SUBJECT: Summary of Statements by Survivors of the SS MATTHEW P. DEADY, American Freighter, 7176 G.T., owned by War Shipping Administration, operated by American-Hawaiian Steamship Co

- l. The MATTHEW P. DEADY was damaged by Japanese aircraft at 2135 GC 2 Nov 1944, while at anchor in Tacloban Bay, Leyte, P.I., having sailed from Hollandia 23 Oct in convoy, arriving at San Pedro Bay Leyte, P.I., 29 Oct; loaded with approximately 900 U.S. Army troops as passengers and a cargo of approximately 5560 tons consisting of t of the troops' gear, drums of gasoline, trucks, acetylene tanks, sulphuric acid and general military stores. On 2 Nov convoy moved anchorage to Tacloban Bay. Vessel did not sink and returned to Hollar dia under her own power.
- 2. Ship was at anchor, crew at general quarters, completely black-out. The sky was clear with scattered clouds, wind West force 2-3, visibility limited, about 10-15 ships in sight of about 100 ships is harbor. Moon, which was almost full, had just gone down and it was just before daybreak.
- 3. At about 2125 an air raid alort consist ng of 3 star shells from shore, was observed by lookoutsl General quarters was called and immediately thereafter several planes were heard in the harbor area At 2135 a Jap plane was sighted approximately 1000 yards away, appl hing ship 2 points on the starboard quarter. Tlane dropped a stick of bombs about 100 yards astern and then started straffing ship with machine gun file. Flane, strafing continually, swerwed over ship's stern, passed to port and flow alongside, then swerved back and era into the #2 gun tub, which is situated abreast #1 hatch on the port sido. Plano was takon under firo by #9 - 2m mm gun, as soon as it was sighted. Tracers from this gun showed that gunner was making direct hits, and a small flame was noted under the plane as it pass over the stern. Plane w as thenfired on by #2 gun which also made direct hits and which kept firing until the plane crashed into it. As the plane crashed into #2 gun tub there was an immediate explosi set fire togasoline, acetylene and oxygen taks stored under and forward of #2 gun tub while the flash of the secondexplosion set f to the remainder of the forward dock load, consisting of gasoline range fuel for the Army mess stoves and approximately 300 acetylene and oxygen tanks. The terrific heat produced caused 20 mm armuniti in the #2 ready boxes to explode, spraying the entire ship with fre monts. Flames spread forward to the bow and threatdneed to engulf 3" 50 armunition magine and ready boxes of the #1 gun. Master ord abandon ship stations in order to assemble his crow, and from thes stations he ordered crow to fire stations. Armod Guard stood by t guns in case of further attack, whileemembers of the merchant ereplayed water over the the entire area forward of #3 hatch and three a wall of water around the gasoline, acetylone and exygen tanks. Water was kept on the forward gun tub and ready boxes and the area of the forward an gazine. Fire was brought under control an hour.

SS MATTHEW P. DEADY

There was a hole l' square in hull on stanboard side aft just below aft ammunition magazine about 10' above water line and 40' forward of screw, believed to run. No. 2 gun and tub completely domolished and #1 gun position days out but to fire and excessive heat Deck buckled downward near #2 gun where plane hit; bulwark bent out-ward at that point; 2 small holes about 32 in diameter burned in dock as a upper strakes forward damaged as result of fire and heat. Cargo goar, booms and dec-machinery for #1 and #2 burned and weakened. Interior of #1 hatch burned and #1 hatch covere beards destroyed. Main engines were not damaged. Machinery damaged restricted to deck gear such as booms and winches on #1 and 2 hatches, At about 2150 Tive Jap dive bombers came in over ship and the immediate area, dropp anti-personnel bombs and strafing the ship and personnel in the water who had been blown over the side or had jumped to escape the fire. One of those planes was a hot down by 20 rm guns aboard ship, and e someod planeowasclisted as probably destroyed as it was smaking heavily when last seen. No information available regarding dispositi of confidential codes but it is assured that they were retained on on board.

- 4. Ship was not ordered abandoned but some of the personnel was blow everboard by the explosion or jumped everboard to escape the fire. Total complement on board was 7400 including 37 merchant span, 27 Armed Guard and approximately 680 U.S. Army troops as passengers. Entire merchant erow survived. Two Armed Guard missing from 72 gun tub, 25 survived. Of the Army passengers, 22 were killed, 35 missin, and unknown number injurad, 4 of whom subsequently died. About 220 troops had been discharged the provious day. Most of the Army casualties were the result of the initial crash and explosion. Army personnel sleeping on the main dock, port side, were burned by the first flash of the explosion, seme-were-blown everboard and other jumped everboard to escape the fire. Fragments of the plane and bursting ammunition injured several, some were hit by strafing and a few were injured by 20 mm shells exploded by heat.
- 5. The Jap plane was described as having a single motor, four blade propelle and resembling an "Oscar". Survivers were of the opinion that Jap pilets were out to do as much damage as possible before going into their final dives. During ther stay in port numeroud attacks we witnessed with planes usually making a bembing run on one ship, strafing a second and finally crashing into a third. Nearly all divewere made at steep angles of 45° to 70°, and in most cases planes appeared to be undamaged prior to their final dives. In describing the tactic carried out by the Jap dive squadrens, survivers stated that at about 0930, 12 Nev, 2 groups of Jap planes appeared at about 3000; one group consisting of 7 planes and the other of 6 planes. No air raid warning had been given by shere authorities. Two Jap planes were shot down by P-38's. The rest began circling and poolir off preparatory to diving on ships. Of the 11 planes, 5 were soon crash into vessels while 6 missed their targets and crashed into the bay.

6. On 12 Nov 44, while anchored about & mile off Dulag, Leyte, 1.1. ship was again under attack. Because of the suddeness of this second attack, survivers were unable to give a full description of what happed. Three single-engine/apanese planes (probably Zerees) were seen coming in from the West. It was later learned that no air raid warms signal was given as the plane had followed in from the West some U.S. Army C-47's which were preparing to land. The planes immediately begaining upon and attacking I ships lying about 800 m 300 yards North and West of the MATTHEW P. DELDY. One of the planes come in on the starboard beam attempting to strafe ship. No. 9 gun took plane under fire at 300 yards. Thene was elserved to eatch fire. If drift ed slightly upward and, eversheeting the ship's superstructure, carried away the radio aerial and foll harmlessly into the water on the port side.

Survivors made the following comments and suggestions:

Military personnel carried as passengers on Liberty-type ships should be taken off immediately upon reaching the lattle zenes. Jap planes appear to a ingle out for attack ships crowded with troops.

The air raid warning system ashere on Leyto is apparently not adequate, as ships were often under attack before the crow was aware an air maid was under way.

Barrage Lalkeens should be used to combat the Jap dive planes.' ,

U.S. Army troops should be provided with life jackets as many men were lost as they were unable to swim after being blown over the side. The Arméd Guard crew passed out all spare life jackets available, but did not have mearly enough to take care of the number men aboard.

l. The following information has been received by the Office of Naval Intelligence in a report dated 7 Hovember 1944 regarding the SS MATTH W F. DEADY (US), which was bombed, strafed and crash-dived by Japanese planes 3 November 1944, while at anchor in Tackloban Bay, Leyte, F.I.:

sions occurred and tho forward part of ship caught fire immediately. Troops and crewmon who were forward had to abandon ship by jumping over board. While these menwers swimming, Jap planes were strafing the water and dropping anti-personnel bombs. Two members of the U.S. Mavy Armed Guard went over the side without life jackets to escape the fire and swam to another ship about 500 yards off the starboard beam. They towed an Army man who had been severely burned and could not swim to this ship. The Army man was alive when taken abourd but his name could not be ascertained. This fact can be verified by Captain Mullins, 768th Engineer Dump Truck Co., Base K, Leyte, I.I. As result of the attacks, U.S. Army casualties were: 22 killed, 125 injured, 4 of whem have died, and 35 missing.
