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#### CASE HISTORY

X-9218

Griesheim/Main Mausoleum

The remains designated Unknown X-9218 were recovered from alongside a crater at the southwest cutskirts of Tettingen, Saarland. A ripped half of an American helmet with the markings "K-6266" was found with subject remains. Also remnants of UF dilitary clothing was found in the immediate vicinity.

No teeth or other conclusive identifying media were recovered. The remains consist of two (2) major sections of the right and left pelvis and proximal two-thirds of the left humerus.

Remains were associated with Sgt Alfred M. KING, 32666266, a member of Company "G", 376th Infantry Regt., who was reported killed in action on 19 January 1945 in the vicinity of Tettingen (Saar) Germany. Sgt KING was part of a thirty (30) man detail transporting anti-tank mines to the front lines. A mortar shell exploded near subject casualty and he was reported disintegrated by the blast.

Although there is no evidence unfavorable for this association, identification was not acceptable for the following reasons:

- a. Identifying media is not considered sufficient to establish positive identity.
  - b. Paucity of remains.

In view of the above it can only be concluded that the remains designated Unknown X-9218 must be considered Unidentifiable.

#### IDENTIFICATION LABORATORY REPORT

- 1. Search and Recovery Case # 550 represents partial remains of one (1) deceased recently recovered from a wooded area on the SW outskirts of Tettingen/Saar (Ger 6/L-00). With subject remains a ripped half of US steel helmet was found with stencilled markings "K-6266". Remnants of US Ground Forces clothing were also found in the immediate vicinity.
- 2. Records available this headquarters indicate that the helmet markings correspond with the initial and last four digits of Army serial number for Sgt Alfred M. KING, 32 666 266, a member of Co "G", 376th Inf Regt, 94th Inf Division who was reported KIA on 19 January 1945 and is still in an approved non-recoverable status.
- 3. Pending the official approval of the identification of this remains a tentative Unknown "X" number has been assigned as follows:

SR 550 is now designated <u>Unknown X-9218</u>
Griesheim/Main Mausoleum
Grave 220

4. The physical characteristics of this remains have been favorably compared with like data indicated on the QMG Form 371 for Sgt Alfred M. KING as outlined below:

There were no teeth recovered with this partial remains. The light weight and small size of the portions recovered indicate the height and weight of this casualty was very similar to the given height weight of Sgt KING.

The severely shattered condition of the portions recovered and the ripped portion of steel helmet indicate death was the result of a severe explosion.

#### NARRATIVE OF INVESTIGATION

#### I. AUTHORITY AND NATTERS DEVESTIGATED:

In compliance with Investigation Directive # 1145, Case # Ger 6/Nisc., dated 7 May 1954, an investigation was conducted at Tettingen/Saar (Ger 6/L-00), in an effort to recover additional remains of Sgt Alfred M. King, 32 666 266, Co "G", 376th Infantry Regiment, 94th Infantry Division, killed in action on 19 January 1945, in the vicinity of Tettingen/Saar. During a previous investigation conducted at Tettingen in March 1954, three (3) portions of remains, together with an American helmet marked K-6266 had been recovered from a wooded area locally called "Pollerhaid". Information concerning the whereabouts of those remains had been received from a Mrs. Fixemer, resident of Tettingen, who originally had discovered the remains in question several years ago. (See attached Marrative of Investigation, dated 17 March 1954 and statement of Mrs. Fixemer).

#### II. FACTS AND CIRCULATANCES:

Records this headquarters indicate that Sgt Alfred M. King, 32 666 266, killed in action on 19 January 1945, was a member of a thirty (30) man party, carrying anti-tank mines towards the front lines when an enemy shell exploded in his vicinity, detonating the mines he was carrying. A search made one (1) day following the incident, in an effort to recover his remains, resulted negative.

#### III. FINDINGS:

Upon arrival at Tettingen, the undersigned first contacted Mrs. Fixemer at her home address. Accompanied by her, this team proceeded to the area where the three (3) portions of remains and an American helmet had been recovered. Mrs. Fixemer was able to point out the exact place where she had found the human remains several years ago. After all available information was obtained from Mrs. Fixemer, a thorough search in the area in question was started.

An area of approximately one hundred (100) square meters was raked, meticulously searched and all questionable spots excavated, but all efforts made to recover additional remains of Sgt King proved negative. During a three (3) day search, only a few very small pieces of American rubber boots and remnants of a US Army type glove could be found.

Following the instructions given in Investigation Directive # 1145, an attempt was made to locate the demining team, which, according to

(Marrative of Investigation, ID # 1145, dated 18 May 1954, cont'd)

Irs. Fixemer's statement, allegedly buried some remains after they had been first discovered.

During conversation with local inhabitants it was learned that a Mr. Hernkes, residing at Saarbrucken, was in charge of a demining team working in the Tettingen area after war's end. Contacting Mr. Hermkes at his office in Saarbrucken, he stated that he is still in charge of the demining and demolition teams working in the Saar region. He had no knowledge concerning the burial or finding of human remains in the so-called "Pollerhaid" near Tettingen. He informed us that all discoveries of American remains had been immediately reported to his head office, "Commission de Controle de Desarmement" at Saarbrucken, which in turn notified the American authorities. After the report had been made, an American disinterment team appeared in every case within 2/ hours, in order to evacuate the remains either to Luxembourg or Belgium.

Weekly reports, presently in possession of ir. Hermkes, which had been submitted by the demining team formerly working in the Tettingen area were checked but did not reflect the discovery or burial of any remains during the time demining activities took place in that area. (See exhibit A).

#### IV. COLCLESIO.:

Investigation and search was conducted in an effort to recover additional remains of Sgt Alfred M. King. No additional remains or other means of identification could be found.

## V. RECO. MIDATICA:

Based on the results of investigation and information obtained as mentioned above, it is recommended that this case be reviewed by this headquarters.

Demining

Upon request by the American Graves Service, Frankfurt/Lain, it is hereby certified that during the period from 17 October until 23 October 1947 a demining team of the Saarland Government cleared one mine field near a wooded area, locally called "Follerhaid", designated by us, map sheet 6404, field 2051. Working in the area was the demining group "Raubuch". The following mines were found and removed:

7 Anti-tank mines, American origin.

4 Anti-personnel mines, American origin.


Reports pertaining to cleared mine fields as submitted on 5 November 1947 do not contain any evidence of remains having been found.

The procedures concerning US remains found in mine fields cleared by up or regarding the internal operation of our office were as follows:

Whenever remains, portions of remains, skeletal remains or identification tags, etc., were found a report was made directly by our team to the French supervision office, the "Corwission de Controle de Besarmement", which on their part had supervising personnel present at the site of operations. In every case a disinterring team of the US army contacted our office within 24 hours and was shown the locality. The evacuation of the remains took place to Belgium or Luxenbourg as far as I know.

#### NARRATIVE OF INVESTIGATION

#### I. AUTHORITY AND MATTERS INVESTIGATED:

While conducting an investigation at Tettingen, Saar, the undersigned were informed that partial remains and a portion of a U.S. steel helmet were still lying on the surface of a nearby wooded area. These portions were first noticed following the winter offensive of 1944/45.

#### II. FACTS AND CIRCUASTANCES:

A statement was obtained from Mrs. Anna Fixemer (see exhibit "A"), relating that several years before while passing the wooded area of "Pollerhaid", lying southwest of the village of Tettingen, she had been shown a portion of a soldier's skeleton suspended in the top of a tree which had just been felled. She also had noticed additional portions on the ground near this tree. A crater was seen alongside this tree and beside the crater was a ripped American steel helmet which bore a number. It had been assumed that the soldier had received a direct hit and had been disintegrated with parts of his body blown up into the top of the tree. In the past year she had noticed some of the remains still lying near the tree where she had placed them before. She had contacted three men of a demining team and taken them to the site where she understood they were to conduct a burial. Mrs. Fixemer did not know these men or how they could be reached.

A statement was obtained from Mr. Edmund Burens (see exhibit "B") who was the former Burgermaster of Tettingen following the winter offensive of 1944/45. He states that he recently saw the skeletal remains and the ripped steel helmet at the location in question. He could offer no additional information concerning these remains.

The undersigned, in the company of Mrs. Anna Fixemer and Mr. Zeimet, the assistant to the Burgermaster of Perl, then proceeded to the location indicated (see sketch exhibit "C"). Two (2) skeletal portions were found consisting of partof a left upper arm and the major section of left pelvis. The steel helmet was actually one-half of the helmet which had been ripped apart and bore evidence of a terrific explosion. A clear stencil marking of "K 6266" was noted on the inside of the steel helmet.

Records of this organization disclose that Sgt Alfred M. King, 32 666 266, a member of Co "G", 376th Infantry Regiment, 94th Infantry Division, was killed in action 19 January 1945 on the edge of Tettingen, Saar. He had been a member of a thirty (30) man detail carrying boxes of

of anti-tank mines to the forward lines. An enemy mortar shell landed nearby and Sgt King was reported as disintegrated by the resulting explosion of the six (6) mines he was carrying. A search made of the area on the following day revealed no trace of Sgt. King. Three other members of the detail had been injured by the explosion but Sgt King was the only member of the group who was not accounted for.

#### III. FRIDINGS:

On arriving at the site a portion of humerus and the left pelvis were located near the tree. A search of approximately forty-five (45) minutes was conducted before it was necessary to leave the area. No additional portions were found during that search. A few days later, when the situation permitted a short absence from the primary mission at Tettingen, an additional search of approximately one (1) hour was conducted at the site. During this search the major portion of the mating right pelvis was found by probing under the leafy vegetation covering the area.

#### IV. CONCLUSION:

The portions recovered were assigned search and recovery number SR # 550 and were transported to the Identification Laboratory at the Griesheim/Main Lausoleum in Frankfurt/Main, Germany, for further examination and casketing.

#### V. RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that an additional investigation and search be made in the area concerned and an attempt made to locate additional skeletal remains of Sgt King. It is also recommended that efforts be made to locate the demining team members to determine if they may have buried portions of the remains as indicated in the statement of Mrs. Anna Fixemer. (see exhibit "A").

STATEMENT


Tettingen, 10 March 1954

Several years ago while I happened to pass the woodchoppers in the woods "Pollerhaid" near Tettingen, these men brought my attention to the fact that a portion of a soldier's skeleton was hanging in the top of a tree which had just been felled. According to my observation it concerned a spinal column near the neck, a piece of scalp with redbrown hair, as well as all the skin of the shoulder. Also near the tree additional skeletal portions were noticed. Located near the tree was a crater so that one could assume that the soldier in question had received a direct hit and was totally disintegrated whereby a portion of the body was thrown onto the treetop. We assumed that this concerned an American soldier, since a ripped American steel helmet, bearing a number, was located near the shell crater.

I observed some of the remains still lying by the tree in the past year where I had placed them previously. I had at that time reported this finding to the demining team and went with three men to point out the site. My understanding was that the demining team would conduct the burial. These people were unknown to me.
