



A Board of Officers appointed by Paragraph 2, Office Order No. 1, dated 2 January 1969 (Tab A) convened 12 Jan 1969, and after consideration of the factors presented, approved the Unidentifiability of Unknown X-9393 (SR-5104) presently stored at the U. S. Army Mortuary, Frankfurt, Germany.

1. Case papers reveal that skeletal remains designated Unknown X-9393 (SR-5104) were discovered by a French National (Mr. Pierre Lecompte) while digging a shallow trench for a small drainage pipe in a field at Berzy-Le-Sec, Soissons, France.

2. The U. S. Army Mortuary identification branch at Frankfurt, Germany was notified of this discovery by Battle Monuments Commission in Paris, France and arrangements were made with local police to disinter the remains. No identification tags were found with the remains; however, the following items of personal effects and U. S. military equipment were recovered:

- One (1) PFC Chevron
- One (1) pocket comb, reads "Goodyear 1851"
- One (1) ink pen, reads "Arthur A. Waterman Co. N. Y. Pat. Nov, 17, 1903)"
- One (1) bugle
- One (1) binocular case (leather)
- One (1) gas cannister, and portions of gas mask
- One (1) shaving brush
- One pr. boots, hobnail type (WWI)
- One (1) belt buckle, brass
- Six (6) US Army brass buttons, and US insignia, USA Seal
- Four (4) rounds of 45 cal. bullets
- Numerous pieces of wool material

3. Identification Laboratory processing indicated that the skeletal remains are those of an average sized caucasian male of average muscularity. The estimated age is 18 - 18½ years with a height measurement of approximately 5'7½". There is much erosion of the bone structure due to the lengthy time the remains were buried. The tooth chart shows extractions of teeth #13 and 30, and several amalgam restorations and cavities (Tab B).

4. According to the official records in the Mayor's Office at Berzy-Le-Sec, the only fighting that took place in this area occurred during the month of July 1918, and there was no military action in this area or surrounding areas during World War II. The official records also reveal that the 1st and 2nd Divisions of the U. S. Army were involved in this area in July 1918. In view of the above and after examination of the clothing and equipment found with the remains, it was the opinion of the identification specialist that the remains are those of a World War I casualty.

5. In checking historical records, the following excerpts were obtained from pamphlets of the 1st and 2nd Infantry Divisions:

#### THE STORY OF THE 1ST INFANTRY DIVISION ----

"...Relief of the division was completed July 8 (1918), after 72 days in the line. Five days later the men were again in the front lines, this time in the Marne salient. From July 18 to 23, they overcame the strongest resistance the enemy could offer and succeeded in cutting the main supply route of the salient. At Soissons, the division took its objective only after casualties had reached a desperate total. Two companies were wiped out, and the 2nd Bn came out of action commanded by a Sergeant..."

#### THE STORY OF THE 2ND INFANTRY DIVISION ---

"... Fighting in France is not new to the 2nd Division. It fought in every major engagement of the first World War where American troops participated. It left its mark at Belleau Wood. It left its dead, too. The 2nd Div captured one-fourth of the entire number of prisoners taken by American Armies. It won more decorations than any other American division..."

#### CONCLUSION:

Based on the recovery of U. S. military type equipment, it is concluded that these remains are those of a U. S. casualty of World War I. However, the lack of dental and physical information concerning World War I casualties precludes an association for remains of Unknown X-9393.







OFFICE OF THE CHIEF OF SUPPORT SERVICES BOARD OF REVIEW

1. Establishment. Under provisions of AR 15-6, the Office of the Chief of Support Services Board of Review (hereinafter referred to as the Board) is established to assist the Chief, Memorial Division, in the resolution of special cases which involve the identifiability, nonidentifiability, or nonrecoverability of the remains of deceased persons.

2. Membership. The following officers will serve as members of this Board:

Colonel James C. Bagg, 024132, QMC  
Colonel James J. Murnane, 062144, QMC  
LTC Richard F. Albera, 01576372, QMC  
LTC Jack R. Fleming, 065561, QMC

The senior member present will serve as President of the Board. One member, as designated by the president, will act as recorder for the Board and will be responsible for the documentation of the findings of the Board. A majority of the members of the Board will constitute a quorum.

3. Authority. In the resolution of all cases referred to in paragraph 1 above, the Board will serve as the reviewing channel between the operating Branch and the Division Chief. The Board is authorized to review all such cases as are referred through it to the Division Chief. After documentation of its findings, the Board will recommend the approval of the Division Chief or his designated representative or return the case to the operating Branch for reconsideration of its determinations.

4. Duties. The Board is charged with the following duties and responsibilities:

a. Establish a set of standards and procedures to determine the adequacy, authenticity, and completeness of records which serve as an operating basis for the Board.

b. Review case history reports concerning the identifiability of recovered remains as submitted by the operating Branch.

OFFICE ORDER No. 1 (Cont) 2 January 1969

c. Review case history reports concerning the nonidentifiability of individual recovered remains and the nonidentifiability of individual remains of group recoveries.

d. Review case history reports concerning the nonrecoverability of remains of persons in the following categories:

(1) Persons for whom The Adjutant General has issued presumptive findings of death.

(2) Persons known to be in a KIA status, whose remains, because of the circumstances of death, are determined to be nonrecoverable.

(3) Persons whose remains are officially reported lost at sea.

e. Based upon its findings, either recommend the approval of the Division Chief, or return the case to the operating Branch for further reconsideration of the case.

5. Convening of the Board. The Board will convene at the time and place designated by the president and will adjourn at his direction.

6. Rescission. Office Order No. 9, dated 21 August 1968.

REPORT OF RECOVERY AND EXAMINATION OF (BTB) WW I REMAINS

CASE: Unknown X-9393 (S/R 5104) Recovered at Berzy-Le-Sec, France

While digging a shallow trench for a small drainage pipe in a field at Berzy-Le-Sec, France a worker (Mr. Pierre Lecomte) a French national discovered these skeletal remains. Upon examination by the local police, they discovered a few American military type brass uniform buttons (US Seal). After this discovery the local police presumed this remains to be an American. The local police then notified the Supt. of the American Battle Monuments cemetery at Aisne-Marne, Belleau, France (Mr. Arthur E. Darois) USA citizen.

The US Army Mortuary identification branch at Frankfurt, Germany, was notified of this discovery by Battle Monuments Commission in Paris, France.

An ID team consisting of Mr. Witzel and Sgt Williams arrived at the burial site on March 5, 1968.

Arrangements were made with the local police to disinter the remains on the following day.

The following personnel were present during the disinterment:

1. Mr. Fourrage, Adjutant Chief of Police, Soissons, France
2. Mr. Thiriet, Assistant Chief of Police, Soissons, France
3. Mr. Maillard, Mayor of Berzy-Le-Sec, France
4. Mr. Darois, Supt. Aisne-Marne Cemetery, Belleau, France
5. Mr. Witzel, ID Spec, USA Mortuary Frankfurt, Germany
6. Sgt Williams, USA Mortuary Frankfurt, Germany

The remains were discovered on the land owned by the Mayor Mr. Maillard of Berzy-Le-Sec, France. The location of the burial site is approx. 3 Kilometer East of the center of the city on the east side of the railroad tracks (Paris to Soissons) and approx. 150 feet from the track in an easterly direction.

According to the official records in the Mayor's office at Berzy-Le-Sec the only fighting that took place in this area occurred during the month of July, 1918.
