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

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



1. It is recommended that the Board take action on the following case:

NAME: MEADOWS, LeRoy (NMI) S/Sgt 34 778 467

ORGANIZATION: Company "I", 134 Infantry Regiment

DATE OF DEATH: 16 December 1944

PLACE OF DEATH: Woods one mile north of Habkirchen, Germany

SYNOPSIS: The above mentioned unresolved casualty became Missing In Action on 16 December 1944. Casualty Branch File (Office of the Quartermaster General) contains an undated Missing Report which reveals that subject casualty's company encountered enemy small arms fire while attempting to clear the woods north of Habkirchen, Germany. Sgt. Meadows was wounded, but as it was necessary for his company to withdraw, he was left in enemy territory. A Field Investigation was conducted in the appropriate area in June 1949 and disclosed that a total of seventeen (17) unknowns were recovered from the area on previous dates, however, these unknowns have all been identified or declared Unidentifiable. It is logical to conclude S/Sgt. LeRoy (NMI) Meadows was captured by the enemy, died while a prisoner, and his remains were disposed of by the enemy in a manner and location which precludes recovery. The fact Field Investigation was negative and attempted association with Unknowns recovered from this area proved negative would tend to substantiate this conclusion. It is, therefore, recommended this case be deemed Non-Recoverable.

- 2. All attached supporting documents are copied from records on file headquarters American Graves Registration Detachment.
- 3. Every effort has been made to correlate this case with records in this headquarters pertaining to unknown deceased interred in US Military Cemeteries and reported isolated burials. The results are negative.
- 4. It is recommended that the remains based upon the above information and research, be declared non-recoverable.

Conducted at HABKIRCHEN (K-50/Q-55), Germany.

b. From Notices of Disinterment, it was possible to establish that the following American deceased have been recovered from the above-mentioned communal woods:

8 Americans evacuated by the 606 GR Co. to USMC St Avold in January 46

3 Americans (2 unknowns and 1 known, WILSON WAYNE) evacuated by the 164th QM Bn in January 1948 to USLC Neuville (see certificate B-1-2).

- 5. I also went to the village of Bebelsheim, which is approximately 2 miles to the north of HABKIRCHEN, in order to cover the subject woods from all sides.
- 6. I was informed at the Burgermeister's office (Bebelsheim) that in June 1945, seven unburied American deceased were found in the Eliesmengen woods. Four of the above were picked up by an American Gasoline Detachment (probably pipeline guards) stationed in Bebelsheim. The three others were picked up by an American detachment operating from Bliesmengen. No one could state to where the said remains were evacuated, but the vicinity indicates that it was presumably USAC St Avold.

III. FINDINGS:

- 7. From the evidence revealed during this investigation it is established that the following designated US deceased were recovered from the Bliesmengen woods:
- a. In June 1945, seven unknowns picked up by American pipe-line guards and presumably evacuated to USMC, St Avold.
- b. In January 1946, eight unknowns recovered by the 606 GR Co., and evacuated to USMC, St Avald.
- c. In January 1948, two unknowns recovered by the 164th CM Bn and evacuated to USMC Neuvilla-en-Condroz.

MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD:

SUBJECT: Review of Circumstances Surrounding the Disappearance of S Sgt Leroy Meadows.

1. ETO Casualty Shipment No. 292 reported that S Sgt Leroy Meadows, 34778467, Infantry, Co I, 134th Infantry Regiment, was missing in action, in Germany, on 16 December 1944. It was further reported that Sergeant Meadows was entitled to additional pay for award of the Combat Infantryman Badge. Under the provisions of Section 5, Missing Persons Act, a Finding of Death was issued for Sergeant Meadows, setting the presumed date of his death as 17 December 1945 (SR&D No. 4912).

- 2. Missing Report submitted for Sergeant Meadows states that on 16 December 1944 he was with his company which had as its mission the clearing of a small woods about one mile north of Haberkirchen, Germany. The company encountered small arms fire in the woods. Sergeant Meadows was wounded, and when the company was forced to withdraw he was left in enemy territory. The opinion is expressed that he was a prisoner of war.
- 3. No report that Sergeant Meadows was a prisoner of war has been received from any source, official or unofficial. The Office of The Quarter-master General has no burial report on file for Sergeant Meadows at the present time.
- 4. Although Sergeant Meadows is known to have been wounded, the extent of his injuries is not known and no reasonable conclusion can be drawn regarding his probable chances of recovery and consequently the date of his death cannot be set with any degree of certainty. It is concluded, therefore, that a report of death under the provisions of Section 9 of the Missing Persons Act cannot be justified at this time.



This is in reply to your letter concerning your son, Staff Sergeant Leroy Meadows who was initially reported missing in action 16 December 1944.

Your desire for information regarding your son's status is fully understood. An examination of the records reveals that Staff Sergeant Meadows, a member of Company I, 134th Infantry, left Haberkirchen, Germany, on 16 December 1944 with his commades for the purpose of clearing the enemy from the woods one mile north. The company encountered small aims fire when they entered the woods and your son was wounded. A short while later our troops were forced to withdraw and found it impossible to remove Sergeant Meadows. He was reported missing in action as of 16 December 1944 when nothing could be determined concerning his fate, he was continued in that status until a presumptive date of death was established as of 17 December 1945 under the provisions of Public Law 490, 77th Congress, as amended.

There is nothing on record in this office to show that the body of your son has been recovered. I am, therefore, referring your letter to The Quartermatter General, Washington 25, D. C., as that official is charged with the responsibility of conducting the activities of the American Graves Registration Service in all the areas of the world where it is believed remains of American Military personnel may be located.

May I offer my sincere sympathy to you in the loss of your son.

I. - FACTS

The persons named below of the organizations designated were reported missing in action, not in flying pay status, in the European Area, as of 16 December 1944, by ETO shipment numbers 004, 006, 007, 008, 011, 012, 014, 035, 040, 290, 291, 292, and 293:

2. a. Sergeant Peter Babiak's Qualification Card and Service Record states that subject enlisted man become missing in action, 16 December 1944, as a result of a boat capsizing in the Saar River near Buren, Germany.

b. A letter which is filed in Special Determination Case Number 4369 and dated 12 August 1945, was sent in by the mother of Sergeant Babiak. In this letter, she states that the letter which she inclosed was received from her son's buddy who was with him at the time he became missing in action. A photostatic copy of this inclosed letter is also filed in the Special Determination and reads, in pertinent part, as follows:

"It was on Sunday December 17th during the early hours of the morning that the sad happening took place. Our plateon was sent out on a mission which was most necessary. While performing our duties with Pete at the command things happened for the worse. We were making a river crossing at the time and the boat burned over due to the swift current. All in the boad had to shift and try to save their swn individual selves. Well it was the most disasterous outcome for after they rescued about all they could they took count and found that Pete Babiak was missing. They kept searching and searching never giving up hope but when dawn came they were forced to give up the search for enemy could observe us and send shells at us. * * * They all tell me he might of floated into the enemy side or has perhaps been picked up further down."

- 3. Private George E. Gaudette's Casualty Branch File contains a Missing Report, dated 22 January 1945, which reveals that subject soldier became missing in action in the vicinity of Roth, Germany, following an engagement with enemy forces. All communications were lost when enemy tanks and infantry overran American positions in the area.
- 4. a. Private First Class Joseph R. Jeka's Casualty Branch File contains a Missing Report, dated 30 January 1945, which reveals that the unit of which Private First Class Jeka was a member was surrounded by the Germans near Grosslangenfeld, Germany. All communications with the Division Command Post were cut off an repeated efforts which were made to establish contact were unsuccessful.
- b. Filed in the AG 201 File of Private First Class Jeka, is a Casualty Form No. 5, from the 106th Recommaissance Troop which contains the names and addresses of three men who were members of the 106th Recommaissance Troop at the time Private First Class Jeka became missing in action, and who since have returned to the United States. Letters, AGPC-S 201 Jeka, Joseph R., dated 30 October 1945, were sent to these three men: First Sergeant Gabriel Johnson, 6,281,543; Sergeant Louis Cunningham, 31,317,735; and Corporal Kenneth Smith, 36,456,709.

- (1) The reply from First Sergeant Johnson, dated 2 November 1945, reveals nothing relevant to the fate of Private First Class Jeka. First Sergeant Johnson, however, forwarded his copy of the War Department letter to Staff Sergeant James M. Smith, the platoon sergeant of Private First Class Jeka. A letter from Staff Sergeant Smith, dated 11 November 1945, reveals that Private First Class Jeka was twice wounded by shrapnel in the upper right thigh. The letter continues: "About 1900 the same evening, German medics told me that they would take him to a hospital. He was tied across the hood of one of our own jeeps, and they drove off with him. I have been unable to get any information concerning P.F.C. Jeka since then. This all took place at Grosslangdenfeld, Germany, where out unit was captured by the Germans, P.F.C. Jeka was badly wounded, and it is entirely possible that he died from his injuries."
- (2) Sergeant Cunningham's reply, dated 8 November 1945, and undated reply of Corporal Smith fail to add any information not already given in the paragraph above.
- 5. The Casualty Branch File of Private Daniel J. Milcoh contains a Missing Report, dated 28 December 1944, which reveals that subject enlisted man was performing his duties as Bow Gunner in a tank during action against the enemy at Kesternich, Germany, 16 December 1944, when the tank was hit by a high velocity shell and caught fire. Private Milcoh was not seen evacuating the tank.
- a. Headquarters, 709th Tank Battalion sent a fourth indorsement to letter AGPC-S 201 Miloch, Daniel J. (25 Apr 45), 36,674,780. This indorsement, dated 14 May 1945 whates that the tank was hit in an area which was re-taken by the enemy. The 709th Tank Battalion was moved from the vicinity of Kesternich while the Germans were still in possession of the town, therefore, a thorough search could not be made. The 78th Infantry Division eventually captured the area but disposition of the tank was not known. Of the four other men who occupied the tank, two were killed in action; one was seriously wounded in action; and one, Staff Sergeant Ralph W. Andrus, 37,010,862, was returned to the United States.
- b. Letter, AGPC-S 201 Miloch, Daniel J. (7 Nov 45), was sent to Staff Sergeant Andrus requesting that all information he possessed concerning the fate of Private Miloch be forwarded to the War Department. Staff Sergeant Andrus in letter, dated 16 November 1945, revealed no definite knowledge of the fate of Private Miloch but stated:

"I think myself that he is dead as the shell that hit the tank fust about where he sits but this is just my opinion."

- 6. Private First Class Ambrose A. Lombardo's Casualty Branch File contains a Missing Report, dated 12 January 1945, which reveals that subject person was a member of an Anti-Tank squad which departed Bastendorf, Luxenbourg on 15 December 1944, and which on 16 December 1944, had dug in at Walsdorf, Luxembourg. On the day in question, the enemy surrounded the town and all communication was severed. The last report received from Private First Class Lombardo was at 0900 hours, 16 December 1944.
- 7. The Casualty Branch File of Staff Sergeant Lercy Meadows contains an undated Missing Report which reveals that subject man's company encountered small arms fire while attempting to clear the woods north of Maberkirchen, Germany. Staff Sergeant Meadows was wounded, but, as it was necessary for his company to withdraw, he was left in enemy territory.
- 8. Private Ben L. Spoonemore's Casualty Branch File contains a Missing Report, dated 20 December 1944, which reveals that Private Spoonemore was a member of the Second Battalion of the SlOth Infantry Regiment which was cut off by the enemy at Kesternich, Germany, 16 December 1944. When the Battalion had withdrawn and reorganized, this soldier could not be found. All Casualty reports and Graves Registration Service reports were carefully scrutinized but no further information concerning the fate of Frivate Spoonemore could be located.
- 9. The Casualty Branch File of Private George E. Riggle contains a Missing Report, dated 13 February 1945, which reveals that subject soldier was reported missing in action, 16 December 1944, after action near Lauterbourg, France. No further circumstances surrounding his disappearance are known.
- 10. a. The Casualty Branch Files of Sorgeant James S. McKinney and Private William De Martini each contain a Missing Report, dated 19 December 1944, which reveals that subject enlisted men's platfor departed Grobhau, Germany, 16 December 1944, on a mission to fill a gap between two companies west of Straub, Germany. The platforn was surrounded by enemy machine guns and was forced to withdraw. A check was made of the platforn and these two men were found to be missing. Later, the area was searched, but no trace of the subject persons could be found.
- b. The AG 201 File of Private DeMartini contains a letter, dated 7 November 1945, from Staff Sergeant Walter J. Shareika, 32,195,950, who states that he was with Private DeMartini in the Hurtgen Forest. He further states that, in his estimation, Private DeMartini was hit and presumably fell during the combat fire.
 - 11. a. The Casualty Branch File of Private Harry Lubinger, contains

a Missing Report, dated 17 December 1944, which reveals that Private Lubinger was sent out on a mission with a squad to contact the 3rd Battalion of the 345th Infantry Regiment near Rimling, France. The Squad was fired upon by machine guns and enemy artillery. When the squad returned to its company after completing its mission, subject enlisted man was found to be missing. He was last seen by his squad leader at approximately 1430 hours, 16 December 1944, No circumstances surrounding his disappearance were known and no search was conducted due to the fact that orders were given for his company to move out of the vicinity and time did not permit a search.

b. The AG 201 File of Private Lubinger contains a First Indorsement to letters of inquiry from S. Lubinger, dated 27 January 1945, and 1 February 1945, This Indorsement, dated 27 February 1945, states, in pertinent part, as follows:

"Enlisted man was firing on an enemy machine gun with his squad which was acting as connecting file. The Company had taken their objective Hill 304, near Rimling, France. The squad was ordered to withdraw, which they did by aid of smoke shells. Soldier was not seen after the lay of smoke."

12. Letter from the War Department, AGPC-S 704 (5 Oct 45), Subject: Information Concerning Missing Military Personnel, contains a First Indorsement, dated 10 October 1945, from Headquarters, 87th Infantry Division (Inactive), Fort Benning, Georgia, which states:

"A thorough search of all casualty records of the Division has been made and the following facts have been revealed regarding the status of Pfc Thomas E. Brady, Pfc William C. Hollenbeck and Pfc Melvin E. Kalmeyer.

"On the 16th of December 1944, Company C. 546th
Infantry Regiment was ordered to make an attack
two miles west of Rimling, France with the objective of the Company to advance beyond enemy positions. After the action was over, the above men
were discovered to be missing and an investigation
was made. No eyewitnesses were found. Repeated
investigations were made concerning these men. No
further information was discovered that would change
their status."

- 13. Missing Reports, dated 5 January 1945, in the Casualty Branch Files of Private First Class Theodore B. Loesch and Private Mack Hastiuk reveal that these two soldiers became missing in action under the same circumstances as given in paragrph 12, part I, above.
- 14. a. Hissing Report, dated 29 January 1945 and filed in the Casualty Branch File of Private Victor C. Schneider, reveals that this enlisted man disappeared, 16 December 1944, during a German attack near Schlausenbach, Germany.
- b. Prisoner of War List US/3045 received 9 April 1945 from the German Government, through the International Red Cross, reported that according to unofficial information, Private Schneider was "killed on transport from Gerolstein". AG 704 Dead (17 July 45), Report of Death on Private First Class Hillary W. Machado, 39,048,096, states: The "transport from Gerolstein" incident * * * has been determined by this office to have occurred on 24 December 1944, at which time a group of American prisoners in box cars were killed by strafing from Allied planes."
- c. Letter, AGPC-S 704 (11 Aug 45), were sent to several soldiers who were known to have been involved in the "incident" referred to in paragraph 14 b, above. Although no pertinent information concerning Private Schneider was received in the replies to these letters, Private First Class Gilbert B. Zbasnik, 17,140,725, in letter dated 22 August 1945, reveals the following information concerning the "incident":

"After marching from the St. With area to Gerolstein, we, approximately 3000, were divided into groups of about 300 to be shipped out of Gerolstein in boxoars. Our group, I believe, was the last to leave. We boarded the cars and after a long wait we started on our way. We got about ten or fifteen kilometers out of Gerolstein when we stopped because of a bombed out track up ahead. The guards kept us locked in the boxcars so we had no chance of getting out. Most of the men were strangers to me. * * I am almost positive there were two planes that strafed us because they came right after another, too quick, I believe for one plane to run around and go back. * * * I counted seven bodies myself but some of the fellows said they counted as high as name or ten dead. I have no accurate knowledge of any of the other men who were killed. They were complete strangers to me."

15. a. The Casualty Branch Files of Privates First Class Joe D. Benedetto and Chrispin L. Miranda, and the AG 201 File of Private First Class Miranda each contain a Missing Report, dated 29 January 1945, which states:

*On 10 December 1944 the regiment moved up to defensive positions on the battle line around Schlausenbach, Germany.

"On 16 December 1944 the German attack began and on that date all communication with the regiment was lost. Available evidence indicates that the regiment was surrounded by German units."

b. Private First Class John D. Wilson, 16,175,262, on a Casualty Interrogation Form which is filed in the AG 201 file of Private First Class Benedetto regeals that the death of Benedetto occurred about 24 December 1944, east of the Ardennes Forest, and was due to the fact that Allied planes strafed the boxcar in which Private First Class Benedetto was locked as a prisoner. Although Private First Class Wilson was not an eyewitness to subject enlisted man's death, he stated that he heard that Private First Class Benedetto died after he was removed to a German hospital.

- c. Letter from Private First Class Lawrence W. Post, 26,810,792, dated 25 July 1945 and filed in the AG 201 File of Private First Class Benedetto, reveals that the last time he saw subject enlisted man, Private First Class Benedetto was still alive and on his way to a hospital.
- d. The following information concerning the fate of Private First Class Benedetto is contained in a letter, dated 21 September 1945m which is filed in the AG 201 File of Private First Class Benedetto and which was sent to the War Department by Second Lieutenant Lewis H. Walker:

"I do know that he was wounded severely in the left leg during an artillery barrage on 19 December 44 near Schonberg Belgium for I saw him late in a German hospital on 22 December 1944. Later on 7 January 1945 at Stalag LV B, Muhlberg, Germany, members of my Company informed me that he had been seriously wounded again in the same left leg while the train in which they were enclosed was straffed by Allied planes. He was reportedly in the hospital at the Stalag at that time. I was not allowed by the Germans to visit him."

e. A letter, dated 1 December 1945, was received in the War Department from First Lieutenant Lewis H. Walker, 0-1051429. This letter which is filed in the AG 201 File of Private First Class Miranda reads, in pertinent part, as follows:

"Subject soldier was mortar crewman in Company H, 422d Infantry, 106th Inf. Div., 1st Army. We was seriously wounded in the back during the Ardennes Battle near Schonberg, Belgium, 19 December 1944. I was his Section Leader. The last I saw hime was in our 331st Med. Bn. Aid Hospital in Schonberg on 23 Dec 44. I know he was evaquated in the same German hospital convoy with me 23 Dec 44 to a regular general hospital at Gerolstein, Germany. On Christman Eve I witheseed that hospital being bombed disasterously when Allied Fleets smashed the Gerolstein railhead immediately adjacent to the hospital. * * * I have just received a communication from another mortarman of my section who states he was in the hospital when bombed but escaped injury being in the basement. He was pressed into service evacuating all the other casualties and is sure PFC Miranda was not among those saved.

- 16. The Casualty Branch Files of Privates Class Myron B. Anderson, and Edward M. Topolski reveal that subject enlisted men were engaged, on 16 December 1944, in defensive action near Winterspelt, Germany when the Allied positions were overrun by the enemy. No further information concerning their whereabouts is known.
- 17. The AG 201 and the Casualty Branch File of Private First Class Clarence J. Vainreb contains a Missing Report, dated 19 January 1945, which reveals that this enlisted man was with his section in gugouts 500 yards north of Eichelshied, Germany, fighting to hold off a German attack. The German attack started about 0700 hours on 16 December 1944. The Allied positions were overrun and it was believed that subject person did not get a chance to leave his position.
- 18. The Casualty Branch Files of Staff Sergeant Royal D. James, Jr., Privates First Class Robert T. Collins, Albert Goble, Ivy T. Moris, Vernon E. Sewards, Privates William F. Hinton and Robert H. Hutchinson, each contains a Missing Report, dated 20 January 1945, which reveals that these men were members of Company C, 424th Infantry which, on 16 December 1944,

was counterattacking near Winterspelt, Germany. After undergoing an intense mortar and artillery barrage, Company C was attacked by German Infantry. The company fell back so rapidly, it was impossible to evacuate all wounded. When the company reorganized, these enlisted men were missing and there has not been any record of their having been seen since.

- 19. The Casualty Branch File and the AG 201 File of Captain Frank L. Miller, Junior, both contain a Missing Report, dated 19 January 1945, which reveals that Captain Miller was wounded in action near Winterspelt, Germany. He was treated by aidmen and when last seen was starting back to an aid station. Nothing further concerning his disappearance is known.
- 20. An examination of the files of these persons in Casualty Branch, Officers' Branch, and Enlisted Branch, AGO, and the index in Prisoner of War Information Bureau, PMGO, does not reveal any further information relevant to this review.

II. - CONCLUSIONS

- 1. Subject personnel listed in paragraph 1, Part I, were reported missing in action 16 December 1944, Captain Miller, Staff Sergeants James and Meadows, Sergeants Babiak and McKinney, Privates First Class Anderson, Benedetto, Gollins, Goble, Jeka, Miranda, Morris, Sewards, Topolski, and Vainreb, and Privates DeMartini, Gaudette, Hinton, Hutchinson, Miloch, and Spoonemore all became missing in action in Germany. Of these men, Captain Miller, Stafrf Sergeant Meddows and Privates First Class Benedetto and Jeka were known to have been wounded. Private First Class Miranda was also known to have been wounded in the back and to have been evacuated to a German general hospital near Gerolstein, Germany. Reports indicated that this general hospital was bombed disasterously when Allied planes bombed a railhead in the vicinity of the hospital.
 - 2. Private First Class Lombardo became missing in action in Luxembourg.
- 3. Privates First Class Brady, Hollenbeck, Kalmeyer, and Loesch, and Privates Hnatiuk, Lubinger, and Riggle became missing in action in France.
- 4. Private Schneider was unofficially reported killed in action near Gerolstein, Germany when a group of American prisoners in boxcars were strafed by Allied planes.
- 5. In view of the foregoing facts and circumstances, together with the fact that no report has been received in the War Department during the twelve months which have elapsed since the inception of the subject persons missing in action status indication that they are alive, it is concluded that they may not "reasonably be presumed to be living" within the meaning of Section 5 of the Missing Persons Act.

TII. - RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended that findings of death be made under the provisions of Section 5 of the Missing Persons Act, in the cases of the persons named in paragraph 1, part I, above, and that these findings show the presumed date of datch, in each case, to be 17 December 1945.
