A Board of Officers appointed by paragraph 1, Division Order No. 3, convened at 1000 hours, 1 MAY 1956, and after consideration of the following factors, approved the Determination of Unidentifiability in the case of the remains designated Unknown X-9282 presently stored in the Frankfurt Mausoleum.

Letter dated 17 February 1956 from Headquarters, USAEUR Mortuary Service Detachment, 7770th Army Unit, Subject: Report of Burial - Transmittal Letter #6593 (copy attached) forwarded case papers pertaining to recovery of Unknown X-9282. In an investigation on 20 December 1955, the remains of Unknown X-9282 were received from the Parchau cemetery mausoleum in a small wooden box containing what was believed by local residents to be the remains of two (2) American airmen. Possessing of these remains revealed that they were extremely fragmentary remains of only one (1) individual. Reports from Parchau indicate that these remains were removed from a U.S. bomber which crashed in the Elbe river in 1944 and that late in 1944 this aircraft was removed from the river without obtaining the number of the aircraft.

Paragraph 3, Identification Laboratory Report, dated 25 January 1956, attempts to associate these remains with T/Sgt Louis Le Baron, 32 197 272. A comparison of the identification data of Unknown X-9282 and T/Sgt Le Baron reveals mesio-occlusal amalgam filling on tooth R-13 for T/Sgt LaBaron which negates the assumption it does not appear on Unknown X-9282. The identification data for Unknown on Sheet M-53 and surrounding map sheets were compared with that of T/Sgt LeBaron negative results.

In view of the above, it is recommended that Unknown X-9282, Frankfurt Mausoleum, be declared unidentifiable.







This dental chart is very important and should be filled in with great care. There are 32 teeth to be accounted for, as shown by the numbers on the chart. Beginning at the middle line in both upper and lower jaws, the teeth are arranged symmetrically on either side and classed as incisors (cutting teeth), cuspids or canines (tearing teeth), bicuspids (chewing teeth), and molars (principal chewing teeth). An examination should be made and findings charted to cover the following basic conditions : Lost teeth, crowned teeth, bridge work, fillings, caries (cavities of decay), dentures (plates), and any deformity of jaws found. See reverse side for illustrations.

INVESTIGATION REPORT

I. INCIDENT AND PERSONNEL

In accordance with instructions from your Headquarters, an investigation was conducted at Larchau (-50°15'40"E, 7°45' N), near Baden, Germany in an effort to recover the remains of Lt. Col. John F. Ladd, 33 1/2 yrs., the only unrecovered casualty of AF 42-3747 known to have crashed near Larchau at 1400 hours on 2 March 1954.

II. FACTS OF INCIDENT

Available information indicates that missing aircraft had a crew of ten (10), nine of whom were non-casualties. Flight Lt. Ladd, the only casualty, is still in an unrecovered status.

III. PERSONNEL

On 20 December 1957, the undersigned investigator visited the office of Mr. HANS JAKKARI, supervisor of embalming, at AF 42-3747 and stated that he knew nothing of the A/C crash since he had been in office for only one (1) year. He did, however, send for a Mr. WILHELMUS who claimed to have witnessed the A/C crash. It also transpired that the parachutes opened and float equipment. Mr. WILHELMUS stated that he saw all the surviving airmen on board and carried away.

Other results of interview render that fact that the aircraft was recovered from the Alpine village, the crash site, as no evidence to substantiate.

Mr. WILHELMUS also conducted a search of his records for any information that could corroborate the circumstances of the remains. A small wooden box was found to contain, along with others, the name of a deceased citizen, Cesserry casketmaker. Mr. WILHELMUS was contacted and the search team taken to the Cesserry casketmaker. There he was shown a small wooden box containing what was believed to be local records of the remains of two (2) service airmen.

On the spot examination was made and it was found that the box contained only the partial remains of one (1) body rather than two. There were many fragments of Air Force uniform and flight gear which, along with the remains was excavated by the 3 and 8 teams.

A revisit was made to the office of the deceased casketmaker. I re-preserved and received a copy of the town record pertaining to this case. (Attached hereto as enclosure "P 1".)

Investig. Report (L) Jan 26,

I received for the remains recovered (attached hereto as Enclosure 1 or 2) and one that described the location area for her/him.

II. SUMMARY

It is the belief of the undersigned that the remains recovered and exhumed to this location are identifiable, however, it may be three or four years old.

III. RECOMMENDATION

Recommend that the remains recovered from Carolina, Germany and assigned S/N 41439 be processed for anthropological identification and if no association can be made, it is recommended that the decedent named herein be considered non-recoverable.

Am heutigen Tage wurden auf dem hiesigen kirchlichen Friedhof zwei Amerikaner geborgen. Die oben genannten wurden im März 1944 von deutschen Jägern abgeschossen und stürzten in die Elbe. Cirka ein viertel Jahr später wurde das Flugzeug mit Besatzung von der deutschen Wasserpolizei gehoben und die beiden Leichen in einem Sarg gebettet und auf der rechten Seite des Friedhofs der Erde übergeben worden.

Bei der Beisetzung damals war Herr Otto Hartmann zugegen.
Herr Hartmann sagt zu diesem Fall aus:

"Der Zustand der beiden Leichen war sehr mangelhaft. Durch den Absturz und Anschlag waren alle Knochen zerschmettert. Was in diesen drei Monaten noch zusätzlich das Wasser getan hat, hat der Greifer bei der Bergung noch vollendet." Herr Hartmann hat nur noch Stücke in den Sarg legen können.

Disinterment-Report

In the local cemetery two (2) Americans were disinterred today. The above mentioned remains were shot-down by German fighter-planes and crashed in the Elbe-river. About three (3) months later, the plane with the crew-members was recovered by the German water-police and the two (2) remains were put in a casket and interred on the right side of the cemetery.

Mr Otto Hartmann was present at time of interment. He gave the following information:

"The condition of the two remains were unsatisfactory. According to the crash and the stroke, all bones were smashed. At the time of recovery, remains were in poor condition due to the fact, that they had been lying in water for three months." Mr Hartmann could only place partial remains in the casket.

The disinterment which took place in the presence of:

had resulted, that in the casket, which had a layer of straw, unnumerous small bones were found, mingled with partial clothings and cable for heating or uniform. Everything inside the casket was covered by maps, which were found at that time. There were no pieces of jaws or teeth found, although Mr Hartmann stated, that the heads had been recovered in a bad condition. It might have been possible, that after exhumation, the remnants were dried and sifted.

For evidence and reconnaissance, Mr Graf Heyd v. Koppingen and Mr Fritz Buerckner had taken out of the casket, two (2) connection-pieces of the heating, the maps, a part of the listening-apparatus with number, two (2) zippers and one (1) buckle to deliver items to the unit.

The remaining portions of the two Airmen were packed in a box, nailed-up, inscribed and given to the cemetery-attendant Mr Boelke for deposit in the morgue for final delivery.


