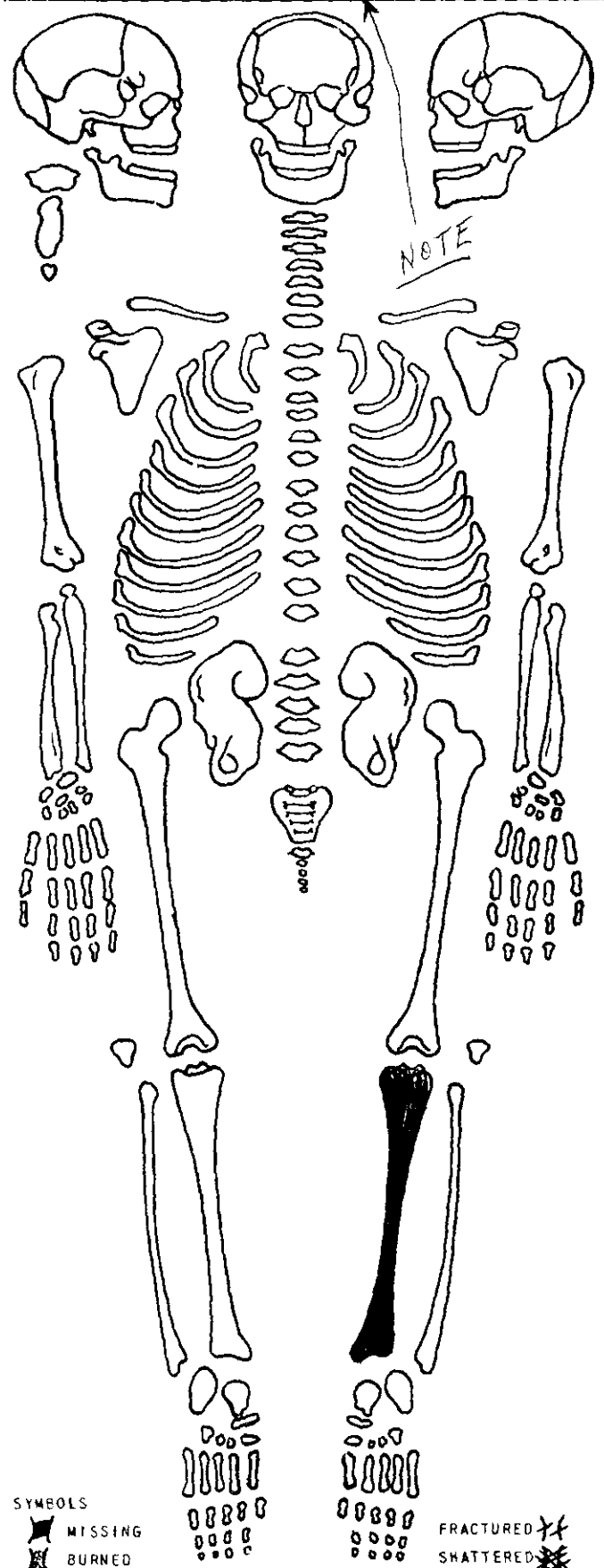

A Board of Officers appointed by paragraph 1, Division Order No. 10, dated 27 May 1959 (Tab A), convened at 1000 hours 27 OCT 1959, and after consideration of the following factors, approved the designation of SR Case #5035, Unknown X-70107 Frankfurt (MEDZ) Mausoleum, as CIL remains.

Search and Recovery Case No. 5035 (designated Unknown X-70107) was recovered from the Adriatic Sea, 500 meters off the coast of Pianosa, near Termoli, Italy.

Headquarters, US Army QMMS (Europe) received information from the Italian Naval Office at Ancona, Italy concerning the recovery of a human bone by fishermen operating off the Island of Pianosa in the Adriatic Sea. The human bone (a left tibia) was recovered in a parachute bearing American markings. (Tab B) The fishermen reported that when the parachute was first sighted it contained what appeared to be a complete skeletal remains. As they carefully drew in their net, the turbulence of the water and the movement of the net caused all portions of the remains to be lost except the left tibia.

The complete white nylon parachute bore various markings, including serial number, manufacturer's name and date of manufacture. "A N" was stenciled on several sections of the chute.

In an attempt to determine the blood group of subject casualty, scrapings from the bone marrow were submitted to the University of Frankfurt Blood Bank. Various tests were conducted, however, the results of the tests were inconclusive. (Tab C)

A search of records* in Memorial Division revealed that a great number of planes crashed over the Adriatic Sea during WWII; however, a complete physical screening of MACR's (now in storage in Military Records Section, Alexandria, Va.) would be necessary to account for all missing crew members of aircraft lost in any given area.

Even if it were possible to identify the serial number on the parachute (which is highly unlikely) a conclusive association with any specific individual would be most difficult since the fragmentary portion designated Unknown X-70107 does not afford a basis for physical comparison. The only traceable clue available is that the parachute was manufactured 22 Nov 1943, hence the casualty occurred subsequent to that date.




Although a further search of stored records might possibly disclose information which could be correlated with this case, the absence of identifying physical data would preclude individual association.



SUBJECT: Memorial Division Board of Review

1. Establishment. Under provisions of AR 15-6, dated 25 July 1955, there is hereby established the Memorial Division Board of Review (hereinafter referred to as the Board) to assist the Chief, Memorial Division, in the resolution of special cases which involve the identifiability, nonidentifiability, or nonrecoverability of the remains of deceased persons.

2. Membership. The Board will consist of not less than 3 officers. The senior member present will serve as President of the Board. One member, as designated by the president, will act as recorder for the Board and will be responsible for the documentation of the findings of the Board. A majority of the members of the Board will constitute a quorum.

3. Authority. In the resolution of all cases referred to in paragraph 1 above, the Board will serve as the reviewing channel between the operating Branch and the Division Chief. The Board is authorized to review all such cases as are referred through it to the Division Chief. After documentation of its findings, the Board will recommend the approval of the Division Chief or his designated representative or return the case to the operating branch for reconsideration of its determinations.

4. Duties. The Board is charged with the following duties and responsibilities:

a. Establish a set of standards and procedures to determine the adequacy, authenticity, and completeness of records which serve as an operating basis for the Board.

b. Review case history reports concerning the identifiability of recovered remains as submitted by the operating branch.

c. Review case history reports concerning the nonidentifiability of individual recovered remains and the nonidentifiability of individual remains from group recoveries.

REPORT OF RECOVERY AND LABORATORY EXAMINATION OF
WORLD WAR II REMAINS

CASE: Recovery of WW II remains in the Adriatic Sea near Termoli, Italy

1. Correspondence received from the Italian Naval Office at Ancona, Italy reported the recovery of a human bone by fishermen operating 500 meters off the island of Pianosa in the Adriatic Sea. The island of Pianosa lies approximately 65 kilometers northeast of Termoli (sheet 155/8278) Italy. The bone had been recovered in a parachute with American markings.

2. The investigation conducted by the undersigned at Termoli revealed that a complete white nylon parachute had been picked up with the following three stenciled markings in black ink:

c. A N (found stenciled on several sections of the chute)

3. The human bone recovered in the chute is a left tibia. The fishermen reported that when they first saw the chute it contained what appeared to be a complete skeletal remains. As they carefully drew in the net they were unable to prevent the remains from being tumbled out and lost by the turbulence of the water and the movement of the net. They were very upset by their failure to recover the rest of the remains.

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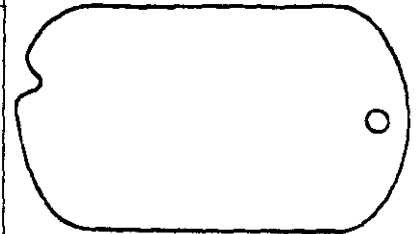

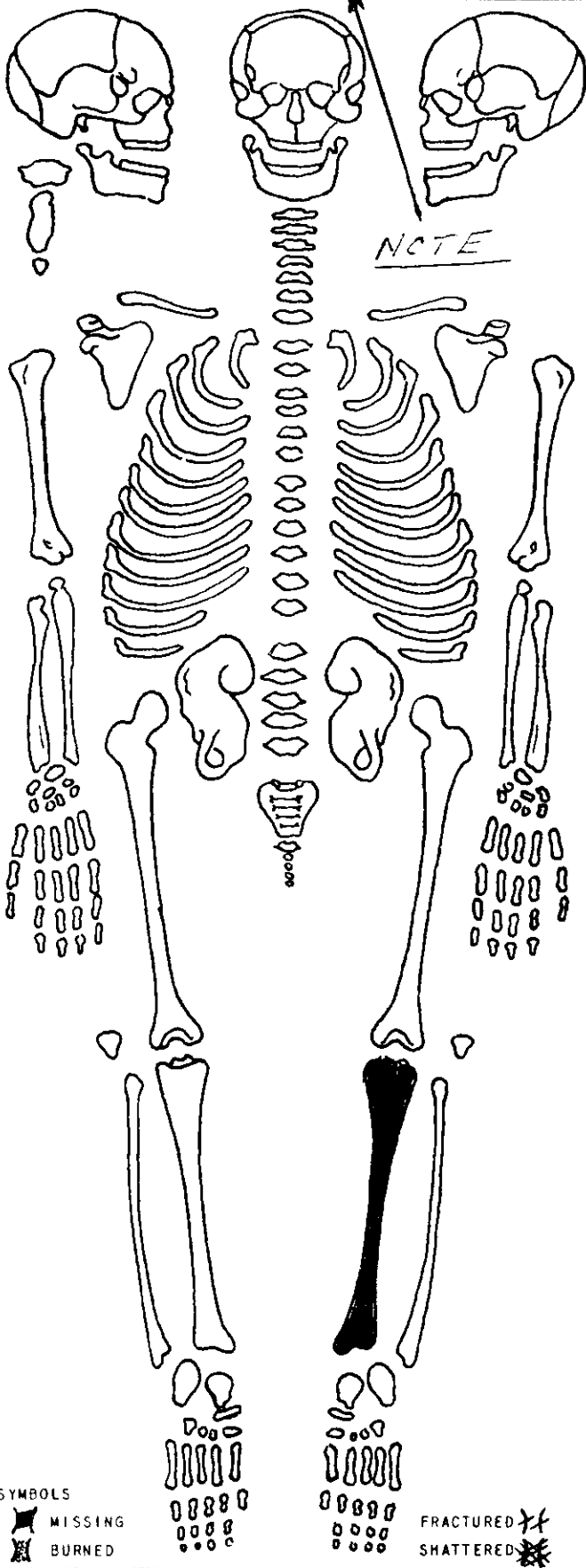


CASE: X-70107 recovered from the Adriatic Sea near Termoli, Italy.

1. There being limited factors of identification in this case it was decided to use the facilities of the University of Frankfurt Blood Bank in an attempt to determine the blood group of subject casualty.

2. The recovered tibia bone, after drying and exposure at room temperature, began to exude the fatty marrow substance from the cancellate bone areas. Scrapings of this material were submitted to the Blood Bank laboratory where many tests were conducted.

3. The results of these tests are outlined in the attached report by Dr. W. Spielmann in original and translation form. It is apparent that:

- a. There is a fair indication Blood Group "O" is present.
- b. Tests for "MN" were inconclusive.
- c. Tests for "RH" factor were not made.
- d. The material for testing was unusual and without having the same type material in all of the blood groups at hand as a control it was felt the examination was relatively unsatisfactory.

Dear Dr Fleischhacker:

The following examination was made with the Tibia material left to us in the middle of February of this year:

After reducing the material to small pieces, a cooking salt suspension was made and in the various tests from one the original suspension and from the other an extract was found by means of a centrifuge and examined in the Agglutinationshemmungstest.

In the ABO-System we could only find with Anti-H from Laburnum a clear Titer reduction in proportion to cooking-salt control and therefore the group O is presumed. Nevertheless, I don't want to commit myself definitely, as unspecific absorption is found relatively often in the Anti-H and no suitable control with material of the same age and grade of water erosion was placed at our disposal.

In the MN system we saw as well with Anti-M as with Anti-N a Titer-reduction of 1 to 1½ steps. Here I don't even dare a presumed diagnosis, although at first sight the group MN seems to be present.

I did not perform any Rhesus-examination in the foregoing case, as of the present it has not been successfully proven to distinguish Rhesus-Antigene even from new blood-free bone material.

For my part I deem this unusual examination relatively unsatisfactory, for one part as the quantity of the material was considerably minute, for the other part, no comparable material for examination of bone fragments of several persons, that is of various blood types, was placed at our disposal. With this comparison, control could be replaced to a certain extent.

I would be glad to be of service to you with this brief information.
