then north and finally westward once more to a small town, Langenholthausen, where the 48th closed in at 2200. This was a particularly exciting day because of the prisoners being flushed by the combat command moving ahead of us. At one point a whole German Corps staff came driving in to a PW enclosure in their own staff cars, accompanied by their motorcycle escorts, under the guard of one captain and his peep driver.

Friday, 13 April, was sort of a "Black Friday" for all of us, though easualties, everything considered, were negligible, IF Chappuis was released from CC"B" and attached to GC"A". The attack progressed toward and moved where the lead elements

Began receiving fire from a Mark IV tank. The rest of the column was harrassed by two roving SPs which gave us a rather nerve-wracking time with their persistent near-misses and superbly-laid air bursts.

The attack was delayed slightly before Wettmausen where three Mark IV tanks held a road junction commanding the axis of advance. "C" Company executed a wide flanking movement and captured a well-dug-in infantry position about 87 prisoners in all. A flight of P47 fighter-bombers attacked the tanks at the crossreads, knocked one cut, and forced the rest to withdraw. Once these obstacles were cleared, the attack progressed rapidly to Eisborn. As soon as "C" company had taken the town, the tanks and TDs moved in to defend it against a possible counterattack.

Eisborn was located atop a very steep slope leading some two miles down into a river valley. The town, more or less in terraces, seemed to hang on the hill's slope. Throughout the night a roving gun or two in the valley continued to throw screaming high velocity shells into the town. At 0200 on the 14th, task force Commanding Officer received orders from the Combat Commands to launch an immediate attack westward down the slope. The task force small unit commanders and staff had been studying the maps of the area and had long since given up that plan as impossible of execution. In consequence a message was sent to the Combat Commander stating that the occupation and control of Eisborn demanded that we remain in our present location until daybreak. Permission was given to remain. Subsequently we travelled up the river road and noted that the route we had been directed by the CO, CC"A" to follow in the middle of the night led over a 50 foot high rock cliff. To have moved as originally directed would have been akin to suicide.

At 0930 on the 14th, we began moving back to Hovel and reverted to CC"B" control at noon. There were no further orders so we remained there for the night.

The following morning was spent studying plans for the next operation, a slashing attack designed to link the forces north and south of the Ruhr pocket. If Chappuis was initially in Gombat Command Reserve, scheduled to pass through either of the other task forces as the situation demanded. Because these forces were successful in reaching, securing and holding their respective objectives and because the German Panzer Corps commander realized further resistance was hopeless and made overtures of surrender to the Seventh Armored Division Commander, our IF was halted on the road and moved into an assembly area without being committed. Later on the same afternoon, 15 April, the attached units were released and A and B/48 reverted to Battalion control.

At 1300 on the 16th, the Combat Command began an administrative march east to Gottingen via Schmallenberg, Wintersberg, Medebach, Isthor, Kassel and Munden. The 48th closed at Gross Schueen, some 6 miles west of Gottingen, at 0630 on the 17th having traveled a distance of 153 miles. This march was notable because full headlights were authorized throughout the column for the first time since coming overseas.

From 17 through 29 April Bn. Hq., Hq. Co., "C" Co., Svc. Co., and the Medical Detachment remained at Gross Schneen and "A" and "B" Companies at Elkershausen. During this period, following two days devoted to rest and rehabilitation, a regular training schedule was carried out, particularly stressing physical conditioning of the troops.

UNIT HISTORY (Gont'd.)

The three half tracks in each rifle company anti-tank platoon were converted into M-24 81mm mortar carriers. The 57mm gun had proven practically valueless thru the preceding nine months of combat and it was hoped that these mortar-batteries would be far more worthwhile. The company commanders and anti-tank platoon leaders were particularly in favor of the changeover. Though the mortars never did have an opportunity to fire tactically prior to the war's end, they did excellent work in practice problems.

The battalion moved out from Gross Schueen at 0530 on the 30th and moved northeast through Brunswick, Celle, and Aldendorf to Sukze, where it closed in at 1915 after a trip of 141 miles.

The Seventh Armored was assigned to XVIII Corps (Airborne) which was attached to the British Second Army. Within the battalion, Hq. & Hq. Co. "C" and Sve. Co. were attached to GG"A", "A" Company was attached to GG"R" and "B" Company was attached to the 87th Recon Sqd. which was in Division Reserve.

The battalion moved at 0900 on the 2nd of May to Starkshorn where, with the addition of 1/B/17th, 1/C/17 and 1/D/17 plus 1/A/814 and 2 squads B/33, TF Chappuis was organized.

The unit proceeded northeast to the Elbe River which it crossed at Brizenberg at about 2200 on the 2nd. Hardly had the force cleared the river than it began meeting long columns of mounted and dismounted Germans who were coming in to surrender. The remainder of the night from 0200 on, was spent at a castle at Setzin, 238402, Lanenberg, K-5, 1:100,000. Distance travelled: 742 miles.

Prior to the Task Force's departure at 1300 on the 3rd May, many of the officers and men went about a mile back to the main road to watch the seemingly endless columns of surrendering Germans go by en route to the several Pw Cages set up in the area. These Germans were afoot, in earts, on horseback, clinging to huge trailers pulled by tractors, in autos and on bicycles. Many, if not most, of the officers had their wives or mistresses with them and some even had their children along.

The route for the day led almost due north to the Baltic, beyond Klutz. The three task forces of GC"A" followed in column and each dropped off at a certain designated city and took over the surrounding territory. The 48th's destination was Kalkhorst, the most northern of all, stretching along the Baltic. There was no action anyplace along the route which was lined with hundreds of vehicles and thousands of soldiers, nearly all of them desperately anxious to surrender.

The force closed in to Kalkhorst and occupied a Nitter Jugend school-eastle just SW of town at 1700. Immediate measures were taken to search out and capture any German soldiers who might be kiding in the region. This search continued on the 4th.

At 1200 on the 5th of May, the 48th, less B Company, reverted to CC"B" control and moved south to Badow, A/48 set up at Pokrant, C/48 at Gross Welzin, Hq. & Hq. Company at Badow, Svc. Company and Medical Det. at Boddin.

This was the last move of the war and ended on 2200 combat miles which had begun on Utah Beach on 10 August, 1944. The epic drive has been commemorated

in the "Lucky Seventh's" new slogan, "From the Beaches to the Baltic."

The command was soon rejoined by its "B" Company and remained at Badow until 19 May. During this period ASR scores were worked up for each man, searches were conducted for contraband and a Military Government was established. Axll the wrecked German vehicles which littered the highways were dragged or driven to central collecting points and evacuated. On one night approximately 2,000 prisoners were lodged in the battalion cage. The Combat Command cage had approximately 25,000 occupants.

On 19 May preparations were made to move toward the future American Occupation Zone and at 0315 on the 20th the march began. On the 20th we moved 119 miles to Schlen, a suburb of badly-battered Magdeburg and stopped there to refuel and rest. March resumed at dawn on the 21st and continued 75 miles through Bitterfeld, to Tiefensee on the Mulde River.

In this position the battalion was responsible for an area approximately 25 miles East to West and 5 Miles north to south extending back from the Mulde and bounded on the north by Bitterfeld and on the south by Delitzoch. The mission was to maintain order and enforce and administer military government throughout this area, also to control the flow of traffice between the Russian-held east bank of the Mulde and on our own shore.

On 27 May Battalion Headquarters and HQ. Company moved 16 miles westward to Rortzsch to a better CP location, more in the center-of-population of the zone.

Training schedules and an organized athletic program were immediately organized and followed.

The Military Government section was constantly busy and patrols were run each night through the outlying unoccupied towns.

Battalion remained in this Rortzsch area until 0800 on 1 July when it began a march to the again-reduced American Occupation Zone and ceded the Bitterfeld-Delitzsch Leipzig-Halle district to the Communists.

The march continued throughout all of the 1st and a distance of 154 miles was traveled to Neudorf where a halt was made for refuelling and a hot meal. Journey was resumed at 0215 on 2 July and lasted until 1530 when the command closed into Osterburken after a trip of 147 additional miles.

In the area Hq., Hq. Co., Svc. Co. and the Medical Det occupied Osterburken, "B" Co., was established in Adelsheim, "A" Go., in Schlierstadt, and "C" Co., in Eberstadt.

Regular training schedules were set up and followed. In compliance with Theatre Directives, the emphasis was on athletics and I & E.

Suddenly Redeployment began in earnest and during the week of 20 August the Battalion lost all personnel with less than 75 points except for a small cadre of "essential" officers and men who remained behind as a cadre to rebuild the unit with high-pointers when the time came for the Division to go home.

UNIT HISTORY (Cont'd.)

On 31 August word came that the Division would begin leaving Buchen Landkreis on 11 Sept and be available to the Port Commander of Le Havre on the 21st.

On 1 September 151 men joined from the 84th Infantry Division. On the 2nd, 8 officers joined from the 8th Labor Supervision Area. On the 5th 500 men from the 3rd Armored Div., 200 from various Signal Battalions and Pigeon Companies, and 20 officers from the 2nd, 3rd, and 12th Armored Divisions were assigned and joined.

The train element of the battalion began the move to Camp Lucky Strike near Le Havre at 0700 on 14 Sept. The motor element, consisting of 100 officers and men, moved out at 0600 on the 15th for the same destination.

The entire battalion was closed in to Camp Lucky Strike on 17 September and immediately began an intense ninety-six hours of constant labor to prepare passenger lists and reception and separation center rosters. Gardly had these been completed, corrected and accepted than we were old we could not possibly expect to sail before 7 October, the shortly before we had been informed of moving the 25th. The next day we were assigned space aboard the SS "Stauford Victory" and sailed from Le Havre on 30 September. The 48th shared the ship with the 707 Tank Battalion, a separate battalion which was assigned to the 7th Armored Division, for the movement to the United States.

The 7th Armored Division and the 48th Armored Infantry Battalion were officially deactivated on 7 October, 1945 at Camp hayles Standish, Mass at the conclusion of the voyage.
