SUBJECT: Record of CIL Remains

TO: The Quartermaster General
Washington 25, D. C.

1. Forwarded herewith are Identification Laboratory Reports, dated 25 February 1955, pertaining to the recovery of remains designated SR 584 A, B and C.

2. Upon processing it was found that SR 584-A are additional portions of F/O Arthur H Richards, T-122885, whose remains are now permanently interred in the United States Military Cemetery, Hamm, Luxembourg. Portions SR 584-B are considered favorable for T/Sgt James E WOODGATE, 36102445, only unresolved casualty of aircraft 42-95717, based on process of elimination. However, insufficient portions exist on which identification can be based. Portions SR 584-C are considered portions of S/Sgt John T POSHEFCO, 33112429, whose remains are now permanently interred in the United States Military Cemetery, Hamm, Luxembourg.

3. In view of the above partial remains SR 584 A, B and C were designated CIL number 5068 A, B and C respectively. Attached hereto are Records of CIL Forms.



IDENTIFICATION LABORATORY REPORT

1. Search and Recovery Case # 584 pertains to partial remains recently recovered from the cemetery at Hartmannsdorf (M-51/J-96) Germany. German records indicate subject grave site contained four (4) casualty crew members of A/C F-17 G # 42-95717 which crashed 24 August 1944 near Hartmannsdorf. To date three (3) of the above four (4) crewmembers have been recovered from the cemetery at Hartmannsdorf as follows:

Unknown X-81 Grand Failly as RICHARDS, Arthur H. T-122 885 F/O
Unknown X-99 Grand Failly as PISHEKO, John T. 33 112 429 S/Sgt
Unknown X-179 St. Avold as DRUMMOND, Julius H. O-749 762 2/Lt

The remains of T/Sgt James H. WOODGATE, the fourth (4th) crewmember have never been recovered and/or identified.

2. The recent re-investigation of the grave site at Hartmannsdorf revealed the presence of an ID tag for "JAMES WORDGATE 36102445" and partial remains which have been segregated into cases SR 584 A, B and C representing portions of at least three (3) deceased. Associations between subject portions and the crew members are indicated below:

Major portions of the skull are present with complete maxilla and mandible. The teeth compare excellently with dental records for F/O RICHARDS. Also present are hand and finger bones which are heavy and strong and conform to the heavy bone structure of skull portions for F/O RICHARDS. An examination of the skeletal chart available for F/O RICHARDS (X-81 Grand Failly) indicates the complete skull, all hand bones and several foot bones are missing.

Major portions of the skull are present but there are no teeth. This skull is of lighter construction than in cases "A" and "C". Also present are the fourth (4th) right metacarpal and adjacent phalange, a right talus and second metatarsal left foot. These hand and foot portions are also smaller than in cases "A" and "C". The foot bones are comparable to size 9 or 9 1/2 which is in agreement with the size 9 1/2 D indicated for T/Sgt WOODGATE.

The foot bones appear to be best associated with T/Sgt WOODGATE because of the agreement in size and the fact that foot bones are shown as present on the skeletal chart for 2/Lt DRUMMOND and the talus is shown as present on the skeletal chart for F/C RICHARDS. In addition, foot bones estimated as size 10 1/2 to 11 are present in case "C" which can only be associated with S/Sgt POSHEFKO (see details below).

Two skull portions, several hand bones, distal half right tibia with articulating talus and calcaneus and the five metatarsal bones of the right foot are present with this case.

These portions are consolidated as case "C" because of the similarity in size, weight and coloration. There is no skeletal chart available for the remains identified as S/Sgt POSHEFKO but this case is best associated with him by the process of elimination. The portions are negative for an association with T/Sgt WOODGATE and are shown as present in the charts for F/C RICHARDS and 2/Lt DRUMMOND.

3. The finding of an ID tag for T/Sgt WOODGATE as well as skeletal portions which are favorable for subject deceased indicates he was buried with the three (3) associated crew members as noted in German Records. It would seem then that the remains of T/Sgt WOODGATE were removed from Hartmannsドルf at the same time the three (3) identified crew members were disinterred and is now buried as an Unknown.

INVESTIGATIVE SUMMARY REPORT

1. Search and Recovery Case # 501 pertaining to partial remains recently recovered from the cemetery at Hartmannsdorf (X-51/J-96) Germany. German records indicate subject grave site contained four (4) casualty crew members of AF 1-17 G / 42-25717 which crashed 2h Aug 1944 near Hartmannsdorf. To date three (3) of the above four (4) crewmembers have been recovered from the cemetery at Hartmannsdorf as follows:

Unknown X-51 Grand Malilly as PASHKOV, John F. 33 112 429 S/Sgt
Unknown X-179 St. Avold as DUNIHOV, Julius A. 0-719 762 2/Lt

The remains of T/Sgt James L. G. BOATE, the fourth (4th) crewmember have never been recovered and/or identified.

2. The recent re-investigation of the grave site at Hartmannsdorf revealed the presence of an ID tag for "JA TS F 54711 36102445" and partial remains which have been segregated into cases SF #51 A, F and G representing portions of at least three (3) deceased. Associations between subject portions and the crew members are indicated below:

Major portions of the skull are present with complete maxilla and mandible. The teeth are excellent with dental records for F/ MICHARD. Also present are hand and finger bones which are heavy and strong as would be to the heavy body structure of skull portions for F/ MICHARD. An examination of the dental chart available for F/ MICHARD (X-51 Grand Malilly) indicates the complete skull, all hand bones and several foot bones are missing.

The following observations are based on the available material. The first two cases are more complete than cases "2" and "3". Case 26-27 is incomplete and shows right metacarpal and adjacent phalanges, a right calcaneum and metatarsal left foot. These hand and foot portions are more complete than in cases "2" and "3". The foot bones are comparable to case 9 or 9 1/2 which is in agreement with the age of 14 years and the sex female.

The following observations are based on case 26-27. It can be seen that the carpal bones are present in the wrist. The scaphoid bone is present on the right side but 1/2 of the bone. The talus is shown as present on the metatarsal side for 7/8 of the body. The calcaneum is shown on the left side. In 7/8 of the time the fibula is present in case 26-27 which corresponds to a completed child (see table 6-1).

Case 26-27 contains some remains of the right arm and hand with articulating values at the elbow and shoulder joint. It also contains right clavicle, scapula, humerus, radius and ulna.

These portions are incomplete but show some degree of similarity in size, weight and proportion. There is a 1/2 of scapula available for the arm bones to fit on and the radius is 1/2 of the ulna. Both of these bones are 1/2 complete. The hand portions are not alive for an articulation either 1/2 of the hand and arm shown or 1/2 of the hand for 1/2 of the arm 2/3 of the arm.

On the finding of an ulna, radius, scapula and clavicle, portions which are favorable for subject "F" much material has been found with the three (3) associated arm bones as noted in the report. It would seem then that the remains of "F" (age 14 1/2) were removed from transport at the same time the three (3) unidentified crew members were disinterred and is now buried as an unknown.


