CASE HISTORY

Unknown X-9236

Griesheim/Main Mausoleum Grave # 238

Unknown X-9236 was recovered by segregation from a mass burial of some 16 deceased (1 US and 15 German). This mass grave was recently opened by a German Graves Registration team at which time evidence of an American decedent was uncovered at Greimerath Civilian Cemetery.

Initial evidence of the presence of American remains was indicated by the discovery of U.S. shoe-pac with lower extremities of a deceased. Also recovered with the remains were remnants of a field jacket (zipper type) and a helmet No marking were apparent other than a "9-W" on the liner. boots.

Other portions of this deceased were located among the collective mass disinterred from the local cemetery by German Graves personnel and, further, by re-excavation of the original burial site. This group was first buried along side a road, approximately three kilometers southwest of Greimerath and 300 meters from the present German-Saarland boundary. According to local residents, a German aid-station was located in the immediate vicinity of the original burial site.

The recovered remains is essentially complete except for the absence of all cervical and several thoracic vertebrae and thereby precluding post cranial articulation. From among the skulls examined, it could not be determined which one of two skulls with teeth actually belong to the deceased. However, dental charts labeled #1 and #2 were prepared for each skuli, but only one (tooth chart #1) was placed tentatively with the This skull was selected as the most favorable for association based on the excellent state of dental repair which is in keeping with that afforded U.S. Armed Forces personnel. Also taken in consideration were the shattered

portions of two other skulls without teeth which could not be eliminated as possibilities for association with the deceased.

A review of records of known casualties lost in the area surrounding place of recovery and covered by map sheet Germany K-50 has disclosed no favorable comparison between unrecovered casualties and Unknown X-9236.

In view of the foregoing, it is recommended that Unknown X-9236 be declared unidentifiable.



IDENTIFICATION LABORATORY REPORT

- 1. Search and Recovery Case # 591 pertains to the remains of one (1) Unknown U.S. casualty recovered from a group burial with fifteen (15) German casualties at Greimerath (K-50/L-20), Germany. The lower legs were found in a pair of U.S. Shoe-pacs with heavy wool cushion-sole socks. Also found with this remains were remnants of a M-41 Field jacket with zipper and a U.S. helmet liner. No markings were found on any of this clothing and equipment except the boot size *9 **.
- 2. Pending association and possible identification this casualty has been assigned an Unknown "X" number as follows:

Post cranial articulation is not possible as the first twelve (12) vertebrae are missing. The damaged lateral tip of the left clavicle and the missing first five (5) left ribs indicate the left shoulder area was probably damaged accounting for the absence of the left scapula. A bullet passed through the right ulna, the head of the right femur, the acetabulum of the right pelvis and lodged in the left pelvis. It is noted that two (2) skulls with teeth were considered as possibly belonging with this deceased. Both have age factors in agreement with subject casualty. The skull presently with this remains (see tooth chart # 1) has been considered as the better possibility of the two because of the excellent state of dental repair and the generally clean condition of the teeth which is in keeping with the oral care given U.S. Service personnel. The second (2d) skull (see tooth chart # 2) also has age factors in agreement with subject casualty but there is no evidence of dental repair by which a comparison could

be made with U.S. dental practices. In addition, there were shattered portions of two (2) additional skulls found with the group of sixteen (16) which did not have any teeth but did have age factors indicating a possible association with subject deceased.

4. CAUSE OF DEATH: The shattered right ulna, pelvis region and left shoulder are the apparent cause of death.



NARRATIVE OF INVESTIGATION

I. AUTHORITY AND MATTERS INVESTIGATED:

In accordance with instructions set forth in Investigation Directive # 1205, this headquarters, dated 26 January 1955, an investigation was made in the vicinities of Luenebach Ger 6/L07 and Greimerath K-50/L-20, Germany concerning the reported finding of an American casualty amongst eighteen (18) German soldiers during disinterment operations by the German War Graves Service at Greimerath.

II. FACTS AND CIRCUMSTANCES:

On the 25 January 1955 this headquarters received a telephone communication from Mr. Endler, in charge of a German War Graves disinterment group, stating that within a group burial of eighteen (18) German casualties removed from the cemetery at Greimerath the presence of one (1) U.S. casualty was indicated. He further stated the American had been removed separately but it was impossible to determine which of the nineteen (19) skulls was that of the American. Mr. Endler requested the presence of representatives of the American Graves Registration Service to assist in determining which skull belonged with the American remains and to take custody of subject casualty. Mr. Endler was to be contacted at Luenebach for full particulars.

III. FINDINGS:

On the 27 January 1955 the undersigned investigators proceeded to Luenebach (Ger 6/L-07), Germany where the team of Mr. Endler was conducting a disinterment operation at the local cemetery. It was disclosed that all remains from subject group burial at Greimerath had been placed in moisture-proof sacks and were in the German unit vehicle at Luenebach. One (1) sack contained all that had been found of the American by careful disinterment following the discovery of U.S. boots (Shoe-Pacs) a U.S. helmet liner and zipper. A second sack contained all of the skulls and four (4) other sacks contained the remaining portions recovered from the group burial.

A preliminary examination was made of the remains believed to be an American and the portions were determined to be for one and the same deceased. The U.S. shoe-pacs were verified as having been worn by this deceased (Narrative of Investigation dated 7 February 1955, ID # 1205, cont'd)

as the right tibia and fibula were still enclosed within the upper portion of the right Shoe-Pac. Articulation with the foot bones in the bottom portion of the right boot was not possible as the talus was missing. The left tibia and fibula were noted as being mates of those found in the upper portion of the right shoe-pac. The left tibia and fibula were then associated by proper articulation with the complete tarsal bones contained in the left boot.

It was noted that the seven (7) cervical and first four (4) thoracic vertebrae were missing along with the clavicula, left scapula, left humerus, both ulnae-radii, hand bones and right falus.

With the assistance of Mr. Endler the use of the local fire house was obtained for the purpose of laying out portions to assist in determining which skull was for the American and to aid in recovering the other missing portions.

The next two (2) days (Friday and Saturday) were spent in cleaning up all portions and arranging them to determine how many casualties were actually represented. Skulls, pelvic groups and femora indicated the presence of only sixteen (16) casualties instead of the previously reported nineteen (19). A study of the smaller skeletal parts showed a lesser representation in direct ratio to the size of the portions involved.

The missing left humerus was located amongst the eleven (11) left humeri present but no trace of the missing fore arms could be found amongst the few ulnae and radii present. Fourteen (14) of the sixteen (16) skulls had teeth and it was definite that only three skulls with teeth could be considered as being American. Two (2) other partial skulls without teeth had age factors in agreement with the estimated age of the remains recovered as an American. Insufficient vertebrae prevented the articulation of any skulls with remains.

A discussion with Mr. Endler and his assistant Mr. Reger revealed they had carefully removed all portions from the grave site in the cemetery but information received from the Greimerath officials indicated this group of casualties had been previously buried near a bunker in the vicinity of Greimerath. The remains had been removed from the original place of burial in 1947 and placed in the group grave at the cemetery by local citizens. According to Mr. Endler, the remains were found in an intermingled condition during the recent disinterment.

It was explained by the undersigned that both burial locations should be examined to recover additional missing portions, clothing remnants, a U.S. steal halmet (believed present as indicated by the heavy rust stain on the halmet liner) and possibly an ID tag. The Buergermeister

(Narrative of Investigation dated 7 February 1955, ID # 1205, cont'd)

at Luenebach agreed to allow the remains to be left in the arranged condition in the fire station while an attempt was made to recover the vital missing portions in Greimerath.

On Monday, the 31 Jan 55, Mr. Kirsch in Saarburg was contacted and arragements were made for the undersigned to disinter the previous group burial sites in Greimerath. Proceeding to the recent disinterment site at the cemetery the undersigned and two (2) hired laborers screened the contents of the grave from which the sixteen (16) casualties had been recently removed (see sketch of cemetery Exhibit "A"). A few vertebrae and several hand bones were the only portions recovered from this grave.

Mr. Bauer the local Buergermeister and another local resident pointed out the approximate original burial sites beside a road near a destroyed bunker located three (3) kms southwest of Greimerath, near the German-Saar border crossing (see sketch Exhibit "B"). Probing and digging revealed three (3) distinct graves containing large quantities of partial remains, clothing, equipment, personal effects and three (3) German ID tags. In the middle grave of this group fragments of U.S. wool O.D. shirt and sweater were found as additional evidence that an American casualty had been buried with the Germans.

Digging in a northerly direction a fourth grave was located containing three (3) complete remains. These were carefully disinterred and kept separate with their proper German ID tags.

Another grave associated with the group of sixteen (16) was next located down the road near the border control offices. Excavation here resulted in the recovery of additional portions for four (4) German deceased and two (2) German ID tags. The border control building had been a German Aid Station during the war so a search was made in the fields in back of the building for evidence of other graves. Four (4) possible grave locations were examined but these proved to be trash pits used by the Aid Station personnel.

Returning to Luenebach all partial remains were cleaned for study and association with the previously recovered remains and the three (3) complete remains were released to the German War Graves unit. Additional portions for the U.S. casualty were located including the complete right clavicle and damaged left clavicle; both right and left ulnae and radii and the right talus. No additional vertebrae could be isolated as belonging to the American deceased nor could the left scapula be found among the fifteen left scapulae present. Of the three (3) skulls originally considered as possibly American one was now eliminated by association with the grave containing four (4) German deceased located across from the Border Control Offices at Greimerath.

One of the two remaining skulls with teeth was placed with the American casualty on the basis of having dental repair most like American dentistry (see tooth chart Exhibit "C"). The reasons for selecting this particular skull were explained to the German War Graves representatives Mr. Endler, Mr. Sembritzki, Mr. Caspary and Mr. Reger. It was further explained that possibly the second skull (see tooth chart Exhibit "D") may be the actual one for the American casualty. The second skull has teeth but there is no evidence of dental repair. It was requested of the German War Graves representatives that the location be recorded where the skulls will be interred at the Castel Memorial Cemetery near Saarburg as office research may prove the second skull (Exhibit "D") to be the proper one for the American casualty. If this proves so then this unit will return the skull presently with the American remains (Exhibit "C") for exchange with proper skull.

IV. CONCLUSION:

All of the German casualties were taken into custody by the German War Graves personnel for burial in a "Comrades Grave" at the Memorial Cemetery in Castel, Germany. ID tags and personal effects recovered by the undersigned were presented followed by a discussion concerning the recognition of physical characteristics.

A group of four (4) enlisted men from the 311th QM Graves Registration Co. had been present during all operations for the purpose of observing and on-the-job training. These men exhibited a serious interest in the work and proved very helpful in the recovery operations.

The remains of the American casualty was properly wrapped and evacuated as SR # 591 to the Central Identification Laboratory in Frankfur6/Main, Germany.

V. RECOMMENDATION:

It is recommended that SR # 591 remains be processed for comparison with all unrecovered U.S. casualties lost in the regions surrounding the recovery site at Greimerath, Germany. It is also recommended that both tooth charts (Exhibits "C" and "D") be considered in an effort to determine which skull actually belongs with subject deceased. It is further recommended that the attached bill for 61.20 DM be forwarded to the French War Graves Services in Bad Ems, Germany so the Saarburg officials can be reimbursed for labor provided at Greimerath.
