

SYNOPSIS OF CASES: The above mentioned unresolved casualties were members of a patrol sent out to determine enemy strength in the town of Grening, France on 23 Nov. 1944. Upon entering the town they met with intense enemy opposition, and were not seen afterwards by members of their organization who entered the town on the next day. A thorough search was conducted, but no trace of the missing persons could be found. Field Investigation was conducted in the appropriate area in Apr. 1947, with negative results. It is logical to conclude that Sgt Eugene T. Duggan and Pfc. Arthur R. Townsend were killed in action in the town of Grening, France on 23 Nov, 1944 and that their remains were disposed of by the enemy in a manner which precludes recovery. The fact that Field Investigation proved negative, together with the fact that there are no unknowns on record that may be associated with the subject casualties would tend to substantiate this conclusion; It is therefore recommended that this case be deemed non-recoverable.

A Missing Report filed in each enlisted man's Casualty Brance file states that he was a member of a patrol sent out to determine the strength of the enemy at Grening, France. - 2. SR&D Case No. 4761, dated 24 November 1945, File: AG 704 Dead (24 Nov 45), reviewed the circumstances of the disappearance of Sergeant Duggan, Private Townsend, and others, and recommended that findings of death be made, showing the presumed date of death, in each case, to be 24 November 1945. Information on which the presumption of death was based, in the case of the subject soldiers, was found in "Missing Reports" in their Casualty files. According to these Reports, Sergeant Duggan and Private Townsend were members of a patrol which was sent to Grening, a village a few miles southeast of St. Avold, France, to get information regarding the strength of the enemy there. On entering the village they met opposition, and the subject enlisted men failed to return. On the following day, when their Company entered the village, they could not be found.
- 3. Sergeant Eugene T. Duggan, 32700920, and Private First Class Arthur Townsend, 32829637, were members of a patrol sent out to obtain information regarding the enemy strength in Grening, France. They did not return, and, when their Company entered the village the following day, no trace of them was found. It is therefore concluded that the information of record in the Department of the Army at this time does not warrant the issuance of an official report of death, pursuant to the provisions of Section 9 of the Missing Persons Act.

### AFTER ACTION REPORT

Mission: The Mission of the 320th Infantry from 8 November to 12 November inclusive was to seize, clear and secure from the enemy the Foret de Chateau-Salins. The mission during the period from 18 November to 25 November, inclusive, was to seize, clear and secure from the enemy all ground within its assigned sector.

Information of the enemy: In the attack on the Chateau-Salins Forest our troops encountered thoroughly prepared enemy defensive positions. All roads and open spaces were thoroughly strewn with mines. There were barbed wire entanglements and well established fire lanes for automatic weapons, well supplemented with forholes and dug-outs. The enemy had good observation for the empooyment of its mortars and artillery which were used very effectively. The enemy at all times during this period had the use of armor with which he effectively supported his infantry forces. The use of the enemy mortars and artillery was very effective against our troops in the forest because of trees bursts. The efficiency and the morale of the enemy troops were very good.

Decision on Tactical Maneuver: In actions during the month tactical decisions were designed to accomplish missions assigned in directives of higher headquarters. Local tactical maneuver was in conformity with decisions of the Regimental or appropriate subordinate commanders.

Unites Used: During the period the 1st Battalion was commanded by Major Frank Waring until he was evacuated on 7 November 1944. Lt. Col. James T. Walker then assumed command of the unit and directed its activities until he was wounded in action on 18 November 1944. Major Walton, Battalion Executive Officer, then assumed and remained in commend until the end of the period. The 2nd and 3rd Battalions were commanded by Lt. Col. Warren T. Hannum and Lt. Col. Joseph D. Alexander respectively throughout the period. Special Unit commanders were Captain Edmund R. Casey who commanded Headquarters Company until he was evacuated on 8 November at which time Captain Dwight D. Bonham became the commander for the rest of the period; Captain Paul H. Heil, Service Company; Captain A. D. Wilson, Anti-Tank Company. Cannon Company was in command of First Lieutenant E. Cammack until 6 November when Captain Robert N. Ekstrum assumed command of the unit for the remainder of the period. Major L. A. Smith, Regimental Surgeon, was in command of the Medical Detachment. The regiment was commanded by Colonel B. A. Byrne. Lt. Col. William F. Northam was Executive Officer. The Regimental Staff consisted of First Lieutenant Milton Ginsburg, Major George W. Jamieson, Major Thomas P. McElroy Jr., and Major Harold V. Hughes, S-1, S-2, S-3, S-4, respectively.

Weapons used: Small arms, grenades, rockets, mortars, artillery, tanks and tank destroyers.

Artillery, Tank and Air Support: Artillery support during the entire period was excellent. The regiment had the use of tank destroyers throughout the period, which was excellent, although terrain conditions often made their use difficult or impossible: In the first three days of the attack on the Foret de Chateau-Salins, 8 November to 10 November inclusive, the regiment had the use of tank support. However, this support was cut to a minimum as a result of losses incurred by the tank company on the first day of the action, and by conditions of terrain. After 11 November all tank support was withdrawn entirely and the regiment had no tank support for the rest of the period. The unit had periodic air support throughout the period.

Effects of Weather: All operations during the entire period were hampered by rain, mud and snow, which in many cases made conditions extremely difficult and uncomfortable.

Supply: During the period the supply problem was mainly one of refitting and equiping the men for winter warfare. Sleeping bags, sweaters, extra blankets, overshoes and combat boots were issued with priority to line companies. A critical shortage of tires, tubes and tube patching developed. This was due to tire failures from shrapnel and nails picked up from the roads. During this period a salvage crew was organized, comprised of men suffering from battle fatigue. The objective of this crew was to salvage lost, dropped or discarded equipment by following units through their zones of action. The recovery of considerable amounts of salvagable equipment attests to the success of having such an organization.

Communications: Communications were by wire and radio, with appropriate use of messengers. The operations of the wire crews were very often made difficulty by the mud and the long dark nights. The lines were often cut by shell fire and vehicles, and one wire crew was the victim of a mine explosion.

aHonest appraisal of troop morale and troop efficiency: Excellent throughout the operations.

SUBJECT: Review and Determination of Status Under the Missing Persons Act.

#### I. - FACTS

1. The following-named persons have been carried on the records of the War Department as missing in action in the European Theater of Operations since 23 November 1944 as reported by shipment numbers which appear opposite their names:

- 2. The above-named enlisted men of different infantry Regiments became missing in action during the time of the intense action against Aachen and the Hurtgen Forest areas. Some were reported as missing in action in France and some in Germany. The available information concerning them is set forth in paragraphs three through eleven which follow.
- 3. a. Sergeant Bugene T. Duggan and Private First Class Arthur R. Townsend were members of Company L. 320th Infantry. A Missing Report filed in each enlisted man s Casualty Branch file states that he was a member of a patrol sent out to determine the strength of the enemy at Grening, France. Upon entering the town, they met intense enemy opposition and were not seen afterward by members of their organization who entered the town on the next day. A thorough search for the missing persons was conducted, but no trace of them was found.
- b. Sergeant Duggan's AG 201 file contains photostatic copies of two package wrappers addressed to him and returned to sender as of 23 February 1945 and marked "Hospitalized 12/18/44".

#### II. - CONCLUSIONS

1. The eleven persons whose cases are considered in this review were members of different Infantry Regiments which participated in the offensive action in the areas of Aachen, Germany, and the Hurtgen Forest on 23 November 1944. They became missing in action under conditions set forth in paragraphs 2 through 11 which follow:

2. Sergeant Bugene T. Duggan and Private First Class Arthur R. Townsend were members of a patrol sent out to determine the strength of the enemy at Grening, France. At the entrance to the town, they met intense enemy opposition. On the next day their organization entered the town and a search for the missing persons was conducted, but no trace of them was found.

#### III. - RECOMMENDATIONS

It is recommended that findings of death be made under the provisions of Section 5 of the Missing Persons Act in the cases of the persons named in paragraph 1, Part I, above and that these findings show the presumed date of death to be 24 November 1945 in each case.
