



SUBJECT: Search Mission, Pvt WALTER R MUNDZIAK, 33146700

TO:

Commanding Officer, ACRS/MZ, 9107 TSU-QMC APO 794, c/o PM, New York, New York.

- 1. Data from OQMG Form 371: "Died of shrapnel wounds in back in Tunisia #18-42.8-54.8. He was interred in Tunisia, Map #18, 42.8-54.8, stake marker, no identification tags."
- 2. A search party consisting of one (1) officer and one (1) locally-hired English-French-Arabiv speaking guide, departed Tunis, Tunisia at 0700 hours, 13 July 1949, enroute to above-cited co-ordinates, which, pin-pointed on Sheet #18, map of Tunisia, established grave location to be on the Northern slope of Djebel Berboukr, approximately 3/4 kilometer south-easterly from the native village of Douar Guefal.
- The destination proved to be in a quite remote section of barren rocky mountains, with the sole visible vegetation being groves of giant pear cactus, and waist-high bramble bushes and thistles; the vicious white desert dogs of the Bedouins kept the search party at a safe distance from the striped tents of their nomad masters, but an occasional hail from the distance brought out a native who directed us to Duar Guefal over a network of cart-tracks and donkey trails totally unlike those shown on our 13-year old map. Thus, 5½ hours later found the search party beside one lone adobe mud hut, which, after rousing a native from his slumber in the scorching noon-day sun, we were told was our long-looked for village of Douar Guefal, and the range of Djebel Berboukr stretched away on our right. During a short rest for lunch, another native appeared out of a clump of cactus and inquired if, perhaps, we might be looking for graves of American soldiers. On being answered in the affirmative, our informer, Brahim Ben-Hadj, volunteered that he knew the location of two graves, and immediately shouldered pick and shovel and led the scramble up the mountain side. Tearing through thornbedecked vines, side-stepping cactus, skidding over loose gravel and sliding over blistering hot boulders, we forced our way up two-thirds of the mountain when our self-employed guide drew up under an overhanging rock ledge and began rolling away stones and digging in the few inches of soil lodged in a narrow and shallow trough-like crevice formed in the solid rock. When finally all soil on the spot was thoroughly disturbed and picked through and the last stone had been rolled out of the crevice, Ben-Hadj seemed geninnely disappointed and exclaimed that he couldn't understand it, only last winter he had seen a human skull laying atop the ground in that same crevice, so he was sure that the sparse soil topped with loose stones which filled that little niche in the solid rock contained the remains of a soldier. An intensive search 15 meters above and to both sides of the spot, and 30 meters below the

spot, was made. When the search failed to disclose any trace of the skull or any other portion of a human skeleton, the surrounding portion of the mountain side was searched, also with negative results.

- 4. It is felt that a sufficient portion of the side of the mountain was searched and included sufficient area which would necessarily include any human error made in the original reporting of the coordinates of the grave, and after no trace of a grave nor portions of a human skeleton could be located, the search was abandoned.
- 5. When asked how he knew of the location of the second grave which he had mentioned earlier, the Arab, Brahim Ben-Hadj, answered that he knew where it was because he had buried the man. Further questioning drew from him the facts that the deceased was an American soldier, killed by German machine gun fire, and that a search of the remains prior to burial failed to disclose identification tags or any papers of any kind by which identity could have been made. The trek to the site of this second grave led the search party up the remaining 1/3 distance to the top of the mountain, along the summit in an easterly direction and then down the southern slope approximately 20 meters from the summit. The co-ordinates are 43.0-54.4. The second grave was not dissimilar from the alleged site of the first: a shallow, narrow V-shaped trough in the solid rock, the crevice running perpendicularly (i.e., up and down the slope, not horizontally), and partially filled with soil lodged between the loose stones which lay in the crevice.
- 6. This second grave site was explored down to solid rock, and netted seven (?) fragments of a human skull, two thin pieces of leather, probably from a shoe, and a length of leather shoe lace. Smilar crevices above, below, and to both sides were also explored and the entire area thoroughly searched with negative results as to finding further portions of skeletal remains. When asked as to what he considered might have happened to the balance of the skeleton, our native guide intimated it not unlikely that "the fox" or "the jackal" could easily have taken away the skeleton until, some six years after death, only a handful of skull fragments remained. The wind and rain of six years since date of death could result in erosion causing smaller boulders to move from position and roll to a new location further down the mountain, thus causing the sparse soil to also wash down, carrying with it bones which might be lodged under, between or behind any of the thousands of stones and boulders which cover the mountain side, forming a layer over the solid rock. A further attempt to recover more of the skeletal involves a monumental task requiring far more time than that available at this time.
- 7. It is the opinion of the undersigned that the area searched, as outlined in Par 1-4, embraced the area reported as containing the grave of Pvt Mundziak, and that his remains are non-recoverable, and that the area searched as outlined in Par 5-6, contained the grave of an American soldier whose identity is unknown, recovered portions of which are insufficient to attempt establishment of identity.

SUBJECT: Search and Recovery Report.

TO

Commanding Officer 9107 TSU-QMC, AGRS/MZ APO 794, US Army

1. Acting on information relayed to the AGRS through the French Graves Registration Service by the Gendarmerie Nationale at Maknassy, Tunisia, a search party consisting of 1 AGRS officer, 1 FGRS officer, and 1 guide-interpreter, proceeded to Maknassy on 10 August 1949 to investigate the scene of an airplane crash which occurred early (January or February) in 1943. Guided east from Maknassy toward Mezzouna by a member of the Gendarmerie, we proceeded approximately $7\frac{1}{2}$ miles to coordinates 90-10, on "Maknassy" Sheet 62, Series 4226, Map of Tunisia 1: 100,000.

- 2. Scene of the crash, the north western slope of Djebel Djebs, was littered with shattered fragments of glass, charred remnants of cables, scraps of bakelite, .50 cal, ammunition links, the hub of what appeared to be a 3-blade propeller with an 8 inch stub of one blade still attached to the hub, a V-type engine (probably 16-cylinder), and beside it an unmarked grave with several portions of skull and other human skeletal remains laying above ground.
- 3. It was reported that the plane crashed further up the slope and then slid or rolled down some 15 yards to where the motor lay. All other portions of the plane wings, fuselage, landing gear, tail assembly appear to have been salvaged and carried away by the natives. The engine, though broken, disclosed several sets of serial numbers which may lead to identification of the plane and its pilot (see Incl #1).
- 4. The grave was carefully excavated and the soil thoroughly searched for any identification material. Other than the incomplete skeletal remains, only items located were a short portion of a US Army-type pistol belt and tiny fragments of material which appear to be of Officers OD (Green) shirt material.
- 5. It could not be learned by whom the interment was made, nor the exact date of the crash. Inspection of USaAF records which report

fighter craft missing in the area of Maknassy during the early part of 1943 may, by comparison of engine serial numbers, lead to eventual identification of the recovered remains.


