It consisted of one (1) Officer and ten (10) EM per par 4, SO 244 Hq Armored Force, and par 1, SO 47, Hq 3rd Tank Group (L), Major Anderson, assumed command.

On 2 November 1942 Major George K. Rubel was assigned and joined per par 10, SO 281 War Department and assumed command per GO 3, Hq 9th Tank Group, dated 2 November 1942.

On 2 December 1942 Lt Col Gilbreth was assigned and joined per par 1, letter Hq Armored Force, AG 300.4 GNOAG, dated 31 August 1942 and assumed command.

PERIOD: 1 January 1943 to 31 December 1943.

When the period opened the unit was located in Camp Campbell, Kentucky, and was engaged in the preliminary phase of individual training.

On 3 April 1943 the 9th Tank Group was attached to IV Armored Corps, commanded by Maj Gen Walker.

On 26 April 1943 It Col Joseph H. Gilbreth was promoted to Colonel.

On 6 May 1943 the organization was inactivated and reactivated as a separate Hq and Hq Det 9th Tank Group according to authority contained in GO 52, Hq Armored Force dated 31 August 1942.

Cn 28 May 1943 the Group was inspected by the Commanding General, Armored Force, Maj Gen Gillem. At this time the units under Group control consisted of the 782nd Tk Bn (L), 701st Tk Bn (Sp), and the 792nd Tk Bn (M). Completed unit training and prepared to move to Desert Training Center. Left Camp Campbell 16 August 1943 at 0925 by rail.

Arrived in Bouse, Arizona, 20 August 1943 at 2300 and began building a semi-permanent camp for special training.

Redesignated Hq & Hq Co, 9th Armored Group, effective 2 October 1943.

On 1 November 1943 Colonel Peploe, G-3 Armored Force, conducted a training inspection of the camp to determine the status of the special training.

On 12 November 1943 Maj Gen Gillem and several members of his staff conducted a training inspection. Results: Very Satisfactory.

Next five (5) months devoted to special training on CDL's. Inspected by Gen. Holley during this period.

On 20 Sept 44 left for England by Motor Transport and the same day arrived in Sutton Veny (near Warminster). Began special training with mine exploders.

Colonel Frederick M. Thompson, assumed command 2/ Sept 44.



E Embarked from Portland (Weymouth) England on 6 Nov 1944.

Landed at Le Havre, France 12 Nov 1944.

Departed from Le Havre 12 Nov 44 enroute, arrived Beaumont-sur-Veile 13 Nov 44.

On 1 Dec 44, Maj Fritsvold, Capt Fellows on SD with First US Army, and Capt Nozisek, Capt Gooley on SD with 9th Army to coordinate tactical use of special equipment.

About 3 Dec 44 the special mine exploders were used in combat. Departed from Beaumont 10 Dec 44, approximately 0300.

Arrived Louveigne, Belgium 10 Dec 44 about 1,00. Four (4) Off on SD returned to duty.

Capt. Christopherson assumed command of the Detachment.

There were no personnel changes during the period 10 Jan 45 to 31 Jan 45.

The Detachment departed Louveigne, Belgium (vK 5717) at about 1500 hours 10 January 1945, and marched by infiltration to Oneux, Belgium (vK 48, 510, 5), clearing Oneux at about 1830 hours. Route of march—Remouchamps - Aywaille - Oneux. Roads covered with snow. Weather cold and clear.

Detachment "A" organized to augment Headquarters, Reserve Command, 7th Armored Division so that the Reserve Headquarters would be comparable to that of Combat Command "A" and "B" of the division.

All T/O & E equipment pertaining to Hq Co 9th Armd Gp and the combat vehicles was taken with Detachment "A" to the 7th Armored Division, the remainder of the T/O & E equipment remained with Hq & Hq Co 9th Armd Gp.

Det. "A" left Oneux for Lambermont, Belgium at 1250 hours on 12 Jan. Route of march-Oneux - Aywaille - Remouchamps - Theux - Pepinster - Lambermont. Road - icy; Weather; Cold, clear.

Cleared in Lambermont at about 1520 hours. No unusual incidents enroute.

At Lambermont Det. "A" officers assigned duties with Hq. Reserve Command, 7th Armored Division as follows:

During stay at Lambermont the unit performed usual functional duties, maintained equipment, and prepared for expected encoming operations.

Weather continued cold - - snow remained on ground.

Left Lambermont 20 Jan 45 for Xhoffraix, Belgium (vK 8208).
Route of march-Lambermont - Verviers - Xhoffraix. Departed Lambermont at about \$\phi745\$ hours - arrived Xhoffraix at about 1\$\phi3\$\$ hours. Distance about 20 miles. Road covered with snow--cold wind. Tactical C.P. departed same day at 1545 hours for Waimes, Belgium (vK 8403). Tactical C.P. consisted of: C.O., Ex. O; S-3 Section; S-2 Section; Liasion Section; and a small mess section. The policy of preparing hot meals three times each day for both the tactical and rear C.P. is maintained.

Rear C.P. moved 22 January 1945 from Xhoffraix to Waimes, Belgium. (vK 8403). Route of March--Xhoffraix - Beverce - Malmedy - Monbijou - Baugnez - Waimes. Arrived about 1200 hours. Road - slippery, weather-cold - clear.

Advance or tactical C.P. departed Waimes about 1000 hours 22 January for Elvange, Belgium. Route--Waimes - Steinbeck - Am Kreuz - Elvange, Belgium (vK 8697) arriving at about 1115 hours. Road covered with snow, many enemy dead lying along road, bodies frozen stiff. Elvange within range of enemy light artillery, many rounds falling in village of Elvange, town badly destroyed. Enemy dead not cleared from area as yet.

Following units attached to CC-R; 38th A.I.B., 40th Tk Bn: 440th Armd FA Bn: Co; C; 33rd Engrs; "B" Co 814th TD Bn: 87th Cav Rcn Sq. Battery D, 203rd AAA Bn.

Objective of present attack is St. Vith, Belgium. Weather is very cold, ground is covered with snow.

White snow suits issued to units. Snow suits removed from wounded for cleaning and re-issue.

Rear C.P. located at Waimes from 22 January until 27 January, carried on with usual duties, maintained liaison and supply with forward C.P. at Elvange: supplied them with rations, gasoline, water and mail, ran messenger service to Elvange - - also had telephone line connecting the two C.P!s.

Elvange received barrage of enemy artillery on night of 23 Jan. shells falling in vicinity of C.P. no injuries to CC-R personnel.

Advance mess section working under extremely adverse conditions - but no one is unfed. Everyone who stops at the kitchen is fed. Mess attendance averages 250 men.

Lt. Krick promoted to 1st Lieutenant as of 16 January 1945. (Par 19, S.O. 16, Hq., 1st U. S. Army.)

Pfc. Lawrence Van Curen evacuated to 2nd Evac Hosp (non-battle casualty) 25 Jan. Has flu due to exposure and rundown condition from continuous work in forward kitchen.

Rear C.P. departed Waimes 27 January for Eupen, Belgium at 1545 hours. Route--Waimes - Bruyeres - Robertville - Voulenborn - Eupen. Arrived at

about 1700 hours. Distance traveled - 18 miles. Weather cold - dry. Road covered with snow.

Advance C.P. remained at Elvange.

Advance C.P. joined rest of unit at Eupen (vK 7927) 1630 on 28 January. Route of March-Elvange - Am Kreuz - Waimes - Malmedy - Verviers and Eupen. Distance traveled 22 miles.

On 31 January 1945 Det. "A" 9th Armd Gp remained at Eupen, Belgium, as part of CC-R, 7th Armored Division.

Strength of Det. on 31 Jan 1945:

Unit had no battle casualties during the period 10 Jan 31 Jan 45.

l February 1945 - -Det "A" Hq & Hq Co 9th Armd Gp at Eupen, Belgium, with Reserve Command, 7th Armd Div.

3 Feb 45. -- WOJG Roy W. Beers, W2 129 536, duty to lost to 45th Evac Hosp.

4 Feb 45-- M Sgt Robert H. Webb duty to Division (7th Armd) Clearing station.

Advance C.P. departed for Konzen, Germany (vK 951217) departed 1230 arrived about 1500 hours. Route of march-Mutzenich - Imgenbootch - Konzen: distance about 14 miles. Road full of shell holes and in generally poor condition, passed through Siegfried defense line. Weather cold - raining - ground sloppy.

Konzen badly destroyed. Many dead animals lying about due shell fire and small arms fire as a result of fighting that took place shortly before. Area appears to be saturated with land mines and booby traps.

Forward C.P. moved to Simmerath, Germany (vK 986239), Route Komzem - Ingenbootch - Simmerath. Distance of march about 3½2 miles. Weather - raising - cpöd- Road sloppy - many enemy land mines on shoulders of road. Some enemy dead still lying on ground near road. American engineers are destroying enemy pillboxes along road. Encountered several American vehicles recently destroyed by land mines - some American soldiers lying dead along road.

CC-R attached to 78th Division, many German prisoners being captured. Sporadic enemy artillery shells falling in vicinity of C.P.

8 Feb 45.-- Pfc Van Curen asgd and joined unit from 3rd Replacement Depot per Par 10, SO 36 Hq 7th Armd Division dated 5 Feb 45. M Sgt Webb returned to duty from Division Clearing station.

Morale--Excellent. Some men receiving passed to the Victor Rest Center in Eupen, and also to Paris, France. HQ Company has movies in officer's mess room.

Weather is now warming up considerable which permits greater amount of maintenance work to be done on all the vehicles.

A portable Central lighting unit is being prepared by the company maintenance crew so there can be electric lights in the C.P. at all times.

Capt. Gooley on temporary duty with 391st Bombardment Group for 10 days (per par 7, S.O. 41, Hq. 7th A.D.) Capt Gooley was present on two combat missions with the above unit.

12 Feb 45.-- Advance C.P. rejoined the remainder of the unit at Eupen, Belgium. Division Headquarters also located at Eupen. Route of march Simmerath - Am Gericht - Rotgen - Brand - Aachen - Moresnet - Hebesthat - and Eupen. Departed Simmerath at 1500 hours, arrived Eupen 1730 hours. Distance traveled 35 miles. Weather, raining. Roads in very bad condition, warmer weather caused roads to be very muddy-many detours.

22 Feb 45 .- - Capt Gooley returns from T.D. with 391st Bomb Group.

Captain Christopherson deaprted for 7 days leave in United Kingdom (par 7, S.O. 47, Hq 7th A.D. 16 Feb 45.) Lt. Butt assumed command of Detachment "A" and of Hq. Co. CC-R, 7th Armored Division.

23 February 1945. -- Tec 4 Tucker went to Division Clearing Station slightly sick.

l March 1945, unit departed Eupen, Belgium for Lammersdorf, Germany (vK 970269 - Nord de Guerre grid Zone). Departed Eupen 1250 hours - arrived Lammersdorf about 1600 hours. Route of March: Eupen - Rotgen (Germany) - Konzen - Simmerath - Lammersdorf. Distance traveled 32 miles. Road muddy: Weather-raining. No unusual circumstances. Morale excellent.

2.March 1945. WOJG Roy W. Beers returns to unit, asgd and joined from 3rd Replacement Depot (par 6, S.O. 56, Hq 3rd Replacement Depot 26 Feb 45.) -Capt Fellows departed for Paris, France to attend the Information and Education Staff School at Cite University (par 1, S.O. 61 Hq 7th Armd Div).

7 Mar 45.- departed Lammersdorf for Wollersheim (WF 175308). Arrived at destination about 1300 hours. Route of march - Lammersdorf - Simmerath - Schmidt - Heimbach - Vlatten - Wollersheim. Still raining. Distance traveled 19.6 miles.

8 Mar 45. - departed Wollersheim for Ollheim (WF 405326) Departed 1050 hours-arrived about 1700 hours. Route of march Wollersheim - Embaken - Froitzheim - Vetliveiss - Sievernich - Disternich - Strassfeld - Ollheim. Roads muddy - full of shell holes. Weather - Raining

9 Mar 45.- left Ollheim for Rottgen, Germany (WF 5323-4). Route of march Ollheim - Miel - Morenhoven - Flerzheim - Rottgen. Departed Ollheim \$849 arrived Rottgen about 1999 hours. Distance traveled 12 miles. Weather-clear.

10 Mar 45, left Rottgen at 1000 hours for Miel, Germany, arriving about 1100 hours. Route of march Rottgen - Witterschick - Buschoven - Miel, distance about 11 miles. Weather cloudy. Capt Christopherson rejoined unit and assumed command.

11 Mar 45.--Tec 4 Tucker rejoined unit from Division Clearing Station.

Advance C.P. departed from Miel for Bad Godesberg, arriving at about 1930 hours. Route of march - Miel - Willerschlick - Duisdorf - Rottgen - Bad Godesberg. Distance traveled - 17 miles. Weather-fair.

12 Mar 45.- Capt Fellows rejoined unit from Information-Education School in Paris. Rear C.P. joined forward C.P. at Bad Godesberg at about 1030 hours.

During stay at Bad-Godesberg CC-R commander, Col. Tompkins, was in charge of the area, and being among the first troops to enter the city caused a complete registration of all civilians to be made. The city was subject to small arms fire from enemy just across the Rhine River. Artillery airburst shells frequently fell in the area - expecially at night. While in this location many war trophies and souvenirs were obtained by most of the men in the unit. The mail orderly is "swamped" with packages to be sent home. The most numerous of the souvenirs are nazi daggers, sabres, flags, and pistols. Much Rhine wine is now available to the command from various sources. Although large quantities of various liquors seem to be "overdoing" it. Vehicle mainte enance is now the chief task for the detachment, but the Hq staff are very busy getting the German civilians under control. Curfew regulations are strictly enforced. Fighting just across the Rhine River can be clearly seen from our side of the river. We are now making preparations for a "big" drive through the German defenses across the river. Everyone just feels that we are about to be given our big opportunity now to really operate in the manner ideal for Armored units. Morale is very high. The end seems to be in sight.

18 Mar 45. Cardamon, Shaw, Minerd, and Nobbe promoted to Pfc. on Det. Order No. 2. Det "A" Hq & Hq Co 9th Armd Gp.

20 March 1945.- Pfc McGuire transferred to 128 Evacuation Hospital as a result of an accident while on a message center run to Division Hq. His condition is not known, may be an internal head injury.

24 March 1945. Departed Bad Godesberg at 2000 hours enroute to bivouac area near Notschied, Germany (WF 722242). Route Bad Godesberg - Rolandswerth-Rolandseck - Hennef - Niechen - Rottbitze - Kalenborn - Notscheid. Arrived in bivouac area at about 2230. Weather warm and clear. Distance of march 18 miles. Crossed Rhine River just above Remagen on floating bridge. Closed in bivouac area in good manner. Some enemy artillery sh ells fell in area, no casualities received. C.P. located on forward slope of hill behind draw--C.P. personnel prepared plans for oncoming breakthrough through the 9th and 99th Infantry Division. Some enemy dead still in the area. Friendly artillery bursts can be seen falling in small German towns and setting them aflame. Traffic on roads unusually heavy. Unable to find a building to billet personnel or Hq, due to destruction of towns and concentration of American troops. We have the same normal attachments: 38 A.I.B- 40th Tk Bn-

440th FA Bn. - "C" Co, 33rd Engrs, and B Co., 814th Tu Bn.

27 Mar 45. The forward C.P. moved out at \$\psi 73\psi\$ enroute to Fleisbach,
Route of march - Selters - Wolfenlingen - Hellenhahn - Westernobe - Mademahien Fleisbach. Distance 41 miles. Rear C.P. followed at about 1315 arriving at
Fleisbach at 17\psi 90. Weather - clear.

Unit stopped at Westernobe for a short stop when direct tank fire from friendly forces (3rd(Task Force) Armd Div fell in the town. Shell fragments hitting S Sgt Bennett's tank. No casualties. 186 prisoners turned over to 7th Armd Div P.W. cage. Upon arrival at Fleisbach a search was made of the town for enemy soldiers and all males were registered and screened.

28 Mar 45. Forward C.P. departed Fleisbach, Germany at about \$660 enroute to Bellnhausen (WG 698343). Route of march: Fleisbach - Niederlemp - Weipoltohen - Oberivalgren - Bellnhousen. Distance of march 26 miles. Rear C.P. departed Fleisbach at about 1000 hours and joined forward C.P. at about 1330 hours. Weather-warm. Road strewn with wreckage of destroyed enemy units, many enemy dead along side of road lying in smouldering debris of equipment, many carcases of horses in road where they were killed by Tack Force Brown. Many enemy vehicles show evidence of being run over by our tanks. Several thousand prisoners were brought to our P.W. cage. German military hospital unit with many sick and wounded found at Bellhnhausen. Lt Col Brown captured by enemy, S Sgt Bennett and his crew accompained Major Sweat to assist in recovering Col Brown. They were successful. Sgt Bennetts tank threw track in sand but dispersed enemy automatic weapons crew, killing at least one man.

29 Mar 45. Entire company departed Bellnhausen for Grosseelheim at \$99\$\$\text{fours.}\$ Route of march: Bellnhausen - Marburg - Grasseelheim. Distance of march about 8 miles. Weather cloudy and raining. Hard road in good condition to Marburg, from Marburg to Grosseelheim - gravel road-muddy.

C.P. located in Grosseelheim, company bivouaced on hill on edge of town. Sniper shots again fired at camp passing over Capt Christopherson's head. A search of the town failed to locate sniper. Occupants of town have hostile attitude. People dress in quaint "dutch-type clothing" and live in unusual houses. Enemy aircraft flew over camp at about 1430 hours, anti-aircraft guns opened fire, planes (three) circle camp again-one plane shot down, unable to determine who shot it down as many units were firing. Fighting in Kirchain hard. (Page 46).

30 March 1945. Forward C.P. departed for Frankenau (WG 840776), arrived at destination at about \$63\$\text{\$\phi\$}\$ hours. Route of march, Grosseelheim, Schonstadt, Bracht, Rosenthal - and Frankenau. Distance of march about 34 miles. Rear C.P.

departed Grosseelheim at 1400 hours, arrived at bivouac area about 6 miles south of Frankenau. Weather clear and fair. Many German stragglers in the area adjacent to the route of march.

- 31 March 1945. Rear C.P. left bivouac area to join the rest of the unit in Frankenau, Germany WG 840776). Left bivouac area at 1200 and arrived in Frankenau at 1300 hours, distance 6 miles. Weather: cool and cloudy. Maintenance and tank sections billeted in city school house remainder of the unit billeted in Volkers Hotel.
 - 1 April 1945. Unit remained in same location.
 - 2 April 1945. Unit remained in same location. No unusual incidents.
- 3.April 1945. Unit remained in Frankenau, Germany. Usual functional duties plus preparation for oncoming operations. Cloudy and raining today.
- 4 April 1945. Departed Frankenau for Sachsenberg at 1030. Route of march: Frankenau-Alleniotheim, --Schmittlotheim--Hiederorke--Sachsenberg, (WG 815735). Distance of march 16 miles. Hard road, road congested with traffic. Many trucks loaded with gasoline going forward, and returning loaded with prisoners of war. Arrived at destination at 1215 hours. City of Sachsenberg searched by CIC and men from Hq CC-R for German Party leaders.
- 5 April 1945. Departed Sachsengerg at 1135 hours for New Astenberg (WG 854525). Route of march: Sachsenberg-Newkirchn-Brauhshausen-Hallenberg-Zuxcher-New Astenberg. Distance 21 miles. Weather cool and raining. Roads congested with troops from many other units preparing for action in reducing the "Ruhr Pocket".
- 6 April 1945. Departed Neu Astenberg for Oberkirchen (WG 449 850). Route of march: Neu Astenberg-Langewiese-Oberkirchen. Arrived at destination about 1730 hours. Distance of march about 8 miles. Raining and foggy. Unit billeted in hotel. Morale-excellent.
- 7 April 1945. Departed Oberkirchen for Neidersorpe at about 1300 hours. Route of march: Oberkirchen-Winkhausen-Neidersorpe. Distance: about 3 miles. Closed in new location at about 1530 hours. Enemy can be seen on the hills in foreground, 38th Infantry (Armd) moved out of town after our arrival to clear the enemy from hills in adjacent to town. At about 1900 hours several rounds of enemy artillery fell in vicinity of the C.P. no casualties.
- 8 April 1945. Remained in same location. Some buildings still smouldering. Weather warm.
- 9 April 1945. Departed Neidersorpe for Fredeburg at about 1100 hours. Route of march: Neidersorpe-Fredeburg. Distance 4 miles. Arrived Fredeburg at about 1230 hours. American and enemy dead still lying in streets. Artillery barrage on city at about 1300 hours, no casualties in unit, many civilians wounded. Many enemy wounded filtering into town. Weather-warm. Tec 5 George R. Knicely evacuated to 7th Armored Division Clearing Station, non-battle casualty, slightly sick.

Forward C.P. departed at about 1500 hours for Berghausen, Germany (WG 403880), arriving at about 1600 hours, distance 5 miles. Enemy artillery shell fell and exploded close to column enroute, no casualties.

Upon arrival at Berghausen the Headquarters used its own personnel to perform outpost duty until arrival of infantry. Artillery and small arms fire on position of C.P. No casualties.

- 10 April 1945. Rear echelon joined forward C.P. at Berghausen at about 1530 hours. Entire unit departed Berghausen at about 1600 hours for Frielinghausen, arrived at about 1720 hours. Distance about 6 miles. Route of march: Berghausen—Ober Berndorf—Neider Berndorf—Menkhausen—Grimminghausen—Lochtrop—Frielinghausen.
- 11 April 1945. Departed Frielinghausen for Mathmecke at 1130 hours. Route of march: Frielinghausen-Mathmecke. Distance 5 miles. Roads-good. Weather-cool. Arrived Mathmecke at 1300 hours. Artillery barrage at about 1300 hours, no casualties.
- 12 April 1945. Forward C.P. departed Mathmecks for Endorf at \$63\$.

 Arrived Endorf at about 11\$\$\text{00}\$ hours. Route of march: Mathmecke-Altenhellefeld-Linneps-Meinkenb-Endorf. Departed Endorf for Kuntrop at about 173\$\$\text{00}\$ hours, awrived at about 233\$\$\text{00}\$. Route of march: Endorf-Dornholthausen-Allendorf-Altenaffeln-Kuntrop (WG 016985). Total distance 18 miles. Incoming artillery delayed unit's movement at intervals. No casualties. Rear C.P. still at Mathmecke.
- 13 April 1945. Rear C.P. joined forward C.P. at about 1030 hours. Unit bivouaced on side of hill on edge of Kuntrop. Enemy small arms fire in woods about 1/4 mile from bivouac area. Units of CC-R preparing to counter-attack through woods just to the Northwest of bivouac area. Large quantities of German stores and PX supplies captured from supply train overrun in this area. Many thousands prisoners taken and marched back to division P.W. cage. Lt. Krick went into nearby woods and captured 54 Panzer Grenadiers, the remains of an entire company. (Many Lugars and P-38's liberated.().
- 14 April 1945. Unit under enemy artillery shell fire from 1200 until 1315 hours. No casualties. Company departed Kuntrop at about 1315 hours for Beckum (RB 115066). Route of march: Kuntrop-Blintrop-Langenhallhausen-Belve-Beckum. Distance: 9 miles. Roads-good, Weather, light showers. Arrived at destination at about 1440 hours. Company bivouaced in field on edge of town. C.P. in houses on hill.
- 15 April 1945. Forward C.P. departed for Halingen at \$990 hours, arriving at about 1200 hours. Rear C.P. departed at 1730 to join Forward C.P. arrived at 1900 hours. Route of march: Beckum-Volkringhausen-Menden-Halingen. Roads-good. Weather, cloudy, raining. Many troops concentrated in Halingen, upon our arrival, considerable enemy small arms fire coming from woods about 1000 yards west of bivouac area in Halingen. No casualties.
- 16 April 1945. Unit departed Halingen at 1400 hours enroute to Ergste (RA 890128) arriving at about 1530 hours. Route of march-Halingen-Dahlhsn-Hennen-Villigst-Ergste. Distance, 11 miles. Road-good, crowded with P.W.'s. On this day the LIII Corps of the German Army surrendered to Reserve Command, the Corps included the 116 Panzer division, the 180 and the 190th Infantry divisions and the remnants of the 9th Panzer division.
- 17 April 1945. Unit departed Ergste for Dransfeld at about 1400 hours. Route of march: Ergste-Menden-Nehein-Meschede-Brilen-Warburg-Kassel-Dransfeld. Distance--151 miles. Arrived \$600 hours on 18 April 1945. Weather-warm.

Roads--good, heavy traffic, expecially with convoys of P.W.'s. No unusual incidents enroute.

Unit remained in Dransfeld, Germany until Detachment "A" was inactivated on 22 April 1945.


